SPECIAL ELECTION TO BE HELD TUESDAY

On Tuesday next there will be a special election in this village for the purpose of giving the electors of Northville an opportunity to approve or reject the action taken by the village council in selling to Henry Ford the village water power and site for the sum of two thousand dollars. For this election there will be two voting precincts, the boundary or dividing line between the two being Center street. The voting place for precinct number one will be at the village hall on Main street and for number two at the gas office on South Center street. The polls of said election will open at seven o'clock and remain open until five o'clock in the afternoon.

It is desired that a large vote be polled and that the majority in favor of the proposition be overwhelming and, if possible, unanimous. Mr. Ford has already expended many thousands of dollars for property in Northville and if present plans are carried out, and they will be, he will spend a large amount here next season in improvements and new buildings. He is asking no inducements of favors from the people of Northville, but instead has paid a good price for all the property he has thus far acquired. It would, doubtless, please him to have the people all of one accord with reference to the sale of the village property and at this special election the electors will be given an opportunity of demonstrating just how much they are interested in having the Ford interests come to Northville.

Remember that at this election the women of Northville can vote as well as the men, and they are urged to do so.

AUTO CLUB BANQUET TO BE FEBRUARY 17

ROGERS, WAYNE, OAKLAND AND
WASHINGTON ROAD MEN TO BE
PRESENT.

Preparations are going merrily along for Northville's big 1920 event—the Auto Club's banquet—to be given, in a measure, in honor of the Wayne county commissioners and department heads, to commemorate the completion of the cement highway through this village and the township of Northville. The date is fixed for Tuesday, February 17th, and State Highway Commissioner Frank Rogers, and possibly a national highway official from Washington will be present.

Mayor Couzens of Detroit will also be here if official duties will permit as will also Chairman Frank, Lodge chairman of the Wayne county board of supervisors.

All members of the Auto Club who have renewed their membership for 1920 and new members, will share in the enjoyment without any expense. A banquet ticket will be sent to all 1920 members next week.

Highway Commissioners from all the adjoining counties will be present and, doubtless, new ideas for new roads in this section will be brought out.

The ladies have been engaged to serve the dinner at 6:30 o'clock and the assembly will take place at the Auditorium at 8 o'clock. Members are requested to renew their membership as early as possible so that the committee may know about the number to prepare for.

AMERICAN LEGION ACTIVITIES.

Through the generosity of the K. of P. Lodge No. 100 American Legion Post has secured very comfortable quarters for a small rental. The Post will have the use of the K. P. hall and bill room for the coming year. The club room will be open day and night and supplied with ditty papers, etc., and a comfortable place for the boys to spend a quiet hour at any time in writing, reading or reviewing their many recollections of a great conflict.

The Post meets every Tuesday evening at 8 o'clock for the transaction of business and usually have a fine lunch for all.

The local Post expects soon to have a membership of 60 and all are urged to join. Plans are being perfected to a number of big events to be given during the next few months, among them being a grand picnic sometime in March.

TO TRAIN MECHANICS.

A plan instituted by the Ford Motor company to give a course in service instruction to all mechanics employed by authorized Ford dealers is proving a great success. The men are sent to Detroit from the Ford branches, and their instruction is both in theory and practice. Students are paid for their time by the Ford company, a part of which is spent doing actual work in the factory. At present the classes are composed of men from every state and each man receives a month's instruction. During 1919 1,000 men were graduated from the school, and the original expenditure of \$150,000 is regarded as a good investment by the officials of the company, as it will help to give standard service to Ford owners.

A BIG COMMANDEERY EVENT.

Northville Commandery No. 39, is to receive a visit from the alternate officers of Detroit Commandery No. 1 Tuesday evening February 17th. These officers under the leadership of Sir Lyle G. Younglove, Grand Captain, of Grand Commandery of Michigan, will confer the order of the Temple that evening. The plan for the meeting has been held in abeyance for nearly a year and now that the conditions are right the visit will be made. It will be a star event for the local Commandery which has made such a wonderful growth during the past two years.
