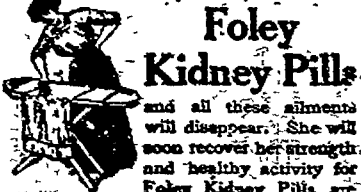

R. U. ENROLLED FOR PRIMARIES?

CAN'T VOTE FOR GOVERNOR AND COUNTY OFFICERS

In the August Primary Nominations Unless U. R.

Section 4 of the general primary law of the State provides for two enrollment days for each year of the general primaries; the last Saturday in January and the first Monday of April, preceding the August primary. Any qualified elector, not otherwise enrolled, may become enrolled and be eligible to vote at the primary election if he shall deliver to the city or Township Clerk, or other officer in charge of the enrollment book, a written request for said enrollment, accompanied by an affidavit setting forth that he is a qualified elector of said township, ward or precinct, and that it is his intention to affiliate with the political party in which he seeks to enroll. This affidavit and application must be filed prior to June 22nd, 1912. Any voter not already enrolled, must be enrolled prior to this date in order to be able to vote at the primaries August 27. The town clerk has the blank applications and affidavits.

POINTERS FOR THE MOTORIST

Tells How to Repair Punctures in Inner Tubes.

When a tube is punctured, the first thing to do is to find out if the puncture is in one wall of the tube only or if both walls are perforated. Next a careful examination should be made to determine that no part of the article which caused the puncture has lodged inside the tube. Then select a red-para patch, says a recent Michelin instruction book, considerably larger on all sides than the injury to be repaired and clean the patch carefully on its flat or unblemished side with emery paper.

Now lay the tube on a convenient flat surface, such as the dash or step, and with emery-paper clean a space around the puncture slightly larger than the patch to be used. Coat both the cleaned surface with cement and after this has dried apply a second coat. In about ten minutes when the surfaces are still "tacky" press the patch firmly in place taking care that the edges do not curl. If the patch is levelled, little difficulty will be experienced. Now tap lightly all over its surface with some round, smooth object like the end of a toll handle. If done carefully this will exclude every particle of air and the air cemented surfaces will adhere perfectly. Put smooth flat surface weight on the patch and leave the repair thus as long as practicable.
