BIDS GREATLY EXCEED ESTIMATE

Bids nearly \$70,000 in excess of the \$275,000 appropriation voted last April for a new jail, were received yesterday afternoon by the county jail building committee of the board of supervisors. Eight bids were on the general contract; three on the jail equipment and plumbing, and six on the heating and ventilating. Action on the letting of the contracts was continued until Wednesday when the bids are to be brought to the attention of the board of supervisors with the committee's recommendation as to what had best be done.

The low bid on the general contract was that of S. E. Benjamin & Co. of Detroit, whose figure was \$213,921. The low bid on jail equipment and plumbing was submitted by the Yah, Dornalton Works of Cleveland, and was \$158,575. The Glanz & Kilian company of Detroit, was low on heating at its quotation of \$17,451. The three bids together with the \$55,000 paid for the site bring the cost up to \$444,947 exclusive of the architect's commission and incidental expenses connected with a building of this size.—Postec Press.

STATE FAIR DIRECTORS RESIGN.

Eight of the 20 directors of the Michigan State Agricultural society directors have tendered their resignations to John S. Haggerty, president of the society, it was learned Wednesday. The resignations, it was stated, were in protest against the granting of a \$10,000 bonus to George W. Dickinson, secretary-manager of the state fair.

Announcement of the resignations was made by Mr. Haggerty following a conference with Governor Groesbeck. "It is the consensus of opinion of these 16 out of their resignations," said Mr. Haggerty, "that in view of the salary and bonus given Mr. Dickinson, \$25,000 in all, that this precludes any appeal on their part to the state legislature for financial aid for the fair."

Mr. Haggerty said he was in accord with the proposal that the state fair be taken out of the hands of private management and be conducted by the state legislature.

Mr. Dickinson receives a salary of \$15,000 per year.

Grant Shuman, one of the members of the agricultural fair commission, said Wednesday night that Mr. Dickinson had never taken the \$10,000 bonus which the directors voted him at the annual meeting about a month ago. "At that time Mr. Dickinson told me that he would not accept the bonus," Director Shuman said. "The money has remained in the treasury since that time and I know that he is not intention of accepting the bonus. I consider Mr. Dickinson a capable manager of the fair and I will stand behind him as long as I know him to be on the square."

TO HOLD D. U. R. TO AGREEMENT.

Contenting that the D. U. R. has no right to open the working agreement existing between it and the three divisions of the street railway men's union for the purpose of reducing the wage rates, representatives of the men addressed a communication to the company Wednesday, expressing their willingness to submit that question to arbitration.

According to Carey Ferguson, business agent for Division 26, representing the men employed on the Detroit city lines, the company must first establish its right to open the contracts before the actual question of wage reduction can be brought up for discussion.

At present there are four agreements in operation, one with Division 99, representing the Mt. Clemens men; another Division 111, representing the Ypsilanti men; and conductors, and third with the Monroe branch of Division 26 and a fourth with the main body of the last named group.

In the first three agreements definite dates for the expiration of the contracts are set forth, with provision for their renewal or adjustment. The date set is May 1, 1921, with provision for a notice from the party desiring a change to be made 30 days prior to the expiration date.

In the case of Division 26, the Detroit platform men's organization, no date is fixed for its expiration, it reads as follows:

"This agreement and the provisions thereof shall continue in force and be binding upon the respective parties hereto until such time as it may be changed by the mutual consent of both parties or their duly constituted representatives."

MARRIED SIXTY-FIVE YEARS.

Mr. and Mrs. W. I. Allen of this place had been married 55 years, December 31, 1920. This is something very few married people can say these days. They were married in Grand Blanc, Genesee county, December 31, 1865. They have lived in South Lyon on pretty hill, Petibone street for many years. Their many friends in South Lyon extend congratulations and trust they may enjoy many more years of companionship.—South Lyon Herald.

The remains of Donald Sberman Hubert, who lost his life in France as a member of Co. A, 126th infantry, was brought to Redford and interred in Grand Lawn cemetery.

Miss Ada Rice, daughter of Mrs. E. J. Rice, of Milford, and Alfred L. Powellson of New Hudson were married last week Wednesday at the home of the bride.

It is reported that the Winans estate in Hamburg, consisting of 554 acres, and which includes all but 20 acres of Pleasant Lake, is about to be sold to a Detroit-Massachusetts organization and will be converted into a pleasure resort.

