BABOON'S BLOOD-DARWINIAN PROOF

Scientist Finds Corroboration of the Descent of Man from Monkeys

LIGHT ON EVOLUTION

2,500 Negatives Taken-Dr. Reinhert Redicts That Chemical Blood Tests Will Be of importance in Future Murder Trials.

Philadelphia.—Dr. Edward Tyson Reichert, investigator and professor of physiology at the University of Pennsylvania, has published his observations made in a series of experi-ments with blood crystals of animals and man and has, he believes, furnish ed a strong argument in favor of the Darwinian evolutionary theory.
Briefly, Dr. Reichert's most start-

-ling |conclusion species of animals can be traced by a comparative study of the blood crystals and that there is a remarkable resemblance between crystals obtained from the blood of six species of ba-boons studied and those obtained from the blood of man.
