

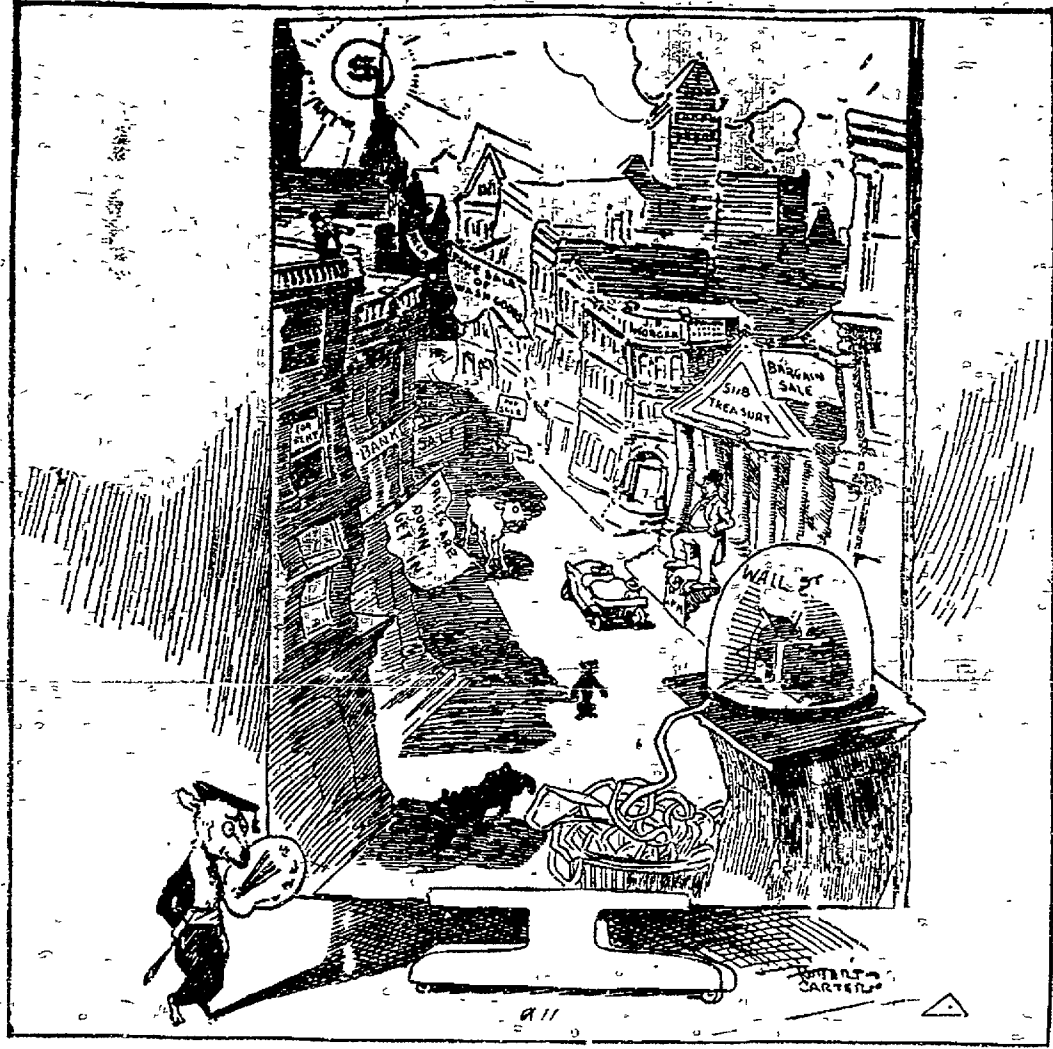

## Rachel's Birthplace.

The Swiss, it is said, are about to erect a monument to commemorate Rachel's birth in their territory. She was born in the Golden Sun Inn at Munt in the Canton of Aargau, her father being described in the parish register as "un homme qui colportait." He had been educated to be a rabbi, but had become a peddler, and drove across Europe selling soap, ribbons, lace, and popular illustrated almanacs. His cart contained his family as well as his wares, and it needed to be a large one to do so, for his wife, Esther Haya Felix, bore him no fewer than sixteen children, though only six of them lived to grow up. The fulness of his reason was apparently one of the reasons why he gave up peddling and settled at Lyons, where he became a teacher of German, while his wife dealt in ladies' cast off clothing.

PICKS CHARLIE GARDNER AS A RICH FIND.

Star's Northville Man in One of His New Playlets.

Last winter, when the "Empress of Ogg" was staged here by local talent, H. C. Chevalier, one of the owners, was attracted by the acting of Charlie Gardner, who took part in the show. Charlie will star in a beautiful rural comedy entitled, "Them Henderson Kids," which was written by Henry Court, the author of "The Witch of Endor," "When Smith Met Smith," "The Empress of Ogg" and other successes, and it fits him like a glove. Six weeks have already been devoted to rehearsals and several more weeks of steady grind will be put in before the show opens.

It has already been booked in Saginaw, Bay City, Grand Rapids and then Chicago and under the able management of Mr. Chevalier, its success is assured.

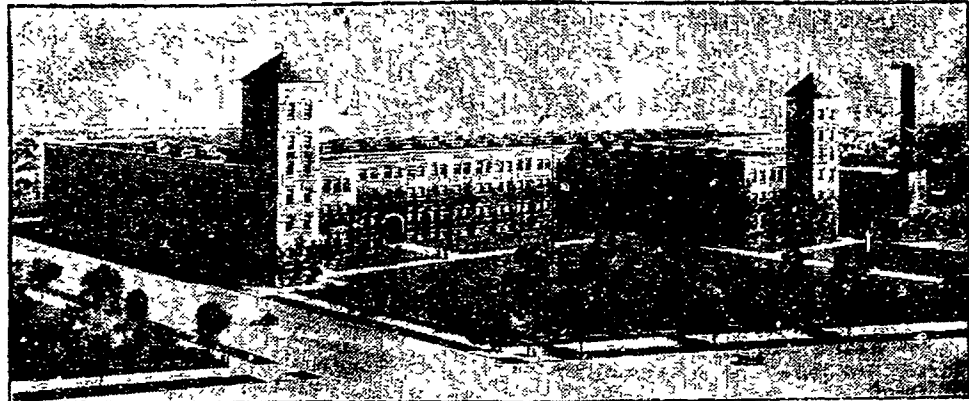
