There is much speculation as to what will happen when the Democrats or Moores get full control in the county and state, as both are planning to do. After the fourth of March the former will have absolute control in the National government and in the postoffice and other federal buildings many new faces will be seen within the next few years.

Northville township is well cared for so far as appointments are concerned. Not many other towns in this state have fared quite so well and both the Democrats and Moores are said to be looking with longing eyes to the time when they can get under the plum tree.

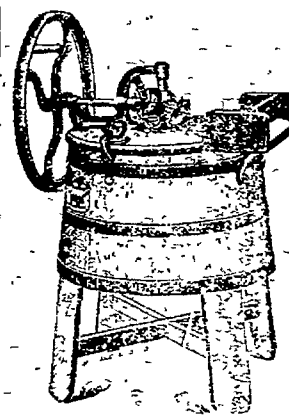

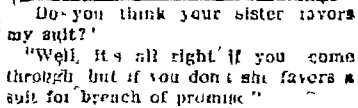

## Ceylon Tea

Ten plantations in Ceylon have been in existence only 50 years, yet the annual exports of black tea amount to nearly \$20,000,000 in value. Formerly coffee constituted Ceylon's main industry. But after a disaster of the plant in 1850 its cultivation was discontinued. Many planters, however, reaped themselves by tea and rubber (black) and by the former article the island's old prosperity revived. Today Ceylon boasts 1,500 plantations.

It is not easy to get cultivation is costly, but very labor-saving. The work itself is not hard, only the climate makes it irksome. What is wanted mostly of employees is to watch machinery and feed it from the stock of tea leaves awaiting treatment. The workers are not Singalese, but natives of southern India. A laborer's wages vary from eight to sixteen cents a day, while foreman's salary averages \$200 a month—fair for the weekly.

## Unpicked Grapes Go to the Poor

A curious old law, when dates from 1773, has been used to sentence the owner of a vineyard at Castang, near Beziers, France, to a fine and costs for picking her own grapes. She was picking the grapes which had been left on the vines in her vineyard after the fall gathering, when the policeman told her that she was committing an offense against the law, as all grapes left on the vines after the harvest were the property of the poor. The court at Beziers confirmed the policeman's opinion and the woman was convicted.

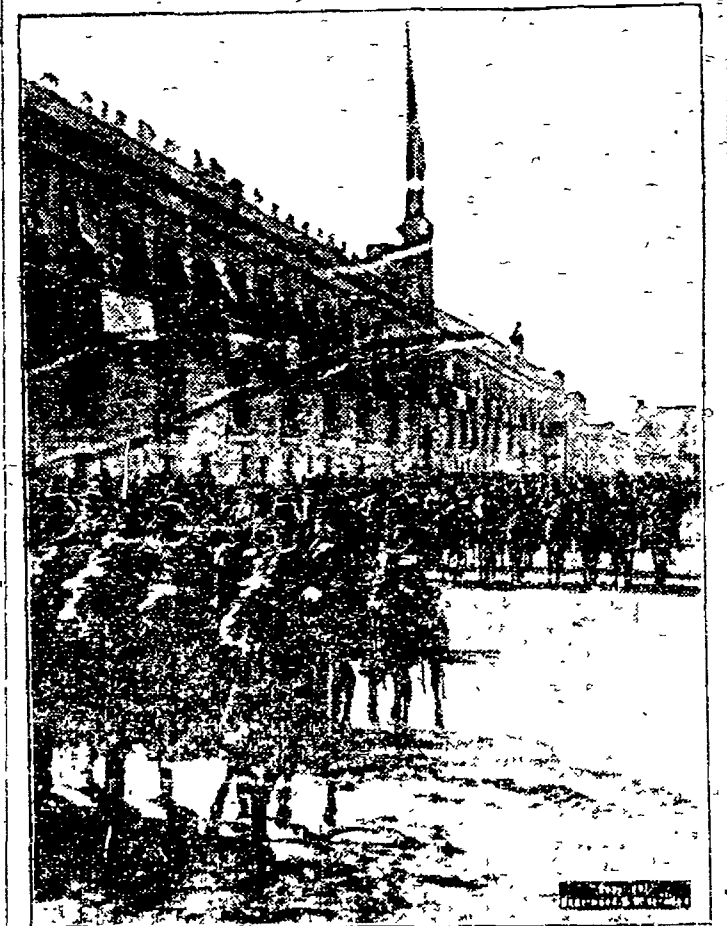

# MADERO QUILTS AFTER TROOPS JOIN REBELS

MADERO WITH FAMILY AND HIS CABINET MINISTERS ARE IMPRISONED IN THE NATIONAL PALACE BY MUTINOUS FOLLOWERS.

GEN. VICTORIANO HUERTA IS PROVISORIAL PRESIDENT OF THE REPUBLIC.

Gen. Felix Diaz, Commander-in-Chief of All the Forces, Ended the Revolution When the Federal Army Declared for Diaz—Madero and Family Probably Will Be Exiled.



THE NATIONAL PALACE WHERE MADERO IS IMPRISONED.

Mexico City, February 19.—Francisco I. Madero, his family and his cabinet ministers are prisoners in the national palace.

Gen. Victoriano Huerta, who was president of the republic, and Gen. Felix Diaz, a conqueror after two years of civil war, is commander in chief of all the forces, and the revolution ended when the federal army declared for Diaz tonight. Diaz described a military man and a son of a soldier, at the head of the government, he sent to the senate a request that Gen. Huerta act as president and interim.

Madero forced to sign a resignation from the presidency. He and his family probably will be exiled. Gen. Blarquet immediately arrested Madero in his private office in the national palace and imprisoned him under heavy guard with his uncle, Emilio Madero, other members of his family and relatives at his disposal.

Gen. Huerta arrested the former president's brother, Gustavo Madero, the finance minister, in a restaurant near the national palace and imprisoned him. The army received the news of the coup d'etat with tremendous cheering. The people rushed to the streets and filled the air with their shouts of "Viva Diaz!" "Viva Huerta!"

## Castro's Right to Enter U. S. Upheld

Cipriano Castro is free to come and go in this country at will. Judge Ward, in the federal district court in Washington, sustained the writ of habeas corpus in his behalf, overturning the immigration authorities.

Castro has been out on bail for some time pending a decision in the case. The government attorneys opposed the entrance of the former Venezuelan president, on the ground that he is an undesirable.

Albert Mathie, reading five miles north of Menominee, confessed to Detective Gayton, of Chicago, that he placed cattle guards on the Northwest tracks to see if the passenger train would cut iron in two.

The Flint Maternity Home and Children's Hospital board has given a special election March 5 to elect a \$10,000 for the erection of a home and hospital. The Flint hospital board will give enough land next to its buildings for the proposed structure. Officers of the association are: President, Mrs. Flint P. Smith; secretary, Mrs. J. M. Edgred; treasurer, Mrs. B. F. Goharin; first, second and third vice presidents, Mrs. D. W. Lang, Mrs. Truman Redburn and Mrs. W. H. Martin.
