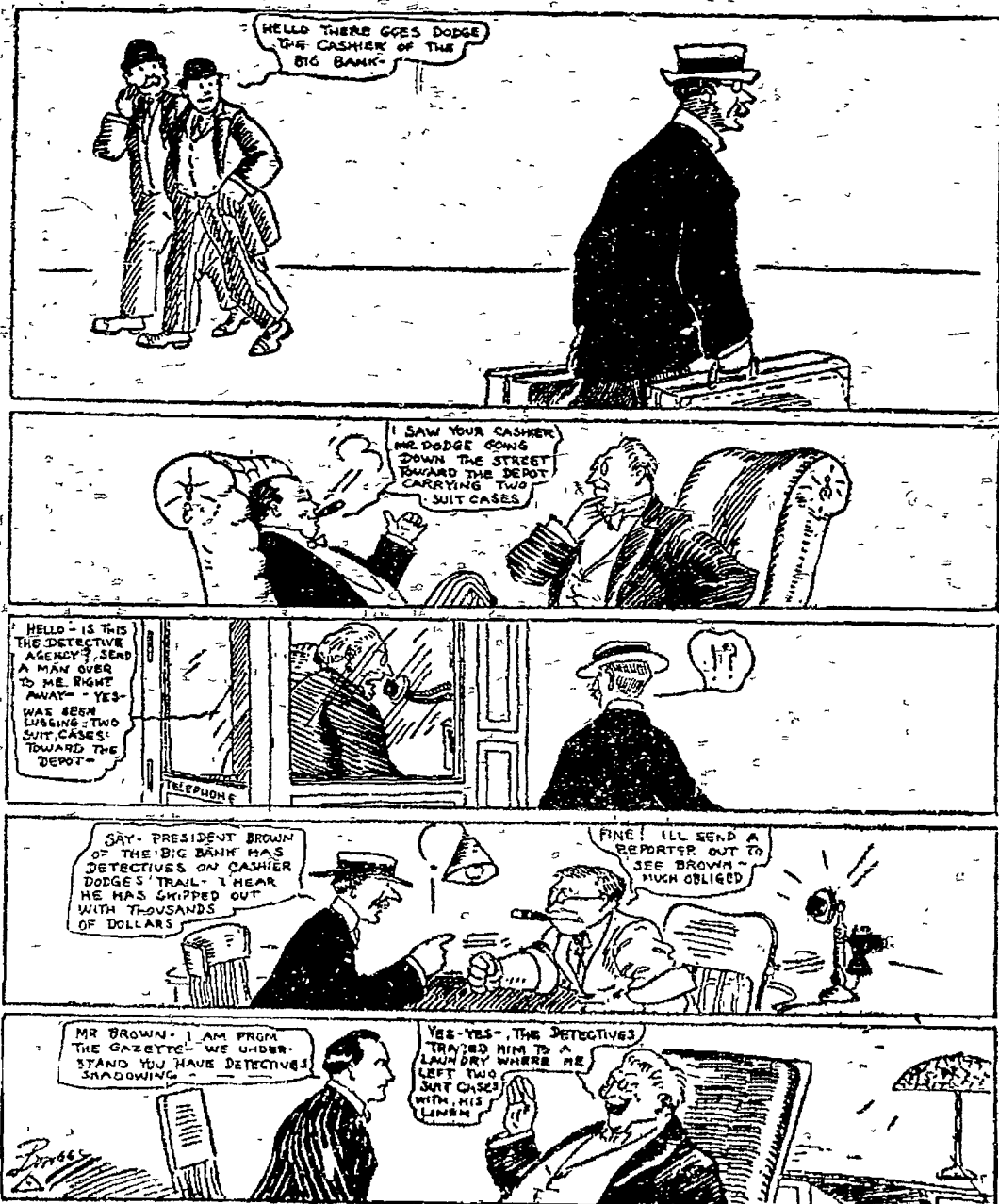

Geo Vandecarr of Plymouth discovered it and later it was taken to Schrader's undertaking establishment at Plymouth.

