DESTROYED LIFE BY CHLOROFORM

MOORE OF LYON TOWNSHIP

His Own Hand Saturday Evening.

Monday of this week, the body of Everett Moore, who had been missing since the preceding Saturday, was recovered in one of the barns on the acre farm in Lyon township north west of this place, where he resided with his family, dead from chloroform, self-administered.

Late Saturday afternoon, Mr. Moore returned to Northville from Pontiac, where he had gone that morning after stopping at several places here, making a few purchases—including the instruments of death—and paying a bill or two, took his horse from the Pettin livery and went home. On arriving there he put out his horse driving to the barn by a different route than usual so that the family might not hear him and proceeded to put into execution the dreadful plan which he had prepared down to the minutest detail.

The unfortunate man had evidently determined to make his desperate deed a sure thing, as in addition to the large bottle that lay beside him containing a small quantity of the deadly fluid with which he had painlessly ended his existence, a two-ounce bottle of laudanum and a new revolver were found upon his person. He had climbed to the hayloft of the barn, crawled to a remote corner, and placing a large sponge in a pan partially filled with oats, had poured the chloroform upon it, covered himself and the pan with a heavy blanket and successfully carried out his dread design, with no necessity for recourse to the alternatives he had provided.

When disrobing the body to prepare it for burial Undertaker Porter, at this place, found in one of the pockets a clear he had himself given the young man who went directly to the former station on leaving the car Saturday evening. Mr. Porter noticed that he appeared depressed and that he had used salt at the time.

It is supposed that Mr. Moore's financial affairs, which appear to have been in bad shape, were responsible for the mental condition that led to such a fatal conclusion of his earthly interests.

The deceased was highly respected and was widely known among the stockmen of the state as a breeder of blooded farm stock, raising and owning many prize animals.

He was 35 years of age and is survived by his wife, four young children, his mother and two sisters. The funeral was held from the home yesterday under the auspices of the Masonic order.

PRIMARY ELECTION

Congressional Meeting in Detroit Tuesday.

A republican primary election meeting of that part of Wayne county in the second congressional district was held at the Griswold house in Detroit Tuesday afternoon. The city of Wyandotte and nearly all the townships were represented. The new primary law for nominating congressmen in this district and governor was explained and the idea was unanimously approved. Those present pledged themselves to aid in getting people familiar with the new law and to see that all the republicans were enrolled. No one seemed to think the new law was seriously complicated.

Several thousand circulars in the shape of a brief summary of the new law were distributed.

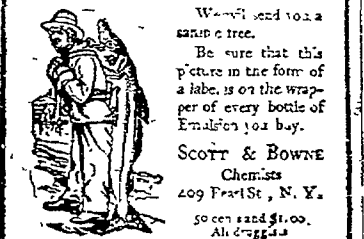

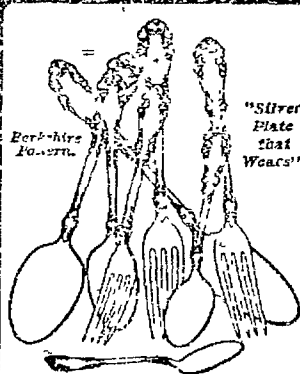