New bids for the construction of Oakland county's proposed new jail for which the county has raised \$275,000 by bonding, will be received up to February 15, when the supervisors will return to consider whether the contracts shall be awarded.

Instantly and without warning death came to David R. Austin, about 6 o'clock Monday evening as he was at work at the bench in his little shop. Apparently he had been in his usual health, and to heart disease is attributed his sudden passing.—Milford Times.

Oakland County Red Cross is striving to raise its quota of \$5,000 for the Hoover fund and committee have been appointed in all the townships to carry on the task. Rev. S. D. Eya has been appointed for Farmington. E. J. Verduyn for Novi, Mrs. M. H. Collett for Commerce and Mrs. F. S. Hubbell for Milford.

The annual meeting of the Oakland County Pomona Grange was held Tuesday at the home of G. S. Bartlett near Elizabeth Lake. Mrs. Dorcas Donaldson of Novi had charge of the program. Nine granges were represented with delegates—Pentice, Novi, Wixom, Milford, Holly, Davidsburg, Groveland, Independence and Brandon.

A tuberculosis hospital will be established in Pontiac soon at county expense. The supervisors Saturday authorized conversion of one of the city's two contagious disease hospitals into such a sanatorium and employment of two nurses. An agreement was reached to rent the city's equipment for care of contagious diseases and cases and pay all maintenance expenses for that work.

Israel P. Leet, age 94, a resident of Farmington township for over 70 years, and the oldest citizen in the township, died Monday afternoon at 3 o'clock at the home of his son, Geo. P. Leet, of old age, after an illness of but two weeks.

Mr. Leet was born in Genesee county, New York, was brought to Michigan by his parents when but two years of age. Seventy years ago he moved to the farm now operated by his only son, on which he has lived since that time. In 1870 he married Miss Betty Madden of Troy. For 35 years he was a teacher in schools of Farmington township, and was the most widely known citizen of the community. Twenty years ago he retired from active farm work; but it was not until two weeks ago that his condition became serious. His wife, one son, George P. GETS LOWER R. R. FARE FOR FARMERS.

Round trip railroad fare to the Michigan State Farm bureau annual meeting, and Farmers' Week, at W. A. C. has been cut down to one and one-third fare through the efforts of the traffic department of the State Farm bureau. Farmers' Week begins January 15th and extends to February 4th. Persons desiring the cut rate should follow these instructions: When you buy your tickets to Lansing any time within three days of the opening of Farmers' Week, ask your local agent for a certificate of purchase. At the convention provision will be made, so that some one in authority can sign your certificate. With this in hand you can secure a return fare for one-third the usual cost.

Instead of a set program of speakers the state farm bureau is providing for a session of thorough discussion of important questions involving its cooperation. The executive committee has instructed the secretary to prepare a tentative 1921 program which will be a basis for consideration.

M. A. C. however, has arranged for one of the best programs of important speakers on agricultural subjects ever presented in the state. The speakers include S. S. McClure, founder of McClure's magazine; Geo. Livingston, chief of the U. S. bureau of markets; Dean Davenport, of University of Illinois; A. E. Roberts, former member of the Roosevelt County Life commission; Miss Alma Birzel, of the University of Minnesota; Congressman A. L. Lever, member of Farm Loan board; Governor W. L. Harding of Iowa; President Burton of the U. of M.

A women's conference will be held at the same time as the meeting of the various associations. M. A. C. will have an educational exhibit. Conventions will occur in the mornings, and the M. A. OAKLAND COUNTY HAS BIG CASH BALANCE.

The total cash balance in local banks and in the office of the county treasurer of \$781,845.25 was shown in the report of the committee to battle with the county treasurer which was received and adopted Friday afternoon by the supervisors. The cash balance carried over, December 31, 1919, was \$426,125.03 and receipts for the year including transfers amounted to \$4,259,516.38, making total receipts of \$4,685,641.41. Disbursements amounted to \$4,079,402.75. The county had outstanding in unpaid checks on December 31, \$179,907.09.

There are trust funds in the hands of the treasurer amounting to \$2,511.57 belonging to heirs of persons who have died in the county but who have never claimed their bequests. They range in amounts from \$157 to \$2973. The treasurer has cemetery funds held in trust amounting to \$2,758.83.—Pontiac Press.

EVERYTHING WILL BE ALL RIGHT AFTER A WHILE.

