## ATTEMPTED SUICIDE

WILLIS PARKS TRIED TO DESTROY HIS LIFE.

Used Chloroform for That Purpose Sunday Night.

Willis Parks, a young man of this village, attempted to take his life by the chloroform method at the home of his father, George Parks, a few miles north and west of here Sunday night. His condition was discovered and Dr. Henry was summoned, the family meanwhile using every effort to rouse him from the deadly stupor pending the arrival of the doctor. His recovery was at first considered impossible but it is now believed that he will live.

The young man refused to give any explanation regarding his wish to destroy his life, and no reason is definitely known why he should have desired to do so. He has expressed himself as determined to "make it a sure thing next time."

He has been married but a short time, and with his wife was boarding at Mrs. Beulah Thompson's on north Center-street. Mrs. Parks had remained at their boarding place when the young man went to his father's place Sunday.

### DETROIT PEOPLE PIGGISH

Fill Suburban Cars and Make the Country People Stand.

The movement that has been started in Flint and Pontiac to do away with the packing of the suburban cars with city passengers is being strenuously agitated and it is to be hoped that some remedy can be devised for what is indisputably a rank injustice to passengers who pay to ride long distances on the cars and then are obliged to stand for miles, jostled and crowded by those who only pay five-cent fares. Hundreds of city people crowd on to the suburban cars and occupy the seats when they could just as well ride on the city cars, while those to whom the seats should rightfully belong are subjected to indignities, even, until well out of Detroit. It would really be in the interest of Detroit merchants to aid in the movement to do away with such a state of affairs as many country people are actually kept from trading in the city because they cannot stand the conditions under which they must get home with their purchases.

## Primary Election Law in Brief.

SUMMARY OF THE LAW COMPILED BY REPUBLICAN CONGRESSIONAL COMMITTEE.

Party Enrollment Urged As of Leading Importance at Spring Election.

The Primary Nominating Law passed by the Legislature of 1905 may at first seem a little complicated, but if the people actually favor direct nomination of Governor and Lieutenant-Governor, of Congressmen, of State Senators, of Members of the Legislature or of County-Officers, or any of those groups of officers, they can have it by performing the necessary preliminary work.

After the system is once adopted it will be easy in subsequent years for most of the work necessary for the first nomination will not need to be done again.

The only State officers which, under the law, may be nominated by direct vote, are Governor and Lieutenant-Governor.

### THE PROCEDURE IS AS FOLLOWS:

On the first Monday of April, 1906 (Town Meeting Day), a party enrollment will be had. At this enrollment every voter who desires to vote either for or against the proposition to nominate officers by direct vote, or who, if the direct voting system is adopted, desires to vote for any officer to be nominated under the direct primary, must enroll or register his name with the party to which he belongs. This enrollment is had in order that in subsequent primaries it may be known to which political party the voter belongs, and to prevent members of one political party from participating in the nomination of candidates for another party.

On the second Tuesday of June, 1906, a primary will be held to allow the people of the State to decide whether they will nominate Governor or Lieutenant-Governor by direct vote, and at the same time to vote for candidates for Governor and Lieutenant-Governor, and if a majority of the Republican votes cast in the State are in favor of direct nomination of Governor and Lieutenant-Governor, then the votes cast for these officers are counted and the candidate voted for at such primary on the second Tuesday in June receiving the most votes is the candidate of his party, providing that such candidate receives at least 10 per cent of the party vote cast at the primary.

The nomination of Congressman differs somewhat from the above method for Governor and Lieutenant-Governor, but the same plan for nominating the Congressman is followed as for the nomination of Members of the State Legislature and County Officers, and so an explanation of the procedure in reference to the nomination of Congressman applies to that of State Senators, Representatives and County Officers in their respective districts. It is as follows:

The enrollment of voters takes place on the first Monday in April, as has been explained with reference to Governor and Lieutenant-Governor. Then, after the enrollment and on the same day or at any time before 30 days prior to the second Tuesday in June, petitions signed by enrolled Republicans and consisting of not less than 20 per cent of the Republican vote cast in the district for Governor in 1904, asking that the question of direct primary for Congressman be submitted in June, must be presented to the Secretary of State. Upon filing such petition with the Secretary of State, a primary is called for the second Tuesday in June, 1906, being the same day that the people vote for Governor and Lieutenant-Governor. At such primary, every voter who was enrolled in April has the right, and it is his duty, to vote for or against the proposition to nominate Congressman by popular vote.

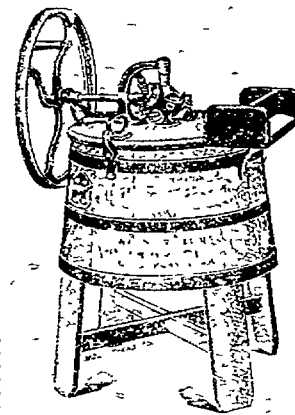
If a majority of the Republicans vote in favor of direct nomination of Congressman at the June election, that method is adopted, and on the first Tuesday in September, 1906, and every two years thereafter, will be held the primary for nominating Congressman by direct vote, at which primary the candidate receiving the most votes is the choice of his party.

At the June and September primaries only such as were enrolled in April as Republicans can vote for the Republican candidates, and only such as were enrolled as Democrats can vote for the Democratic candidates.

If the direct primary for nominating Congressman is adopted in June, then any man desiring to be a candidate of his party must present to the Secretary of State a petition signed by a number of the voters
