Czar to Call Peace Conference. The issuance of the call for the second Hague peare conference by the czar will be made with the full knowledge and consent of all the great pow-ers. The matter has been under aders. The matter has been unuer avisement and has been the subject of correspondence between the foreign office at St Petersburg and the formal of the powers and of the office at St Petersburg and the for-eign offices of the powers and of the United States ever since Russia con-sented to send-envoys to meet those of Japan, and it became practically certain that peace would be restored It is said here that it was a sugges-tion of President Roosevelt that the call should come from Russia

The American chief executive an-The American chief executive au-nounced his willingness to father the next conference which it is hoped will practically make a great war impos-sible in the auture, but, he expressed the opinion that it would be better that the czar who had called the first conference should take the initiative at this time. While no formal action has as yet been taken, I am assured that all the powers, including Japan, have signified their willingness to send delegates and that in most cases they will be invested with more com plete power than has ever been grant

The Cause of Pear Blight.

For ten years I have grown pears for market and have watched and studied the trees almost daily during that time, and I cannot agree with experiment station men and others as to the cause of pear blight. I cannot believe that pear blight is caused by bacteria or that a microbe has anything to do with it. An experiment station professor writing in "Country Life in America" recently went so far as to say that the pear blight microbe is in the nectar of the pear blossoms and is carried by bees from flower to flower. I think it is hardly possiblefor the nectar to be anything but pure when the blossoms open I think near blight is caused by conditions of soiland climate. On certain soils and elevations even in Illinois, pear trees are free from blight.






