## DECLARES FOR PRIMARY LAW

### DIRECT VOTE FOR NOMINATING A CONGRESSMAN

Meeting Detroit Tuesday Townsend  
and Committee Favored Plan.

The first district of the state to take up the question of adopting the primary election system under the act passed by the last legislature will be the second congressional district.

Congressman Charles E. Townsend, at a meeting of the congressional committee held at the Wayne hotel Detroit Tuesday announced that he is heartily in favor of the adoption of the system in his district.

There are several other congressional aspirants, and that all may have an equal chance, the congressman requested the committee to take up the preliminary work necessary to bring about the change from the convention system to the direct vote of the people.

This was agreed to by the com-

mittee and preparation will be made for circulating a petition for the necessary signatures to bring the question of adopting the system to a vote at the spring election.

It is certain that the change of system will be made in the whole district. Congressman Townsend has always been an ardent supporter of the direct nomination system, and there is but little question that the congressional committee will be able to secure the signatures of 20 per cent of the voters, as required.

The primary reform decision of the second district congressional committee opens the field for candidates and it looks as though besides Mr. Townsend there would be several other candidates. Among them are Dr. Copeland of Ann Arbor; Thorn Dixon of Monroe, and M. R. Bacon of Wyandotte. Mr. Townsend is naturally the pole horse, and the railroad rate fight gives him plenty of campaign thunder.

W. W. Wedemeyer of Ann Arbor will not be a candidate, and he has announced he will support Mr. Townsend.

### A Sensible Move.

The consolidation of the Detroit Tribune with the Evening News is the logical sequence of the purchase of the former by the latter four years ago, and the only wonder is that it had not been accomplished sooner. The amalgamation is a very sensible move, and will no doubt meet the approval of all the patrons of both papers.

### BIG DAIRY MEETING

#### Gov. Warner and C. C. Lillie at Warden Friday.

Governor Warner and Deputy Dairy and Food Commissioner C. C. Lillie addressed a big dairy meeting held at the beautiful farm home of Mr. Laraway near Warden on Friday of last week. Upwards of 200 were present and the governor remarked that he had never before met so many prosperous and intelligent looking farmers in a gathering of this kind.

The meeting was a great success and the talks by both gentlemen were interesting and instructive. Governor Warner brought out the fact that Wisconsin now does a dairy business of \$40,000,000 a year as the outcome of a very small beginning. This result is chiefly due to the efforts of the Dairy and Food department of that state. He showed that Michigan ought to do as well as Wisconsin in a few years as the efforts of the Michigan commission is being directed along those same lines.

AT THE LAST MOMENT.

Thoughts of Great Men Immediately Preceding Dissolution.

There are few sayings of great men half so interesting as the words they utter before the curtain is run down for the last time.

What, for instance, could be sweeter than this picture of the last moments of John Richard Green, the historian? He had spoken the last sentences of tender farewell and gratitude to those around his bed, and then, placing his forehead on his pulse, he looked up at the doctor stooping over him and with a smile uttered the one word, "Stopped."

MAKING OF BECUS PEARLS.

Most Extensively Imitated of All the Precious Stones.

Among all precious stones few are so extensively imitated as the pearl.

The real article is a silvery white, iridescent gem, extracted from the pearl oyster. The genuine pearl is really an unfructified egg of the oyster.

Its imitation is arrived at by a chemical process. The liquid employed in the manufacture is called "essence Orient." The base of this compound is prepared by throwing into water of ammonia, the brilliant scales of a small river fish called the blay.

The scales are first carefully washed and put to soak in water, when the pearlylike film falls away and forms a sediment at the bottom of the vessel. This sediment is worth to the manufacturer \$25 an ounce.

White wax of nutmeg or gum arabic forms part of the mixture proper for the more important and expensive imitations, such as those made to imitate the rare oriental pearls which fetch fabulous prices.

The emerald is another stone which is cleverly imitated. A perfect emerald is the rarest stone in the world, though the trade ranks it after the ruby and the diamonds. The best emeralds come from Peru, the imitations from France, and a few from Birmingham. The real article becomes electric by friction and herein lies the difference between it and the imitation.

MAKING OF CHURCH BELLS.

Philadelphia, Founder Explains Some of the Methods.

No silver is used in church bells, said the bellfounder. "People claim there is, but I have assayed many an old bell that came here to be broken up and never an ounce of silver did I find in one of them."

"For the best bells we use old cannon. They give us the purest amalgam we can get. The tenor bell I am making now is composed of twelve tons of old cannon from Spain."

These two molds, the core and the cope, are what give the bell sweetness. It is in their cut that the secret of bellfounding lies. The core is the inner mold; it has the exact shape of the bell's inside. The cope, or outer mold, has the exact shape of the bell's outside.

"We fit the cope over the core, and into the space between the brass metal is run. When the metal has hardened and cooled the bell is finished, save for its clapper."

To tune bells it is necessary to chip little pieces out of them. Our bell tuner is a good musician. He has composed a number of hymns." Philadelphia Epitaph.

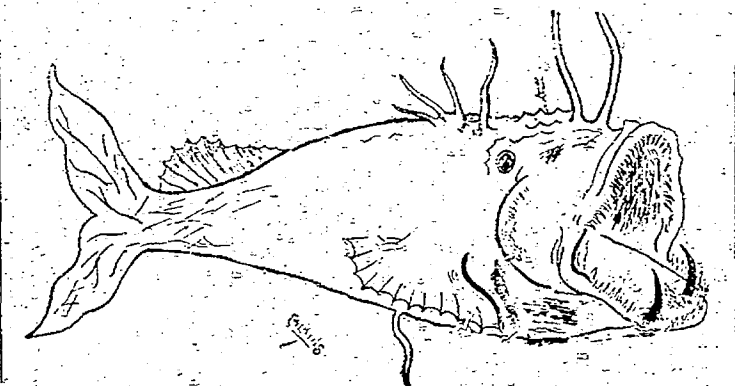
