Remarkable Explosion.

A recent fatality at the Ludington mine at Iron Moutain was one of the most remarkable chronicled in the Lake Superior mining region. Three men were working at the bottom of the new shaft, which is about 1,000 feet deep. A crew of miners had just inished drilling nine holes and filling them with dynamic.
