GEORGE YERKES DIED IN WEST

BROUGHT HERE FOR BURIAL BY
TWO FOSTER CHILDREN

Funeral From Home. Of Only
Surviving Brother.

George Yerkes, a former well known Northville and Novi citizen, died at his home in Grand Junction, Colorado early Friday morning of last week. The body, accompanied by his two foster children, Edward and Inez Bryan, reached here on Wednesday. The funeral was held from the home of his only brother, Robert Yerkes, yesterday afternoon, Rev. J. E. Webber officiating.

Mr. Yerkes was well known throughout this section and especially in Novi where he lived for so many years. George Yerkes was born April 19, 1835 and was married to Jane Erickson of Novi who died in 1891. He was a figure in the development of Novi and served as supervisor of his town and also as member of the state legislature. This now leaves his brother Robert of this place the last surviving member of a family of 39 children.

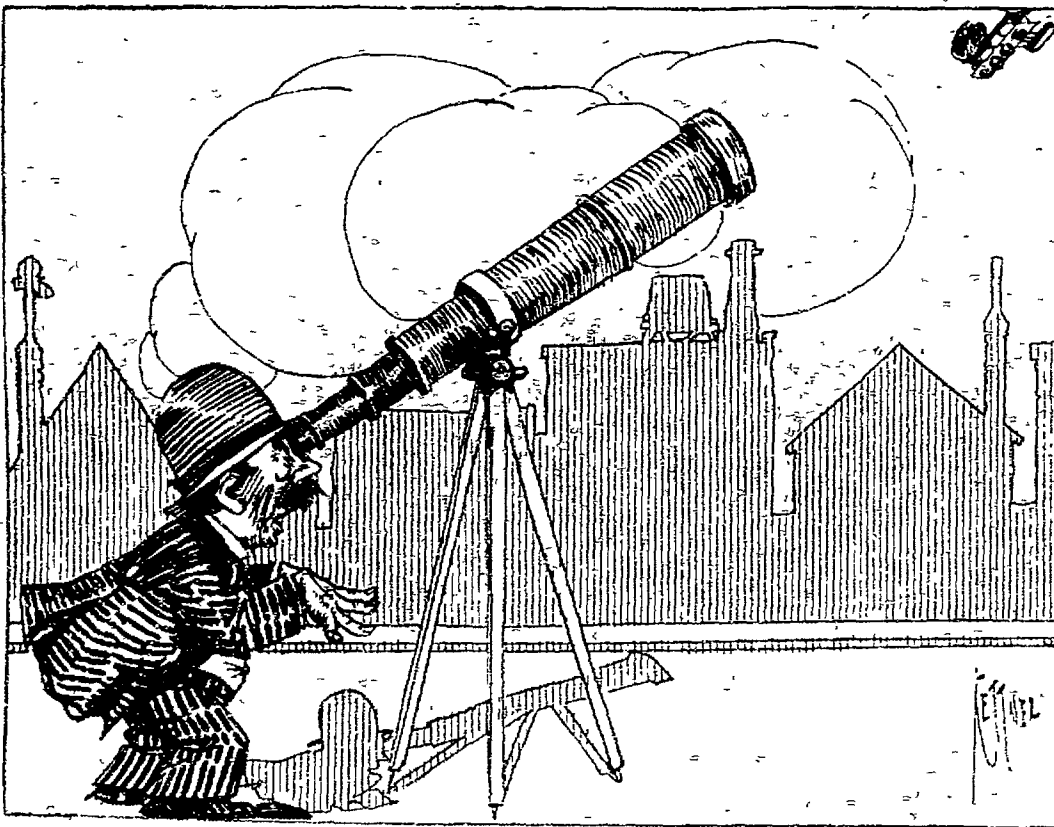

At One Time.

Clarence A. Hutton, son of Mrs. L. W. Hutton of this place died at his home in Flint, Saturday, at the age of 59 years.

Mr. Hutton was formerly a North

ville resident and was president of the village at one time. He was also engaged in the drygoods and grocery business here for a number of years, and was well known to the other portion of Northville residents and business men.

