ELY WAS ELECTED

WON SUPERVISORSHIP by FORTY MAJORITY.

Enrollment Feature of New Law Worked Like a Charm.

The township election Monday was rather of a strenuous affair, the interest being centered on the supervisorship. Landlord Will Ely finally won out by forty majority over Mr. Sessions. The balance of the Republican ticket was elected by majorities ranging from 300 in the case of Jas. Huff, (albion) for treasurer, down to 251.

There were 540 votes cast 407 being straight Republican, 131 Democratic and two "no choice."

There were 430 voters who enrolled and 110 who didn't, mostly Democrats. 312 signed the "Warren for governor" nomination petition and 320 the "Congressional" petition, the difference being the result of the Warren blanks being late in getting to polling place.

Dr. Frank Carrothers did the enrolling act in an elegant manner. Earle Miller handled the petitions and Hoyt Woodman passed out and filled out the enrolling slips. Everything went like clock work and the enrolling feature was commented upon by the Republicans, and some of the Democrats as well, as one of the best features of the new primary law. Carrothers, Miller and Woodman did elegant work and were good and tired when the polls closed. S. J. Lawrence had general supervision of Governor Warren's petitions and was busy at the polls all day.

The machine was used in the vote for township officers and five minutes after the polls closed the result was known all over town.

The constitutional amendment was carried by a vote of 287 yes to 119 no.


