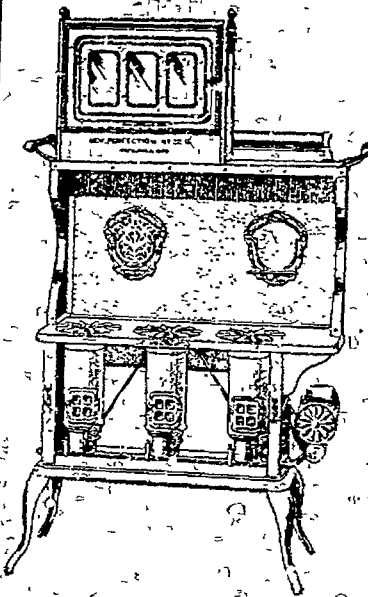

OIL INSPECTIONS SHOW BIG INCREASE

OVER TWELVE THOUSAND BOLLARS FOR STATE TREASURER

May Show \$25,000 Above Expenses by End of Year

The report of the State Oil Inspector Frank S. Neal, for the quarter ending June 30, 1912, just filed with the Board of State Auditors shows the inspection of 5,632,937 gallons of kerosene oil for that period. The fees collected for the inspections amounted to \$11,433.35, the total expenses, \$7,578.24, leaving a net balance for the state treasury of \$3,855.11. Balance on hand for previous quarter was \$3,161.69, making a net balance for the state, for the first six months of \$7,016.80.

If there is no falling off in the oil business for the balance of the year, the Oil Department will turn into the state treasury for 1912, over twenty five thousand dollars, above all expenses.

2:40 Or Better

An exciting runaway occurred here early yesterday morning. A horse and rig belonging to Wm. Taft of the Baer Line road, was left in front of Baer's hardware store, unattended, while the driver, Gerald Taft, went in the store. The horse had always been left unattended and nothing ever happened. Nearing Perrin's livery barn the horse ran into several buggies standing in the road, smashing a few of them. On it went, bumping against a tree near Dr. Dan Henry's residence and leaving the two hind wheels there. It was finally captured near the Charter farm by Gerald who had hustled after it as fast as he could.