He had been ill for a long time. His mother, he leaves a widow and one daughter, Jessa, who has been teaching in the Flint schools for a number of years, one brother, W. H. Hutton of Pontiac, and a sister Mrs. J. A. Smith of this place.

The funeral was held from the home in Flint, Tuesday afternoon and burial was also in that city.

DR. JAS. HUESTON DEAD AT YPSI.

RESULT OF PARALYTIC STROKE
RECEIVED LAST WEEK

He Practiced Medicine Here From
1869 to 1884.

Dr. James Hueston, one of the oldest of Ypsilanti physicians, died at his home there Saturday afternoon, aged 82 years. Death was the direct result of a stroke of paralysis the early part of last week.

He first started practicing medicine in Northville and moved to Ypsilanti in 1884. He has followed his profession continually since going to that city and made call only a few days before his death. During the time he was in Northville, he served two terms in the state legislature as senator from Wayne county from 1883 to 1887.

Mrs. Hueston and three children are living there. He was George J. Hueston, Mrs. H. E. Lake of Detroit, and Mrs. Mary Horton of Omaha, Nebraska.

The funeral was held Tuesday afternoon.

Wonderful Exposition Palaces Fast Rising On the Shores of San Francisco Bay

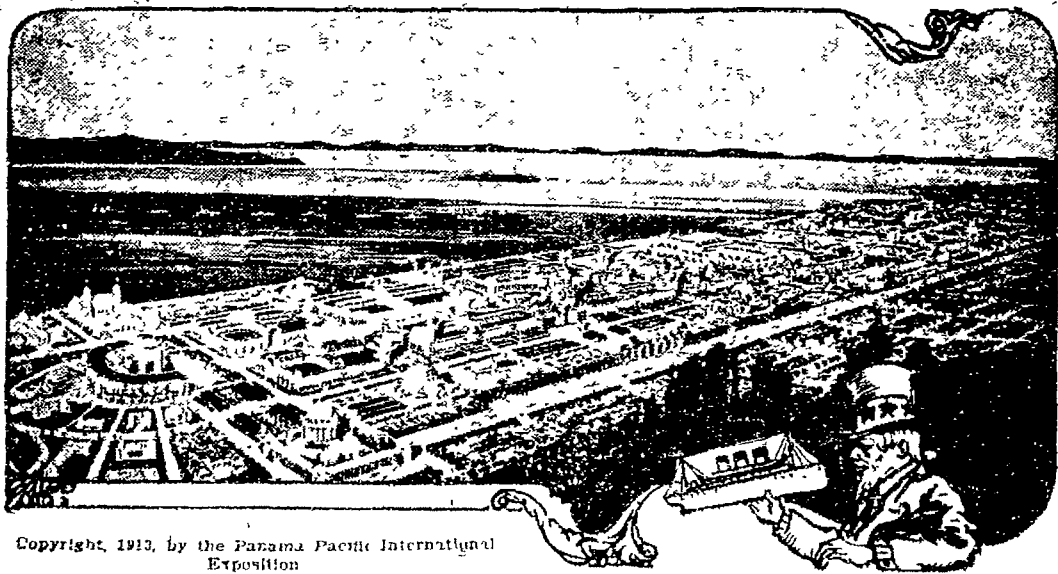
Michigan Industries Plan a Great Representation In Vast Gathering of the States and Nations

JUST inside the Golden Gate a vast army of workmen is rushing to completion the huge exhibit palaces of America's Panama canal celebration, the Panama-Pacific International Exposition in San Francisco in 1915. Many of the most celebrated architects, sculptors and artists in the United States co-operated in the design of the marvelous exposition city upon the shores of San Francisco bay. As an inspiration they had before them the greatest engineering work in the history of the world—the Panama canal—and in the completion of the canal they saw the final result of the main exhibit buildings will form parts of a huge group surrounding the three principal courts. They will represent in conception a stupendous oriental bazaar, similar in form to the bazaars of the east, at Constantinople, Damascus or Cairo. The roofs of the buildings will be colored a reddish pink, like Spanish tile, and will be spread over the mile long group of the main exhibit buildings extending along the line waters of the bay. Wonderful groups of statuary will tell the story of the Panama canal. The site of the Exposition covers 635 acres on San Francisco harbor. A

will be under way by the time this article is published.

