BIG CHRISTMAS TREE IS READY

SANTA CLAUS WILL HOLD FULL SWAY SATURDAY NIGHT.

MUSIC, DECORATIONS AND PRESENTS GALORE FOR THE YOUNGSTERS.

Preparations for Northville's first Community Christmas celebration are progressing satisfactorily in every department. The big tree was taken from its long-occupied home on the Ball-Neal lawn Wednesday and erected on the specified site at the intersection of our two principal streets, where it presented a most impressive appearance, even in an undecorated state. As it originally stood, it was fifty feet in height, and it probably is without question one of the largest if not the largest Christmas tree in the country this year.

All the committees have been busy getting their respective departments into shape.

Mrs. Noble and Mrs. Griffin are to have the children meet for practice in the Presbyterian church this Friday, afternoon and tomorrow afternoon at four and at two o'clock, respectively.

The band is purchasing special music and there is to be not only one Santa Claus, but three of them.

The arrangements for the lighting up of the tree have been under the superintendence of Manager Hotton, of the Edison company and they will win a lot of new laurels when the electricity is turned on Saturday night.

Mr. Balden for the Finance committee, reports a liberal response along that line, about \$290 having been contributed.

It has been decided that each child is to receive another gift, in addition to the stockings filled with candy, etc. The Traffic superintendent has announced that all traffic is to be suspended during the exercises at the tree.

Through its chairman, Mrs. Griffin, the vocal music committee requests the children who are to sing to meet at the Presbyterian church this Friday afternoon at four o'clock, and tomorrow—Saturday afternoon at two o'clock. A list of the hymns is given elsewhere in this issue.

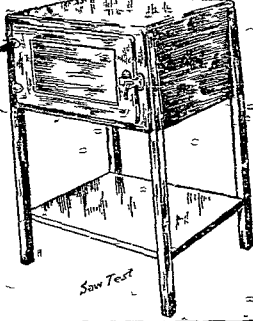
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