You well remember how you felt during the days preceding Christmas and the days following. As you planned your Christmas festivities you felt that you loved everybody and that everybody loved you, and when the great day came you were very sure of this fact. You enjoyed a real feast for two days and you thought, as you finished your Christmas dinner, that you would never need anything more. You really experienced a grand and glorious feeling for two or three days only to come to a realization as the Christmas spell passed away, that you were just an ordinary individual very much like a hundred and twenty million fellow citizens who claimed these grand old United States as their home.

Your government is now in very much the same state that you were when you recovered from the festivities of Christmas celebrating. For four years we enjoyed a real feast and we lived on the fat of the land and everything above and below the land and many things under the sea. Everybody loved America for the help they were receiving from this side of the big pond which separated us from the scenes of the great world war.

And we really felt that we loved everybody who was in any way affected by the great conflict, and consequently we gave liberally of our worldly goods to every worth cause which presented itself during these four years of our prosperity. Mother and the girls knitted socks and sweaters, sister Mary gave her time and talents to the great work of the Red Cross, father bought bonds and thrift stamps and brother Tom offered himself as a sacrifice for the sake of humanity while the Lord man was attracted to the city by the high wages paid in shops and factories.

When the fallow left the farms for the attractive city he received their first pay check and had a bunch of money he did not know what to do with it. OAKLAND COUNTY TO LEAD FIGHT AGAINST INCREASED RATES.

Rulings in Lansing upheld the Smith act, as against prior franchise agreements and the higher fares are now being collected. Last week in court here, at Gillispie's suggestion, the case was dismissed to expedite an appeal. The appeal to the other counties will be at the supervisors' request.

LEAGUE REPORT FOR YEAR ISSUED

GIVES ACCOUNT OF WORK ACCOMPLISHED DURING FIRST YEAR OF EXISTENCE.

WORLD COURT IS ESTABLISHED

Also Mention Work in Limitation of Armaments and Study of Economic Blockade.

Paris.—The secretariat of the League of Nations issued an official document entitled "The Work Accomplished by the League of Nations During the First Year of Its Existence, January 10, 1920, to January 10, 1921," enumerating various questions settled or discussed by the league.

It mentions first establishment of a permanent international court of justice, second, work accomplished in the limitation of armaments, and third, creation of an international commission to study use of the blockade as an economic weapon.

The three foregoing are mentioned as measures "destined to prevent war." Under the heading, "Efforts at Political Conciliation," the document refers to the question of the Aland Islands, upon which the League commission will report within three weeks.

As measures destined to remedy the economic crisis, the report says, creation of an economic and financial organization in accordance with conclusions of the Brussels financial conference, and organization of a transit commission were foremost in the League's work.

Concerning humanitarian measures the report goes on, the League elaborated a series of projects including an appeal for funds to fight typhus, acceptance of responsibilities for opium traffic control and also the white slave traffic, caused the United States, Brazil and Spain to accept mediation in Armenia and effected repatriation of more than 100,000 war prisoners.

DETROIT LINES CROSS D. U. R.

200 Police Used to Prevent Serving of Restraining Order

Detroit.—Using 200 members of the police department to combat the serving of a temporary restraining order, the street railway commission succeeded in crossing the D. U. R. tracks at Mack and St. Jean avenues with the Charlesvoix-St. Jean municipal line after E. J. Burdick, assistant general manager of the D. U. R., had been taken to Belle Isle by police and marooned there by the raising of the draw in the bridge. Mr. Burdick was serving the restraining order, issued by Judge Harry Dingeman, of the circuit court when he was taken into custody by police.

The difference between the company and the city are of long standing and the action of the city in forcibly crossing the D. U. R. tracks points to further legal proceedings.

THRIFT WEEK TO BE OBSERVED

Interesting Features Arranged For Each Day Beginning Jan. 17.

Detroit.—National Thrift Week, starting Jan. 17, the anniversary of Benj. Franklin's birthday, will be observed in a thorough manner in Detroit and the principal cities through out the state. Representatives of some fifty lines of activity have been working out plans whereby each day next week will be devoted to a specific avenue leading to thrift, the campaign being of an educational nature rather than a concentration on any particular line. The various days, starting Monday, January 17, have been designated as "Make a Budget," "Have a Bank Account," "Carry Life Insurance," "Own Your Own Home," "Make a Will," "Pay Your Bills Promptly," and "Share With Others."

IRISH PEACE NOT IN SIGHT

Sinn Fein and Lloyd George Still At Cross Purposes.

Dublin.—All negotiations looking to peace in Ireland have broken down, if reports in official circles are to be credited. Definite information is lacking, but it is said that Premier Lloyd George has refused to consider Sinn Fein's proposal for the withdrawal of the home rule bill.

