



FEWER STORKS IN ALSACE

System of Registration is Being Tried to Learn About Migratory Habits.

Every year the number of storks to be seen in Alsace becomes less. Of the four nests perched on the big chimneys or the old roots of Strass burg, only one has been occupied this

In many of the villages the great migrators have ceased for a long time to relieve the laudscape, and it seems only a cuestion of time when the stork in Alsace will be a memory Various are the causes assigned for this detertion—the draining of the marshes, the multiplication of telephone and telegraph wires and the smoke from factory chimneys,

In Germany for the better study of storks there has been created a sort of service in connection with the Education Department which tends to set up an 'etat civil' for each bild, dr. in other words, to reguler them after the manner which obtains for citizens

CRAB'S WALK OF 98 MILES

Homing Instinct is Shown by Some Recent Experiments In , England.

Some remarkably interesting details regarding the movements and the homing instinct of the edible crab were presented to the Eastern Sea Fisheries Committee: During the past two years Fishery_Inspector H. Donnison has been carrying out investigations on behalf of the committee, and the results of his work cannot fail to be of considerable use to those concerned in biological research

in the course of an exhaustive re nort he stated that between July, and September, 1910, nearly two thousand crabs were captured, and after being abeled were again set free along the Norfolk and Lincolnshire coasts. The crabs had recently cast their shells, and new-ones were then in process of hardening.

Rewards were paid to fishermen upon returning the crabs when recaptured. They were returned to the sea at varying distances from the shore, and up to the present 21 per cent of the labeled crustaceans had been recaptured and full data tabulated.

With regard to the Norfolk crabs liberated in the places from which they were originally obtained, fiftytwo were recaptured within one mile of their first home, but one traveled as far as Flamborough Head, a distance of ninety-eight statute miles Nearly tores hundred had traveled only three or four miles from where ther were originally taked. LEGISLATURES MUST CONCUR

Thirteen States Can Defeat the Amend ment Which Has Been Approved by Congress-Why German Float Caused Anxiety.

By GEORGE CLINTON. Washington.-It is evident from what the leaders of the movement in congress say, that the battle for the amendment of the Constitution by pro-

viding for popular election of senators is far from ended. Both houses of congress have passed a resolution submitting the question to the states, but this; It is recognized in Washington, is only the beginning

In order that this amendment to the Constitution may have force and effect, t must be ratified formally by the legislatures of three-fourths of the states. There are forly-eight states in the Union, and so thirty-six of them must take affirmative action before the amendment becomes effective. Thir-teen states can defeat the amendment "vetoing" it or by declining

The friends of the constitutional amendment for the election of senaors by the people direct instead of by the state legislatures will keep up an organization and use its influence to get the matter promptly before the legislative bodies of the different states as soon as they meet. Georgia will hold a legislative session in the fall, and the majority of the states will have sessions in Januars. of the states in which the legislature meets biennially cannot take up the extra sessions natter unless ara called, until eighteen months' from

Thetis Will Protect Them.

Despite the awful slaugh-ter of the scabirds by the feather hunters, it is believed there are enough birds left to restore the feathered flocks to something like their original numbers, provided protection can be systematically enforced. The government recently has been very much interested in the preservation of bird life in all parts of its domain. During the Roosevelt and Tatt admin istrations there have been set aside particular reservations on the Atlentic and Pacific coasts and in the Gulf of Mexico, and there, under proper government espionage, the illegal killing of seabirds has been stopped, and the gulls, the terns, the ibises, the spoonbilis, the flamingos and the other birds gradually are coming

It is estimated that on Laysan is land and the reefs adjoining it there are at present about 1,000,000 birds, ranging in species from the little mil ler bird, which is of an interesting habit of life, to the great man-of-war bird, which follows ships for hundreds of miles over the trackless waters o

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


