RACHEL RODGERS DIED SUNDAY A. M.

She Had Been Ill for Several Weeks Past.

Miss Rachel S. Rodgers, who had been ill the past few weeks, died at her home on north Center street Sunday morning.

She was born in Novi township, one mile north of this village, Sept. 24, 1835, where she lived until ten years ago, when with her only sister, Harriett, who died five years ago, and foster brother, Abraham H. Piper, moved to Northville. Wm. Mosher of this place was also a foster brother.

Although Miss Rodgers had been unable to go farther than her own doorstep for the past two years she was never discouraged, but looked on the bright side of life, and was as cheerful and entertaining as ever. A short time ago she improved so rapidly that her many friends felt she would be able to get out among them again but about two weeks before her death she suffered another stroke of paralysis and from that time failed until she died.

Her last years were made bright by the fact of the kindness and care of Mr. Piper. No son could have been more devoted to the comfort of a mother than he to her.

The funeral was held from the house Tuesday afternoon. Rev. W. G. Steppens of Fowlerville officiated, assisted by Rev. J. W. Turner. The body was placed in the Oakwood vault from whence the burial will take place in about four weeks, according to the last wishes of the deceased.

PRESIDENT OF LELAND STANFORD

DR. DAVID STARR JORDAN VISITS NORTHVILLE.

Came to See U. S. Fish Hatchery; Talked to High School.

It was fortunate for the High school that Dr. David Starr Jordan, President of Leland Stanford University, California, accepted the invitation of Superintendent Clark, while in Bay City last week attending a session of the International Fisheries Commission, to visit the government hatchery here, as thereby it was made possible for the school to hear a ten-minute talk by one of the noted educators, not only of the United States, but of the world.

Dr. Jordan and Prof. E. E. Prince of Ottawa, Canada, the commissioners of the International Fisheries Commission; Dr. Barton W. Evermann of Washington, D. C. and Seymour Bower, Supt. of the Michigan Fish Commission, were guests of Mr. and Mrs. Clark at luncheon on Friday of last week.

Dr. Jordan is recognized as the most noted ichthyologist in the world and Prof. Prince and Dr. Evermann are close seconds, the writings of Jordan and Evermann being authority on the subject of ichthyology.

These men were here looking over the government plant, but nothing much in the way of fish propagation could be shown them at this time of the year, except small-mouth black bass, of which they saw a plenty. Quoting Mr. Bower, he said, "I have here seen the largest nest of small-mouth bass fry that I ever cast my eyes upon."

Messrs. Jordan, Prince and Evermann's stay in town was short as they continued on the 2:18 p. m. train to Toledo, Sandusky and Cleveland where other meetings were to be held in connection with the International Commission.

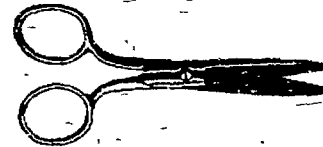

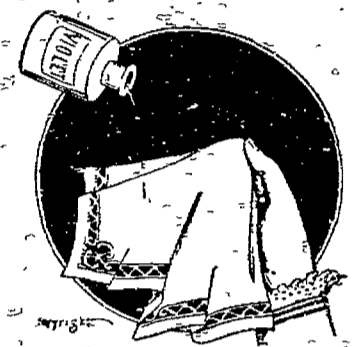

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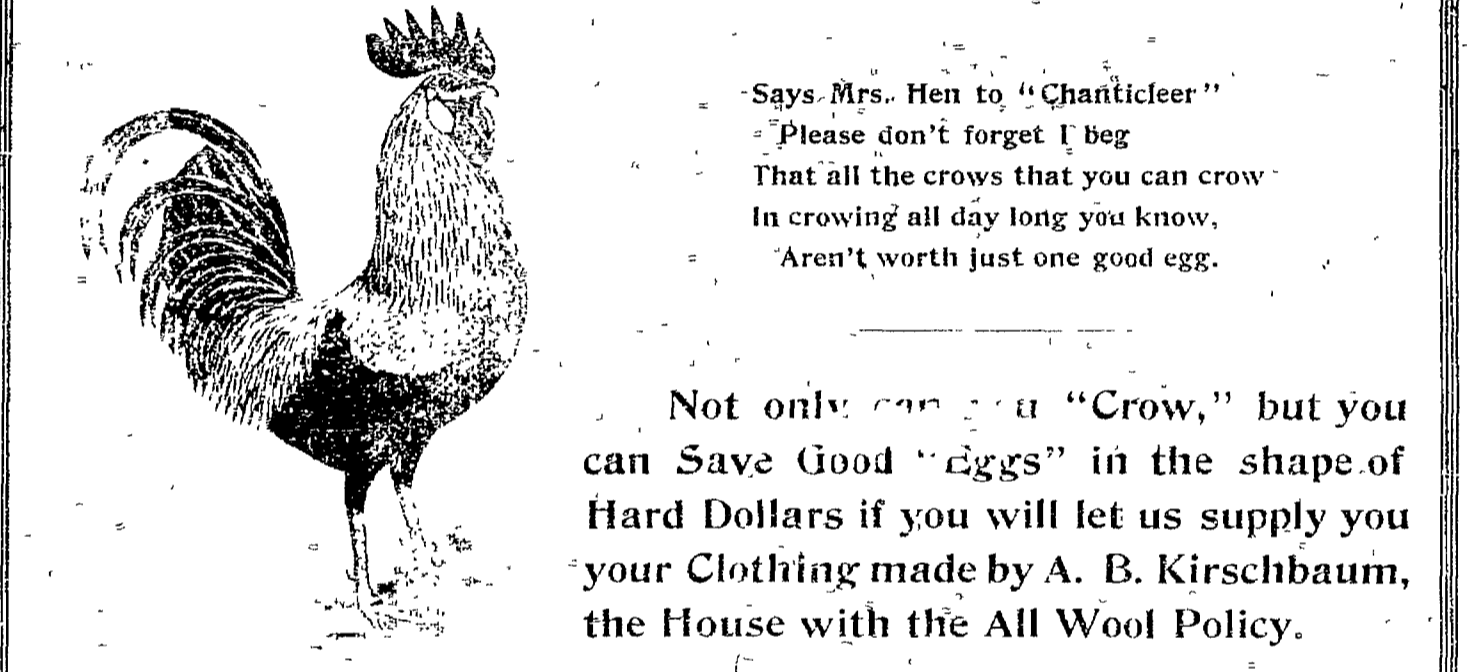
