EDISON LIGHTS EXPENSIVE

Not Looked Upon as Good Proposition for Northville.

The mass meeting held last week to consider the Edison Electric Co.'s proposition was fairly well attended, but the proposition to furnish juice to Northville and Northville people did not seem to create any favorable impression, either with the council or the citizens. Supt. Wilkinson figures that it would cost the village upwards of six hundred dollars more to light the streets and that seventy-five per cent of Northville people have to pay more for lighting their homes than at present. The Edison people would probably be willing to pay \$40,000 for the Northville plant. They were asked to give a meter rate for the juice to be supplied to the village, but as yet have not done so.

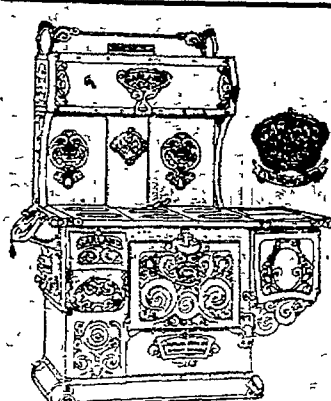

THE PRIMARIES TO BE MARCH 1

John Harper The Logical Candidate of the Comby for Auditor.

As it is settled, at last, that the primaries for Circuit Judges and County Auditor will be held on Wednesday, March first, these are all important offices and the voters should see to it that the proper candidates are put in nomination upon the respective tickets.

For County Auditor, a canvass among the voters of the county, outside the city, shows a remarkable unanimity of opinion in favor of John Harper. So far as we have been able to ascertain, all those who served as supervisors with Mr. Harper, and who are in a position to know of his fitness, are with him to a man.

While a resident of Detroit and supervisor by virtue of his office as alderman, as chairman of the Board of Supervisors, he treated the county members with a fairness such as they have seldom experienced from other chairmen and showed qualities that make it the voter's duty to himself to support Mr. Harper at both the primaries and election.

As to his qualifications for the office, probably no one is better qualified to speak than County Auditor Robertson. In an interview in one of the Detroit papers the other evening appeared the following:

"I have known John Harper for many years," said County Auditor Robertson, "this morning agent the approaching primaries, in which Mr. Harper is a candidate for the re-public nomination to succeed Auditor Buhner. In his public career as alderman, President of the Common Council, chairman of the franchise committee, member of the important committee on liquor regulations, chairman of the Board of Supervisors and member of other very important committees, he has shown the stuff of which he is made and demonstrated his ability to well fill the office to which he aspires. Courteous and affable at all times, always ready to do a favor which means a personal sacrifice, he never allows his affability to interfere with the duty that he owes the public. His character, honest, fearless and able, has shown that he possesses the firmness to say 'No,' when 'No' should be said, as it often must be said by a County Auditor, while his courteous manner and even temper, his willingness to put himself out at any time, will assure the public of the proper treatment that they are entitled to expect from a public official. There is no one, of whom I can think, who better meets the requirements of the office of Auditor than Mr. Harper and, from my long acquaintance with him, I can safely say that the public will not be disappointed if they nominate and elect him."

Auditor Buhrer Deserves Another Term.

In the one term which Mr. Buhrer has had as County Auditor he has performed prodigies of economy. He has played an important part in reducing the expenses of Wayne County. He has been extravagance as nature abhors a vacuum. In this he has frequently forfeited the patience of those who had bills for the county to pay. But through it all he has surely retained the gratitude of the county taxpayers.

He has swept away, too, many of the political alliances and conspiracies and brawls with which the office of the County Auditor was cluttered up when Mr. Buhrer took hold. Mr. Buhrer, as might have been expected, figured that politics means loss of time and loss of money. So he cleaned the political house with his characteristic thrift and businessness.
