Mr. and Mrs. Wm. Osband of Ypsilanti passed their 50th wedding anniversary on Monday of this week. Owing to Mrs. Osband's ill health no formal observance of the day was made.

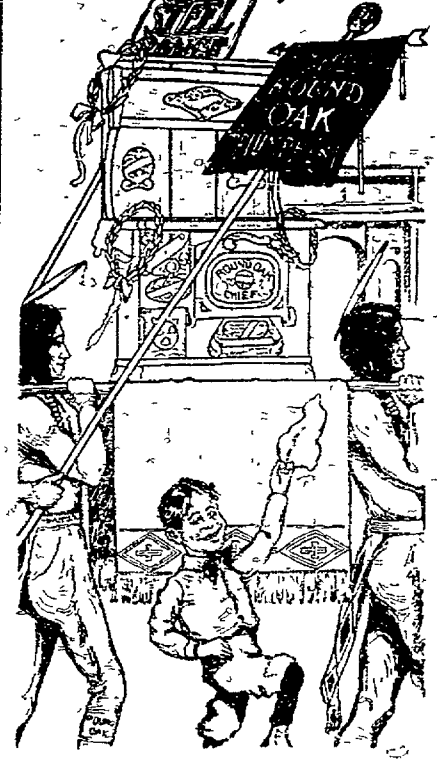

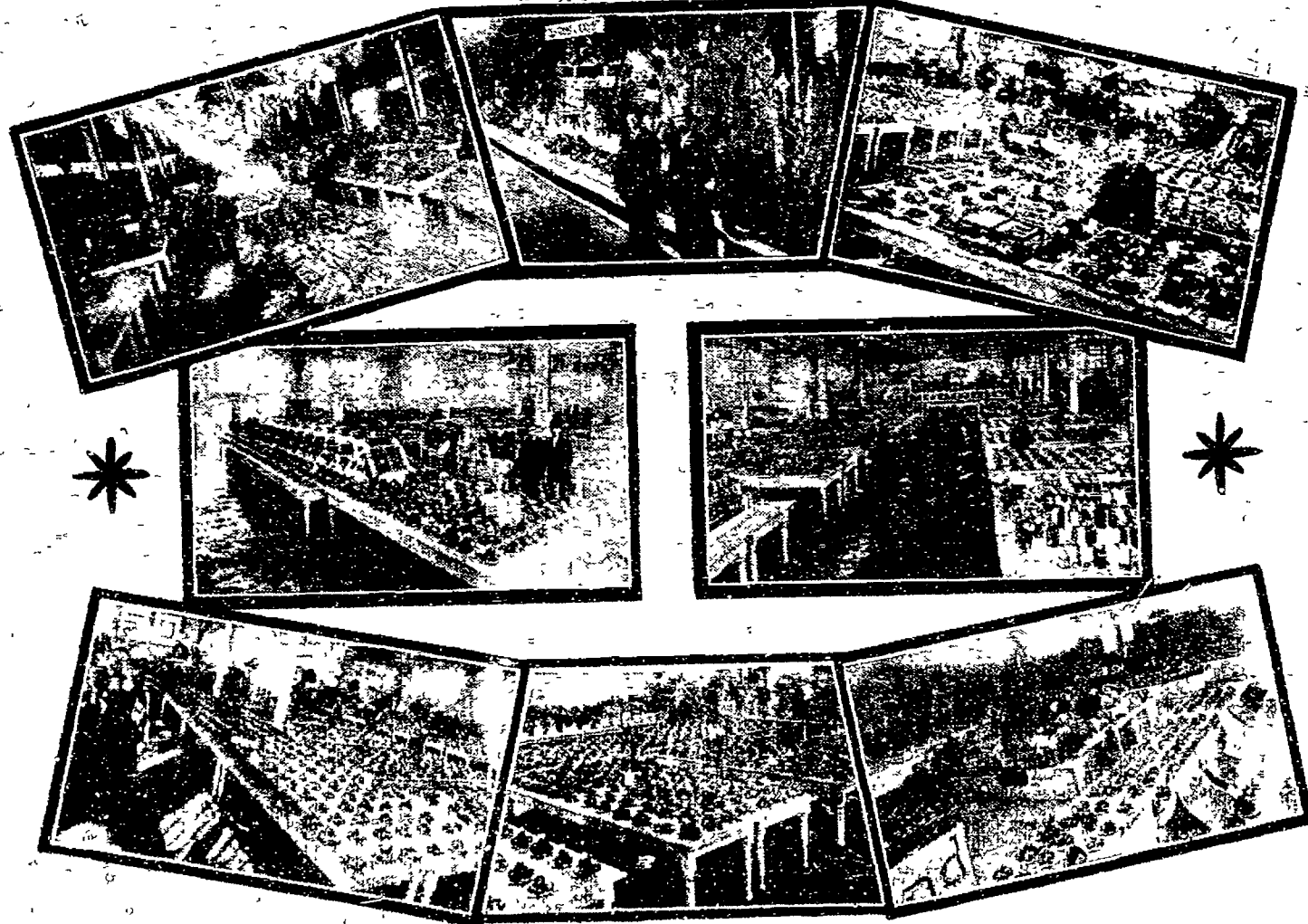
