Mikasa Blown Up.

The Japanese battleship- Mikasa, was the flagship of Vice Admiral Togo during the battle of the See of Japan, caught fire and her magazine exploded, killing 599 men on September 10. The cause of the fire is unknown. Before the officers could be rescued the fire reached the lft magazine, which exploded blowing hole in the port side of the vessel a note in the port side of the vessel below the water line and causing the ship to sink. The Mikasa was a first-class battleship of 15,200 tons displacement. She was built in England and was launched in 1902. The bat tleship was 400 feet long, had a speed of over 18 knots and carried a crew of 935 officers and men. She was keavily armored and carried four 12inch guns, 14 six-inch guns, 20 12-pounders and a number of smaller rapid fire guns. She had four sub

If we want to stock up in the way of purchasing eggs, we generally do'so in the spring, unless we are using an incubator. have to depend on the hen for the incubating process, it is more necessary to do this in the spring, because hen is not inclined to sit in the fall. Most farmers, however, have found it advisable to buy poultryrather than to buy the eggs, and the fall is the time when this should be This is the time of surplus This is the time when the men that have good fowls have some on hand to sell, and the man that wants to increase the number of his breeding birds should purchase them as soon as possible, that he may have his pick, rather than take what is left after most of the surplus has been =sent to market . There is another reason why the farmer should stock up early in the fall rather than late, and that the birds may be fed under his care long before the cold weather comes on. As a usual thing. the men that are raising fowls to sell are feeding them the cheapest possible food, with the idea of producing a fowl that will look well and sell well Almost always this feed-ing in this part of the country will be found to be corn. The barbs of the feathers he so close together that they form an air tight compart ment under the feathers. I have been in a poultry house on a day in winter when the temperature was 20 degrees below zero Every hen seemed to be puffed up, greatly enlarged in size his was produced by the feathers being pushed away from the body and holding under them a layer of air The feathers touched so firmly that there was no communication between the air inside and the air outside This was a provision of nature for keeping the fowls warm. cThe feathers are made up of minute spaces, each one filled with air, and therefore a non-conductor of heat. The quill itsolf is bollow and the air space in it prevents the passage of heat. When these feithers are new, therefore, they ate the warmest possible protection of the fowl. But when summer comes the conditions differ. The fowl needs the air from outside, and the feathers become thin, like a garment that is well worn. Nature might have pro vided for these feathers to renew themselves, but nature found it easier to grow new feathers for the new wincoat, and this is just what occurs. At moulting time the fowl needs to he fed with food that is rich in all the elements required for growth. The production of its winter suit is quite a tax on the fowl, and usually there is no production of eggs in the moulting season.

Training of Fowls.

There are some exhibitors at pc-1try shows who claim that is perfectly easy to train a bird to stand erect and be exhibited. The men that make this claim generally try to carry it out by practice. For weeks before they exhibit their fowls, they confine them in coops similar to the ones that are to be used in the exhibition. In feeding the birds in these coops, they place the food so high that the birds will have to reach for it. They claim that by this means they make it easier for the bird to stand erect when it is being

INTENSE HEAT PRODUCES PRECIOUS STONES.

Scientists Have Succeeded in Phick ing Real Diamonds and Rubles from the Crucible of the Furnace.

New Darger to the Heron. Surgeons have long been seeking for some material for sutures and ligatures which should be more satisfactory than those at present in use, which include catgut, kangaroo tenden, silk worm gut, horse hair and silver wire. Dr. Charles F. Kieffer has recently used and suggests in a medical journal that the tendons of the cranes and heron make excellent sutures and ligatures and seem to possess some advantages over the mater-

ials at present in use. 


