YOUNG AMERICA GETS TO GRINDING MONDAY.

THINGS ARE BOOMING

STIMPSON SCALE CO., WORKS
BUSY PLACE

Will be in Full Swing by September 12.

A busy scene is presented these days at the plant of the Stimpson Scale company here where Foreman C. A. Gardner and twenty-nine men are busy as bees putting the new buildings in shape and installing the machinery for the Northville plant. Seventeen of the twenty-nine men are from Milan, the other twelve being from this place.

The plant at Milan is being dismantled and the machinery shipped here as fast as possible.

Superintendent Gay informs the Record that he expects to have the plant here in full operation within a couple of weeks.

The long brick building will be used for the manufacture and storage of the scales, the former shoe factory will be utilized for the painting and finishing and the building formerly used for offices and shipping by the Hall-Carr people will be used for the same purpose by the Stimpson people.

The present scarcity of houses will somewhat hinder the new men from moving in here as promptly, as they would like but this will satisfactorily adjust itself in a short time.

The new addition to the Bell Foundry is going up as fast as labor can accomplish it and when it is all complete Mr. Harmon expects to put on a dozen new hands there to take care of more of the Scale Co's. castings.

Death of O. M. Whipple.

Oscar M. Whipple a former prominent resident of Novi, where he passed nearly his entire life, died Sunday at his home in Detroit.

Mr. Whipple was in the lumber business at Novi for many years and was a member and constant attendant of the Novi Baptist church, which he served in many responsible capacities for a long term of years with the highest efficiency.

He leaves a widow, an adopted son, George, of Detroit and two others, Orlando of Northville and Gilbert of Novi.

The funeral, which was private, was held in Detroit Tuesday, with burial in Woodlawn cemetery.

WAYNE COUNTY POLITICAL TALK.

Karl D. Keyes of Olivet, who has a sure thing for the republican nomination for state senator for the Barry-Canton district, announces that his first choice for United States senator is Charles L. Townsend. Frank Bennett, a prominent Jackson manufacturer, Warren Parker, Frank Braddish and Alva Stelm of Lenawee have also announced their candidacies to the Legislature for Townsend and for Senator. In Wayne county the Townsend candidates are Cass Benton, W. L. Bust, S. J. Colby and Joe Wilson. The balance of the forty-seven odd candidates in Wayne are all for Mr. McMullen.

The voters of Wayne county who want to know who is running for office can find out by searching for pictures on telegraph and telephone poles. However, a candidate who is real earnest in seeking votes usually has enterprise enough to use a newspaper.

"Billy" Dever has opposition for the republican nomination for sheriff in Norris Hollister. However Billy looks like a winner, so his friends all say. Sheriff Burns will have no opposition on the democratic side of the house.

Walter Cole, O. F. Gully and Otto Stoll are all republican candidates for the \$2,500 register of deeds job which carries with it thirty odd clerkships at \$1,200 to \$1,300 each. Frank Esper is the lone democratic candidate. Who wants a job?

Michael Burke will lock horns with O. F. Hunt for the nomination of prosecuting attorney on the republican ticket. Mr. Hunt has the advantage of being one of the "ins" and is again likely to win. George Robinson, the man who whistles and Dick Lawson are the democrat candidates to beat the winner.

Jas. E. Mead and Morgan Parker are prominently mentioned for the republican nomination of Coroners.

Arthur E. Schretter, for some years in Judge of Probate Durfee's office, is candidate for state senator against Senator Fred Martindale. Schretter announces himself for Charlie Townsend for U. S. senator.

Otto Stoll, republican candidate for register of deeds was in Northville Wednesday night and made a host of new acquaintances that will do him great good at the Sept. 8 primaries. In speaking of Stoll yesterday one of Northville's prominent republicans said: "I am one of the fellows who think these county

offices should be passed around. Mr. Klingeley made a good a register of deeds as the county ever had and he stepped aside after four years for Mr. Gully and its no more than fight now that he should step aside in the same manner for some other just as good a man."

It is understood here that "Pop" Goodell and John McMullen have withdrawn from the Representative race, leaving James Wilson of Canton and Rep. Cass Benton of this place alone on the track. Mr. Benton's friends now claim he already has pledged enough to more than hold the town.




Whitney's Opera House—Detroit.
