Quality of Fruit. Although the quantity of fruit now being produced in the United States

is less than the growing demand, yet the improvement in quality is more needed than an increase in quantity, least from the standroint of the grower. At the present time we are producing a large percent of fruit that is unmarketable because of being wormy or under sized. If an orchard ist will separate his fruit into three general lots, one the marketable. second, the unmarketable on account of being wormy, and third; the unmarket able on account of being under-sized he will be astonished at the results The orchards are few that produce a high percentage of good-sized apples entirely free from worms or scab. It is evident to any student of orcharding-that if we can make all of our fruit first class, the receipts will be doubled for the amount of fruit we now raise. Two general lines of procedure must be followed in the im proving of the quality of our apples The first is to get rid of the worms and scab through spraying. This is a science the value of which has been fully demonstrated, yet we find com paratively few orchardists that have yet come around to making spraying a part of their regular work, but with out it it is impossible to check the codling moth, or destroy the fungue of the apple scab, which is the mor destructive of the two. The second line of effort must be in the thinning of the fruit of the trees so that the fruit matured will be of good size. No matter how perfect fruit may be, if it is small it brings a very small price on any market Au apple tree that is thinned in time will produce as great a weight of large fruit as it would have borne of small fruit if it had not been thinned Since as much is produced and a better price is obtained, it is evident that the thinning process is a profitable one to follow it does not take as long to pinch off tained, it is evident that the thinning process is a profitable one to follow it does not take as long to pinch off fruit when small as it would to gather it when mature, and the surplus fruit would he if left to mature and thus decrease the size of all the rest of the fruit on the trees.

Apple Tree Blight.

W P Works of Republic Counts Kas, erites, "Ms apple frees have made its excellent early growth but something has highted all the new growth on the ends of the fimbs and they now look as if life had searched them. Can you tell me what is the treuble and ramedy."

In reply to the inquiry made by your ubscriber, would say that his apple frees are undoubtedly affected with the bacterial direase known as pear blight. This is my opinion, simply formed from the meagor information which he gives. To jositively know, it would be necessary to examine the tree or the affected part. But we feel sure that it is 'blight' There is no known remely whereby the disease can be held in check or killed by means of spraying. It can be held in check to considerable degree by re-moving the diseased twigs or branches. The cut should be made from four to six inches below the point where the bark is brown and dead The branches thus removed should be burned, thus lessening the danger of further spread of the disease disease is more likely to attack trees that are succulent and growing rapidly. Thus conditions of soil or care which would produce tess rapid and more hardened wood growth would tend to make the tree more resistant and less susceptible to becoming diseased. She was an artist, an accomplished musician, an earnest Christian, and as loving a daughter as ever cheered the hearts of fond parents. We had looked upon her as the hope and scurce of comfert in our declining years, but in the prevalence of God who knows far better than we what is lest, it must be otherwise. When she left us a shadow settled over our home and upon our hearts, never to be lifted this side of the heavenly mansions where the chroken ties of earth shall be reunited never to be severed again.

THE WOMEN'S WORK

By Mrs. J O. KNAPP

It was on the afternoon of April 6, 1873, that the Woman's Foreign Missionary Society of this church was organized with the following officers: President, Mrs. Martha Dubuar; vice-president, Sarah Clarkson; secretary, Miss Alice M Beals; treasurer, Mrs. Jenne H. White. Mrs. Dubbra and Miss Peals with the Mrs.

cers: President, Mrs. Martha Dubuar; vice-president, Sarah Clarkson; secretary, Miss Alice M Beals; treasurer, Mrs Jenne H. White. Mrs Dubuar and Miss Beals were appointed delegates to the Wc nan's Foreign Miss onary convention to be held in Ann Arbor, April 9.

In addition to the officers, among the charter members were Mesdames Bradley. Morse, M. Johnson, Griswold, McFarlin, Horton, Yerkes, etc. The delegates came back from Ann Arbor fall of enthusiasm for the great work the women of our church had undertaken. Miss Afree Beals was appointed (at that meeting in Ann Arbor) to correspond with South Lyon and Plymouth with a view to their organizing in the work.

On May 15, the third meeting of our society, the following resolution was adopted; "That we educate one of Miss Dean's pupils in Fisk Seminary, Organiah. Persia, and that her name be Martha Dubuar." Some years previous to this the church educated a James Dubuar." India. The first year the society was in existence we not only raised the \$28 in gold for the maintenance of the gril but assisted some in the work in Mexico At the close of 1879 the treasurer reported twenty paying members who had contributed \$51 48 during the year.

The dues were ten cents a month at first and at one time they were paying a dollar per year additional. At the annual meeting in February, 1880, at the suggestion of Mrs Camilla Duburr we decided to do something in the home mission line, and Miss. Dubuar was honored with the secretarysing. Many of you remember those boxes, of which we were so proud. This box work continued for some years and finally led to a fully organized Home Society, annual dues being 51 cents. At firetatic Home Society met at the close of the Foreign, next we alternated, until now we are both a Home and Foreign Society. For several years out box work was confined to second-hand clothing for the Freedmen. It was an object very dear to the heart of our beloved Miss Perdy, and as long as strength permitted her to overse the work it added largely to the good we wer

we were doing as the appreciative letters she received indicated.

The Rev Mr Dubuar oight to have been an honorary meither of our societies, for he was always a generous contributor. Evidently he had faith in the ability of the women of the church at large and said nothing about "taxation, without representation."

bone-fire" and were "bone-fires" an ciently so called from the burning or the martyrs? This is one theory of the origin of the word. From ancient times bonfires have formed a striking part of the celebration of St. John's ve, or Midsummer eve, June 24, which was observed with similar rites in every country in Europe. Fires were kindled in the streets and market places of the towns. The young people leaped over the fismes or hrew flowers and garlands-into them with merry shoutings and songs and cances.' A heathen origin is believed to be indicated by these acts: A writer "On the whole it seems probable that the druidic fires, round which it was considered lucky to lear and dance on the occasion of the sum mer solstice, were built up of contributions brought by every one who wanted to secure his luck for the coming year, and so bonfire is really a boon-fire"
