OVER TWELVE THOUSAND BOL-LARS FOR STATE TREASURER

May Show \$25,000 Above Expenses by End of Year

B. Birken bend in the American Machinist.

These old or useless prints may be pleached by immersing them in a soda bath containing four nunces of soda to one gallon of water. If it is desired to bleach only a portion of the print. this may be done by painting that part prints in fresh water, after bleaching, any discoloration is prevented. blank paper thus obtained furnishes a fair grade of sketch paper, and there are numerous other suses to which it could also be put.




Front View of Portable Colony House.



#### MADE BIG PROFIT FOR STATE

Purely Business Araument for the Establishment of Sanltoriums for the Tuberculosis.

According to figures contained in the annual report of Dr. H. L. Barnes, su-perintendent of the Rhode Island state sanitorium, the earnings of the exyear 1911 would amount to over \$266. 000. This is a sum three times as large as that spent each year for maintenance of the institution, including four perscent, interest and deprecia-

tlon\_chargese-The actual earnings in 1911 of 170 ex-patients were obtained by Dr. Barnes. These ranged from \$2 to \$31 per week, the total earnings for the year amounting to, \$102,752. 10nd this basis, Dr. Barnes computes the figures above given. He says, however: "White institutions for the cure of the control of the cure o of tuberculosis are good investments, there is good reason for thinking that institutions for the isolation of far advanced cases would be still better investments"

Out of a total of 46,450 hospital days' reatment given, 39,147, or \$4 per cent. rere free, the treatment costing the tate on an average \$200 per patient Out of 183-free cases investigated, 56 had no families and no income on admission to the santorium. Out of 32 patients having homes, the number in the family averaged 52, and the average family earnings were 546 In 59 cases the families had no income, and in only five cases were there any savings, none of which amounted to as much as \$100.
