ROWS BOUQUETS

IMPROVES MICHIGAN DAIRIES AND DEPARTMENT.

Should Have Butter Made
in Creameries.

Butter and cheesemakers held the Michigan Dairywomen's convention at Jackson last week, with several addresses. E. L. Burridge, official of Cleveland, O., said "I want the day when made in Michigan stamped on a cheese will be synonymous with the highest quality in the world. You may ask why I am interested in Michigan. If I were a citizen of Ohio I should want a citizen of Michigan in some of Michigan's dairies, and one of them is the dairy industry. You have a good dairy and food department in no state has better. You have good force of inspectors, but their number should be trebled. You have a governor who is a dairyman, and who looks after your interests, your association has good officers, your scores are averaged high. You have many good things in your favor, but we can lead you to death on rascally politicians."

The farmers of Michigan would be \$10,000,000 a year better off if all their butter was made in creameries, declared Colon C. Little, of Coopersville, president of the association. Michigan is producing in the neighborhood of 30,000,000 pounds of creamery butter and 60,000,000 pounds of dairy butter annually. If all the butter were manufactured in creameries the dairy butter would bring the cent a pound more.
