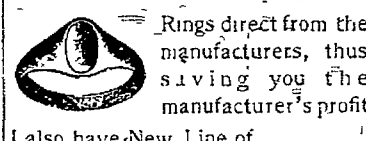

WIDER TIRE WAGONS. Narrow Tires to Be Kept Off State Roads.

State Highway Commissioner Ely states that a bill is to be presented to the next legislature to prohibit the use of heavily loaded narrow-tired wagons on county roads of macadam and gravel. Over 100 highway commissioners declared in favor of this move and are receiving the hearty backing of the highway department of the state. The commissioners also urge that a law be passed limiting the size of loads on narrow-tired rigs, if it was possible to secure more strict legislation.