One of the unique phases of the Exposition will be the tremendous participation of the South American nations. Many of the republics will make displays never before seen outside their own boundaries.

The commonwealths of the United States will be represented upon a splendid scale. Thirty-five states have selected the sites of their state pavilions, and the appropriations made by state legislatures aggregate millions. The largest appropriation is that of New York state—\$700,000.

of the effort of centuries to secure a passageway between the oceans. As the Exposition assumes form the wonders that the architects dreamed of become vivid and tangible. A city of palaces facing north upon San Francisco harbor is rising against the walls of the hills that embrace the Exposition site upon the south, east and west. When completed in 1915, months before the opening of the Exposition, it will be found that the majority of the Exposition palaces are united into one enormous structure, with its outside walls as high as the average six-story city block and with its golden towers and minarets rising to heights of 170, 250, 350 and 430 feet. Twelve of the four main exhibit buildings

more impressive in plan for a great maritime celebration could not have been chosen. The Exposition city will face north upon the stream of traffic that passes through the western portal of America. On the south coast and west rise the hills of San Francisco, like the walls of a vast amphitheater. On a tree-lined esplanade along the harbor's edge visitors will view great maritime pageants by day. By night it will be a series of marvellous illuminations proceeding from great batteries of colored searchlights and turn the Exposition city into a festal and

It is planned that Michigan shall be splendidly represented among her sister commonwealths at the Exposition. The great commonwealth of Michigan has contributed its due proportion to the cost of the construction of the Panama canal, and it has its patriotic pride in the Panama canal celebration. Representatives of the great industries of Michigan and of important commercial and industrial organizations are now planning for a collective representation which will bring Michigan well up among her sister states. The Michigan societies of California, Oregon and Washington are planning to assist in welcoming Exposition visitors from all parts of the world on behalf of Michigan, and visitors from Michigan will find that former residents of the home state will rejoice in welcoming them. Every wide awake citizen of Michigan is urged by the Michigan Society of California to support actively the movement to give Michigan adequate representation at the Exposition. Do not lose a day in aligning yourself with the movement.

Few states in the Union have as much to offer the world as Michigan or have an abundance of resources that may so advantageously be exhibited. The wonderful growth of agriculture, the great automobile, lumber and sugar industry, the vast opportunities for farming and for manufacturing are absolutely unsurpassed anywhere in the United States. Of special interest to Michigan manufacturers of automobiles will be the tremendous automobile exhibits at the Exposition. The principal manufacturers in motors and motor accessories will be exhibited by manufacturers of the United States and Europe.

A unique feature of the Exposition—and it is difficult to select from among the thousands of brilliant features one as being more interesting than another—will be a continuous live stock show, the greatest the world has known. Fifty acres will be used for live stock pavilions and show grounds. The Exposition management has set aside \$175,000 for premiums for live stock, while \$225,000 is offered for harness races. Breeding associations of the United States have so far offered \$45,000 in premiums. This is a total of \$445,000.

The "Midway" at the Exposition (the name has not yet been chosen) will be spectacular. At a cost of \$350,000 the Santa Fe railway will present a series of panoramas showing the Grand canyon of Arizona, famous artists being engaged upon the panoramas. In a working model of the Panama canal visitors will proceed through the locks, as if actually going through the canal itself, and lecturers will explain its operation. This concession, to cost \$250,000, will have a capacity of handling 2,000 people through its locks every thirty minutes. Another concession will show the historic old market place of Nuremberg, Germany, and wonderful concessions from China and Japan will be shown. Altogether the cost of installing the concessions is estimated at \$11,200,000.