Officials here take a gloomy view of the situation. The increased activity on the part of the military and republicans in the martial law areas is considered as indicating an extension of guerrilla warfare.

Girl Stowaway Not Admitted.

Norfolk, Va.—Amelia Arnold, who traveled across the Atlantic from France stowed away in a locker three feet square to join her fiancé here, must go home. Louis Ponticello, whom she came to wed, was held for the grand jury by a United States commissioner after he had admitted having aided her illegal entry into the country, and the girl was denied admission. She was discovered on arrival of the steamer New Windsor, after a 20-day voyage.

Items Of Interest in World's News

Wanted: Home For Coolidge.

Boston.—Vice-President-elect Coolidge is still seeking a house in Washington. He decided not to take the house heretofore occupied by President-elect Harding.

Receiver For Another Road.

Toledo, O.—For the second time in less than a week a receiver was appointed to take charge of a branch railroad of the Toledo Railway & Light Co., a subsidiary of the Henry L. Doherty Co., of New York.

Fire Causes Heavy Loss.

Wilmington, Del.—Fire in the plant of the Wilmington Leather Company caused damage estimated by James I. Ford, treasurer of the company, at \$2,500,000 and upset plans for employing 800 men and women.

Nebraska Two-Cent Fare Upheld.

Lincoln, Neb.—The Nebraska two-cent passenger fare law, passed at the legislative session of 1907, is constitutional, according to the findings of Special Master John F. Stout, filed in the United States district court.

Recent Treatment of Clergy.

Washington.—The public morals board of the Methodist Episcopal church announced that it would inaugurate a campaign "to stop the contemptuous treatment of the Protestant ministry by some cartoonists, writers and actors."

Legislature Man Woman Speaker.

Victoria, B. C.—A woman will be the next speaker of the British Columbia legislature. Mrs. Mary Ellen Smith, newly elected representative from Vancouver, received such a large plurality in the recent election that the cabinet named her for the speakership.

Postpone Sale of Materials.

Washington.—Indefinite postponement of sale of surplus shipping materials on the Pacific coast was announced by the shipping board. The materials were advertised, by the board for sale by competitive bids January 11. No explanation accompanied the board's announcement.

Telephone Connections With Cuba.

Washington.—Telephone communication between Cuba and the United States is promised before spring by the Cuban-American Telephone and Telegraph Co. of New York, which received a permit from the state department to land three submarine cables from Havana to Key West, Fla.

Sentenced For "Stealing" Engine.

Chicago.—For stealing a locomotive six months in jail. That was the sentence given by Federal Judge K. M. Landis to Daniel Abogast and Thomas McDermott, of the Chicago yardmen's union, who turned an engine loose in the railway yards last August during an unauthorized strike of switchmen.

DeValera Back in Ireland.

Dublin.—Eamonn de Valera, "president of the Irish republic," denies that the Sinn Fein is making peace overtures to England, says the Freeman's Journal in a forecast of De Valera's forthcoming manifesto. De Valera's return to Ireland was announced last week, after he had disappeared from New York.

Office Building For Trammien.

Cleveland.—The Brotherhood of Railroad Trammien closed a deal for purchase of a site at Superior avenue and West Ninth street for a new eight-story modern office building, one-half of which will be used as general offices of the brotherhood. The cost of ground and building approximately \$700,000.

Eviders Fully Prosecuted.

Washington.—Attorney General Palmer has informed the house judiciary committee that the department of justice "has made every effort to procure indictments or information against all persons guilty of violation of the selective service act" and that "it is not believed that any considerable number of persons guilty of a willful violation of the act have escaped the notice of this department and its investigators."

Vacancies In Revived Board.

Washington.—President Wilson would have to fill at least one of the two vacancies on the board of directors of the revived War Finance Corporation before it could make any considerable number of loans for financing exports with a view to according relief to farming and other industries. This statement was made by treasury officials after the resolution became a law through passage by the house over the President's veto.

M. C. R. R. Granted Note Issue.

Washington.—The interstate commerce commission announced it has granted authority to the Michigan Central railroad to issue 15 promissory notes, aggregating \$3,500,000, and one 10-year promissory note for \$13,000,000 and to issue and pledge \$507,000 of the company's refunding and improvement bonds, series B, as security for the \$13,000,000 note. The proceeds of the 50 notes are to be used for new equipment.

Northville School Notes.
