FAMILIAR FIGURE IN NORTHVILLE

LEONARD CHARTER HAS LIVED
HERE 44 YEARS.

Veteran Who Served Throughout
Civil War.

As announced some time ago, it is the purpose of the Record to give its readers from time to time biographical sketches and portraits of well known and long time residents of Northville and vicinity and this week it is our pleasure to speak of one who has been a familiar figure of our citizenship for more years than many of our residents can remember.

Leonard Charter, who is affectionately known as "daddy" to his many friends, has been a citizen of this village for forty-four years. He was born in Paris-helle, St. Lawrence Co., N. Y., August 29, 1826, and came to Michigan in 1851, first settling in Lapeer county and coming to Northville in 1890.

Mr Charter's record as a war veteran covers almost the entire period of the civil war. He enlisted in Co. G Fourteenth Michigan Infantry in 1861, and after serving two years re-enlisted at Columbia, Tenn., in the same regiment for the remainder

der of the war receiving his discharge in Detroit July 29, 1865. He is a member of the local Post G. A. R.

It has been ascertained first in 1879 and then in 1890 that his present wife was Olive J. Austin. The wedding took place in 1879 and they have since that time had a family of four children and the present Mrs. Charter has a son living, L. B. Charter, and Mrs. Alice DesAntels both residents of this place.

In spite of having reached nearly four score years, Mr Charter is still active and industrious, engaging in the cultivation of fruit and flowers on his property here, and getting around the streets summer and winter with as much agility as many a man of half his years.

He is a faithful attendant of the Presbyterian church, of which he and his estimable wife are members and both have the highest esteem of all who know them.

Happenings of the Week Chronicled Briefly For Busy Readers.

STATE GRANGE.

Mr. Horton's Views on Primary Reform and Tax Commission.

To his address to the 40th annual session of the Michigan State Grange, held at the Hotel Grand Hotel, Detroit, on Wednesday, Dec. 14, 1904, Mr. Horton, president of the Michigan State Grange, made a most interesting and timely address. He discussed the primary reform bill, the tax commission, and the general condition of the state.

ATWOOD HOLDS.

Appointment of Governor Warner's Personal Counsel.

The appointment of Theodore W. Atwood as personal counsel to Governor Warner was announced by the governor on Wednesday, Dec. 14, 1904. Mr. Atwood is a well-known lawyer and has served in various capacities in the state government.

THE LEGISLATURE.

Reports and Rumors That Are Now in Circulation.

A new measure for the taxing of the roads will be presented at the coming session, and bill being one to change the method of assessment. It is not intended to ask that the state should return to the old system of taxing the roads on their assessed value, but that the state board of assessors, the tax commission, be given the power to equate between the different classes of property so that the roads would be in the same class of assessment as the other properties of the state.