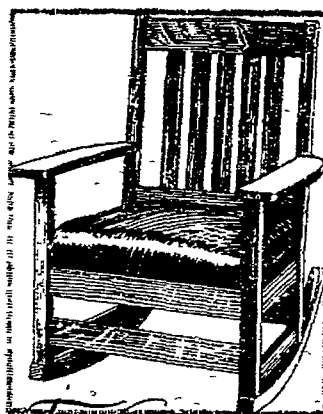

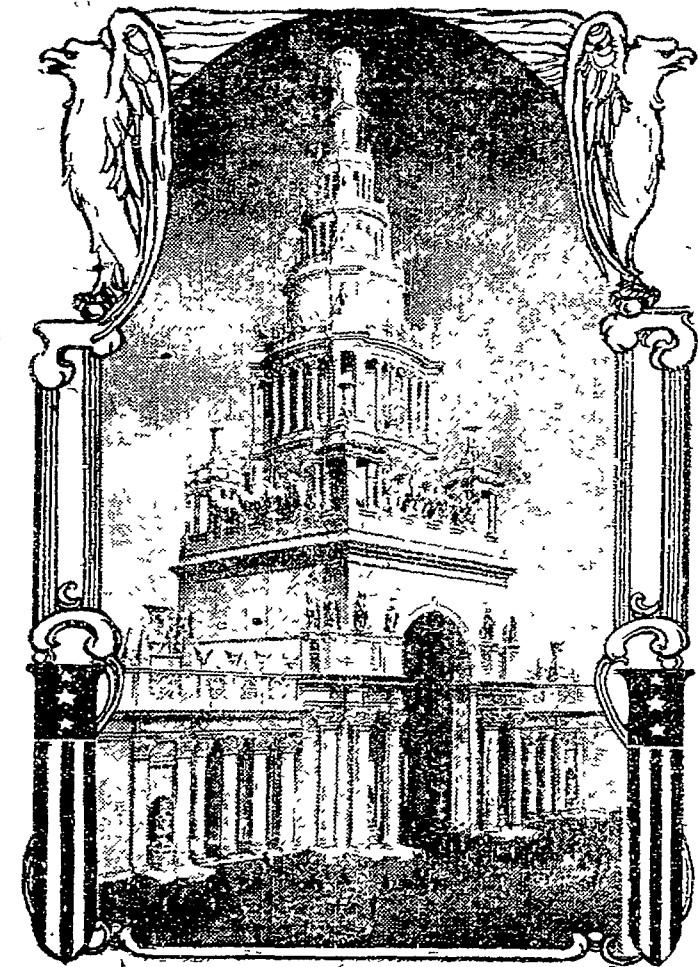

A MARVELOUS SETTING FOR SCULPTURE AT THE PANAMA-PACIFIC INTERNATIONAL EXPOSITION, SAN FRANCISCO, 1915.

The dominating architectural feature of the Exposition is the superb Tower of Jewels which will command the south entrance of the Court of the Sun and Stars. This tower, 430 feet in height, will have a base one acre in extent. The tower will rise upward in terraces, giving way at last to a group of figures supporting a globe typifying the world. The repeated figures of armored horsemen and of explorers of the oceans will be used in the tower, which, with its statuary, mural paintings and mosaics, will be indescribably beautiful. Messrs. Carrere and Hastings, architects in chief of the Pan-American Exposition at Buffalo in 1901, are the architects.

ITY DAYS AND PART OF NIGHT.

Superintendent Wilkinson Gave It a
Good Try Out Sunday.

The new water power plant was
given a good try-out Sunday by
Superintendent Wilkinson and it
proved to be all that could be ex-
pected.

Water was turned on Sunday morn-
ing and it took care of all the elec-
tricity lighting all day Sunday and all
night Sunday night in fine shape.

Mr. Wilkinson says the water
wheel will develop 40 h. p. and he
expects with it to take care of
practically all the day work and all
night work after the business places
have closed except possibly during
the dry season. This will be quite
a saving in fuel anyhow, and the
council hopes in the long run to
make this municipal power dam a
paying investment.
