ELECT GOVERNOR AND TWO CON GRESSMEN; LEGISLATURE IS . ALSO DEMOCRATIC.

NEW: GOVERNOR IS SON OF THE LAST DEMOCRAT WHO HELD - THAT OFFICE

Legislature Will Elect's Man to Succeed United States Senator Hale} Leaders Are Amazed.

Maine, which has been solidly Re publican for 30 years without a break in all that time, elected a Democratic governor by about 8,500 plurality, sent three Democratic lepresentatives to congress, leaving but one Republican representative from the state, and also elected a Democratic legislature to fill the vacancy occasioned by the expiration of the term or Senator Eugene

It was a landslide, sweeping every thing before it. Gor. Bert M. Fer noll, the Republican candidate, who won his election two years ago by about 7,000 plurality and whose administration has been one of pros ministration has been one of pros-ress, has some down in defeat, the first Republican candidate for gover-nor to be defeated since 1822. His opponent, and the man who will, be the next governor of Maine, is Col. Frederick W. Plaisted, mayor, of Au-gusts, son of the last Democratic, gov-entor of Maine, Gen. Harris M. Plais-ied, whose election was the ro-fured, whose election was due to a fu-sion of the Greenback and Democratic vote in 1852.

The Republicans have only saved one congressman out of the four. Asher C Hinds, clerk at the speaker's table in Washington and parliamentarian of the national house, has apparently been elected in Tom Reed's old duried, the first, by a narrow margin. His opponent, William M. Pernell, is likely, to be named Democratic sens tor, from Maine if he has failed of election to congress. One famous cook who was an artist in canning peaches always prepared them the night before and let them stand cor-

Cucumber Catsup. Choose fresh green cucumbers of the size and quality used for slicing. Reject those that are at all bitter, peel and grate them. Put into a bag and drain them, or a nieve may be used. To every quart of pulp add half a cupful of grated horesradish and half a cupful of grated onlone, two table-spoonfule of sugar, one tablespoonful of white pepper and two tablespoon-fuls of salt. Add a quart of cold Mer vinegar and seal in air tight jars. = Plum Catsup.

Boil the plums with as little water as possible until soft rub through a colander and to every five pounds of pulp, add two and a half pounds of sugar, a cupful of cider vinegar and a level tablespoonful each of cinnamon and cloves. Cook half an hour, stir ring steadily, and seal boiling bot This is especially fine with beef, veal or ham.

To Pickle Plums. Gather green plums before they begin to turn; make a pickle of mustard seed and salt with vinegar enough to cover the fruit. Boil and pour over the plams three mornings in succession. They may be used in place of




