## VICTORY FOR GOV. WARNER

### RAILROAD COMPANIES RESTORE DESIRED MILEAGE BOOK

#### Governor's Insistence Brought Rail- roads to Time.

The announcement by the Michigan railroads made Saturday that the interchangeable mileage book, to be torn on the trains, would again be placed on sale, scores another victory for Governor Warner in behalf of the public. It was a long and hard fought battle with technicalities, partial concessions and arguments on one side, and the governor, backed by the traveling men and business men, on the other, with "no compromise" as their motto.

The Pere Marquette system, headed by General Passenger Agent Harry Moeller, was with the governor in its fight for the restoration of the northern book system, the C P A book having been forced upon them against protests by the Central Traffic association.

At one stage of the game Moeller was in danger of losing his official scalp and was saved only owing to the fact that his side was victorious in the struggle.

#### Str. Fairbairn Safe.

Great anxiety was felt for the safety of the steamer Fairbairn, one of the Steel Trust boats reported missing in last week's great storm on Lake Superior, of which Lewis Vradenburg, of this place is an engineer. A letter from him to his mother, Mrs. A. L. Vradenburg, written December 1 from the Sea, says they are all right. After battling with the storm from Monday night till Friday morning they had just returned to the Sea for repairs. They lost their cargo 100 miles north of the Portage canal and for 21 hours did not dare to turn around to look for it. Early Friday morning they found it safe at White Fish point. They are now on their way to Duluth.

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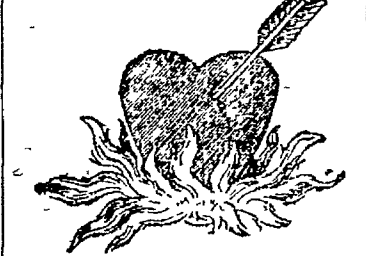
## ALL OUT OF SIGHT
