SUMMARY OF THE LAW COMPILED BY REPUB-LICAN CONGRESSIONAL COMMITTEE.

Party Enrollment Urged As of Leading Importance at Spring Election.

The Primary Nominating Law passed by the Legislature of 1905 may at first seem a little complicated, but it the people actually favor direct nomination of Got ernor and Lieutenant-Governor, of Congressmen, of State Senators, of Members of the Legislature or of County-Officers, or any of those groups of officers, they can have it by performing the necessary prelimi-

After the system is once ad med in and be casy in subsequent years, for most or the work necessary for the first nomination will not need to be done again.

The only State officers which, under the law," may be nominated by direct vote, are Governor and Lieutenant-Governor.

THE PROCEDURE IS AS FOLLOWS:

On the first Monday of April, 1906 (Town Meeting Day), a party enjollment will be had. At this corollment every voter who desires to vote either for or against the proposition to aquinate officers by direct vote, or who, if the direct voting system is adopted, 5 desires to vote for any officer to be nominated under the direct primary, must entoil or register his name with the party to which he belongs. This cirollment is had in order that in subsequent primaries it may be known to which political party the voter belongs, and to prevent members of one political party from partidipating in the nomination of candidates for another

On the second Incoday of June, 1906, & primary will be led to allow the people of the State in decide whether they will nonmate Governor or Licaterint Governor by direct vote, and at the same trace to vote for candidates for Governor and Lieuten int Governor, and if a migority of the Republican votes cist in the State are instance of direct nonnitation of Governor and I contonant Covernor, then the votes cast for these offices are counted and the candidate voted for at such primary on the second Tuesday in June receiving the most votes is the candidate of his party, providing that such condidate receives at least 10 per cent of the party vote east at the primary

The nomination of Congressman differs somewhat from the above method for Governor and Lieutenant-Governor, but the same plan for nominating the Congressman is followed as for the nomination of Members of the State Legislature and County Officers, and so an explanation of the procedure in reference to the nomination of Congressman applies to that of State Senators, Representatives and County Officers in their respective districts. It is as follows:


The enrollment of voters takes place on the first Monday in April, as has been explained with reference to Governor and Lieutenant-Governor. Then, after the enrollment and on the same day or at any stime before 30 days prior to the second Tuesday in June, petitions signed by enrolled Republicans and consisting of not less than 20 per cent-of the Repubhean vote cast in the district for Governor in 1904, asking that the question of direct primary for Congressman be submitted in June, must be presented to the Secretary of State. Upon filing such petition with the Secretary of State, a primary is called for the second Tuesday in June, 1906, being the same day that the people vote for Governor and Lieutenant-Governor. At such primary, every voter who was enrolled in April has the right, and ir is his duty, to vote for or against the proposition to nominate Congressman by popular vote.

If a majority of the Republicans vote in favor of direct nomination of Congressman at the June election, that method is adopted, and on the first Tuesday in September, 1906, and every two years thereafter, will be held the primary for nominating Congressman by direct vote; at which primary the candidate receiving the most votes is the choice of his party.

At the June and September primaries only such as were enrolled in April as Republicans can vote for the Republican candidates, and only such as were enrolled as Democrats can vote for the Democratic can-

If the direct primary for nominating Congressman candidate of his party must present to the Secretary is adopted in June, then any man desiging to be a of State a petition signed by a number of the voters
