



RESUMABLY everybody knows by this time that there is a standing offer of \$400 in cash for the man, woman, boy or girl who finds the nest of a wild pigeon (ectopistes migratori us), etherwise known as the passenger pigeon, and finds with it the nestling birds. In order to get the reward the person who makes the discovery must leave the nest and the birds unmolested and prove the truth of it by making a report and giving the scientists an opportunity to verify the case.

Magazine and newspaper articles literally by the thousands have been written about the disappearance of the wild pigeons, which once, as it is always put, "darkened the sun with their flights." The flighters of the biological survey in Washington are specially interested in the subject of the disappearance of this hird of passage from its wild haunts. Por years it has been hoped that nesting pairs might be found in some part of the country and that with proper profection the bird might be restored in part at least to its place

in harrie.