The body was lying close to the water but not in it and would about the arms was a dog chain to which was attached a fish spear.

The post mortem at Plymouth yesterday, seemed to show that death resulted from drowning and bruises about the head gives rise to the suggestion that his fall in the creek may have been brought about by a scrap of some kind, and got far enough into the water while unconscious to smother.

The coroner's jury brought in a verdict that he came to his death by a blow on the head by unknown parties.

Gordon's home was at Milan and he had been at work on farms about the Mill for four weeks and made his home with his aunt, a Mrs. Edmonds. He was about nineteen years old.

Gordon called at Boston's store about 9:00 o'clock Tuesday morning and said then he was going fishing. He was in Northville the Fourth and told the Edmonds' that night that he was in a fight up here, but as yet no trace of any scrap in Northville on the Fourth can be learned of.

Every Optometrist shall display his Certificate of Registration in a conspicuous place in the principal office wherein he practices Optometry, and whenever practicing the said profession of Optometry outside or away from his said principal office or place of business, he MUST deliver to each customer or person so fitted with glasses a memorandum of purchase which shall contain his signature, home and postoffice address, and the number of his Certificate of Registration.

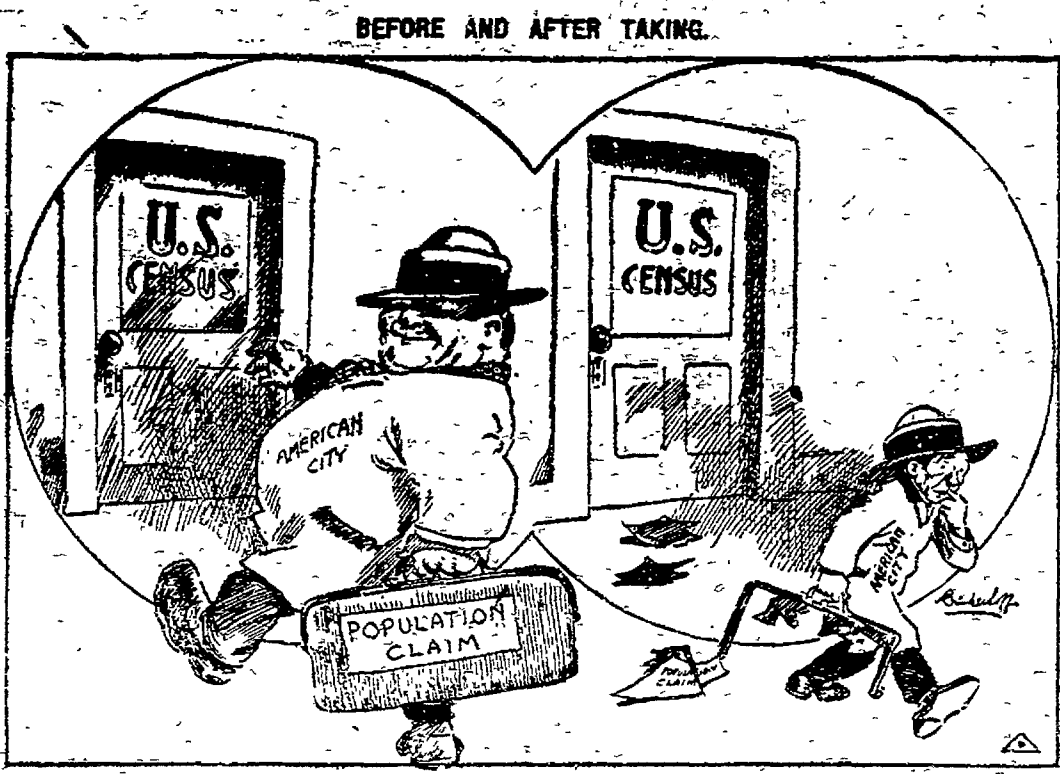
