## TOWNSHIP CANDIDATES NOT NUMEROUS

### FLOYD NORTROP FOR SUPERVISOR IS SURE

### May Be Contest On the Treasurership Though.

The Township caucuses promise to be very tame this year and in all probability there will be little or no opposition though Fred Toussy's friends say he may be a candidate for the treasurership against Marvin Sloan, who announced his candidacy some time ago and whose friends thought would have no opposition. Toussy could get the clerkship on a silver platter but he may not want it. It is also announced that Will Cattermole will be a candidate for the treasurership and in all probability that part of the ticket may bring forth an interesting contest.

However the Democrats think they are entitled to some place on the town ticket and have estimated that if their candidate for clerk, W. L. Tinham, could be endorsed by the Republicans that they would in turn endorse the other Republican nominees by leaving the balance of their ticket blank.

Floyd Northrop will not take the nomination again. Floyd has made a good official and the party would doubtless tender it to him on a gilded server. If he wanted it, Judd Lanning, has now announced his candidacy for the office and to all appearance he will have no opposition in the Republican caucus to succeed Northrop.

Jesse Clark will be candidate again for Highway Commissioner and will have no opposition. Jesse is getting to be a good road builder, the only fault found with him is that he doesn't get busy early enough in the spring with the big scraper. Other wise he can't beat it, and has about all the other towns in Wayne and Oakland, Farmington excepted, beat by many miles.

The Republican caucus is called for Saturday afternoon at the city hall and the Democrats will pull theirs off Monday evening at the same place.

### Passed Away Yesterday Morning at Her Home.

Mrs. Charles Van Valkenburg, who has been ill with consumption for several years, passed away at her home on Rogers street early yesterday morning. She had been confined to the house nearly all winter but was able to sit up part of the time. Everything that loving hands could do was done for her comfort and with the one sin in view, that of restoring her to health, but it was of no avail.

The deceased was married to Chas. Van Valkenburg about twenty-five years ago and to them were born two sons, who, with the husband and aged mother, survive her.

Mrs. Van Valkenburg had a very quiet, unassuming way which won her many friends who will miss her. The funeral will be held from the home at 2:30 p. m. Sunday.

## FARMINGTON NEWS.

Solomon S. Heberling, a highly respected citizen of this place, died at his home early Monday morning of heart disease, after a lingering illness of several weeks. Mr. Heberling was born in Fremont, Ohio, 76 years ago and came to this place about six years ago. He leaves a wife and five married children, three sons at Detroit, one daughter at Jackson, and one daughter who, with her husband, lived with her parents. The funeral was held Wednesday afternoon and was largely attended.

Charles Grantham, aged fifty-three years, living in this village, was struck by a D. U. R. car Monday afternoon and so badly injured that he died a few hours later at Harper hospital, Detroit. Mr. Grantham was section hand and was at work on the tracks about 3 o'clock, when a passenger car and a gravel car approached him from opposite directions. He apparently became confused and stepped in front of the gravel car. His leg and hip were broken and his head crushed. He was taken to the hospital immediately. He is survived by a wife but had no family. The funeral was held from his late home Thursday afternoon Rev. G. E. Gullen officiating.

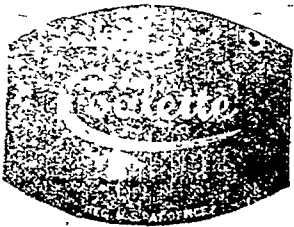
