EXHIBITED NORTHLVILLE CHURNS.

The Superior Churn & Manufacturing Company of this village manufacturers of Superior churning recently received a letter from their agents John S. Millar & Son of Alman, N. B. in which they stated they were trying hard to pack the sale of the Superior churn in their territory. They exhibited the churning at the Smithfield fair sales in London in December last, at the Royal Agricultural Society Show of England at Derby and at the Highland Agricultural Society Show in July, as well as at other small shows. Considerable interest has been aroused and work is not for the high rate of exchange, doubtless, many Superior churns might be sold in that section.

At previous exhibitions made of the Superior churning by Millar & Son silver medals have been won and at the 1919 Dairy Show the Elkington cup was won, representing three first and one second prizes.

CITY OF DETROIT BUYS HOLMES FARM.

The Detroit city council Wednesday authorized the department of health to purchase the 160 acres known as the Holmes farm, which adjoins the municipal tuberculosis sanatorium at Northville, for \$35,000.

The property is a modern farm house and buildings valued at \$15,000.

There are also an orchard of 30 acres and deep flowing mineral springs.

The sanatorium will use the water for drinking and in a swimming pool,

to be constructed soon.

The council approved the action of William H. Maybury, of the department of health, in personally assuming the six-day option on the property.

STARKWEATHER FARM WON A SILVER CUP

Honoring of winning the renewal of the Michigan breeders' racing industry went to the Starkweather Stock farm, of Northville, the event being witnessed by the largest crowd that ever saw a horse race at the state fair grounds. Owing to the condition of the track after the heavy rains racing started late, every seat in the big stand and bleacher being taken, while crowds stood on either side of the track, fully 25,000 watching the crits perform.

If interest continues throughout the six afternoons of the meeting, it is certain that the state fair will offer more mosey next season and put the racing on the plane it deserves as the big attraction of all.

All races on the Monday card were stakes, that for the three-year-old pacers having a field of five. It was a good tilt between Donnie Direct, the winner, and Czar Nutwood, either of which can pace the track in better than 2:20 on a good day. As it was, they were two sulky widths out from the polls.

Donnie set the pace in the first heat and the young Czar rallied after her, but this was a mistake, for he left his feet, the sulky having no opposition at the end. In the second heat, Grit went away fast and carried Donnie to a break, but faded away later, and Czar Nutwood won. Czar Nutwood tried to take an early lead in the third but this was fatal, as he forgot about pacing. Donnie Direct then went on about her bus and won handily.

Donnie Direct is purely a Starkweather farm product owing to good old Donald Wilkes and out-of

Mrs. Daphne Direct, that Dan Hooke drove some years ago. Besides string some likely pacers, old Donald has the distinction of having lifted three mortgages for his former owner, and a lot of business men would like to have just such a horse with things as they are today.

The Airplane that finished third in the race also is by Donald Wilkes, while Grit, that was fourth, is by Marlie Grit, owned at the same farm.

At the conclusion of the race, Frank S. Cooke, secretary of the breeders' association, presented a handsome silver cup given by Frank E. Dougall to Mrs. Starkweather.

TO HOLD SCHOOL MEETINGS.

Final plans have been completed by A. L. Craft, county colonel, for a school for the holding of a series of school consolidation meetings in different parts of the county during the current month.

The schedule arranged is as follows: Ingland Monday evening, September 1; C. Lloyd Goodrich, assistant state superintendent of public instruction, speaker; New Farmington, Tuesday evening, September 12; Mr. Goodrich, speaker; Clarkston Tuesday evening, September 19; E. J. Ford, assistant state superintendent of public instruction, and C. E. Cook, Oakland county farm agent, speaker. Ford and Cook will also speak at Commerce Wednesday evening, September 20, and at a big consolidated school rally at South Lyon Thursday evening, September 21.

Goodrich and Ford will accompany A. L. Craft on an inspection of county rural schools next week, for the purpose of ordering the repair or destruction of all school buildings which do not comply with the state regulations in the matter of sanitation, heating, lighting and ventilation.

TEACHERS TO HOLD INSTITUTE TODAY.

An all day meeting of the teachers of rural schools of Wayne county will be held in the Supervisors' rooms, fourth floor of the County Building, Detroit, Friday, September 9th, beginning at ten o'clock in the forenoon.

Dr. M. S. Pittman, head of the rural department at the Ypsilanti Normal College, will speak at both morning and afternoon sessions.

At this meeting teachers will receive instruction relative to pupil transfer, compulsory attendance, plans of the county school nurse, etc.

Report cards, registers, and other blanks and supplies will be handed to the teachers for the several districts.

This is an institute, and all rural schools should be closed for the meeting.

Michigan News

Tersely Told

Crystal Falls—A third wage reduction made by the Steel corporation brings the wages of common labor in mines and mills down to a basic wage of \$3 a day.

Big Rapids—This city is to get a new armory. A proposition to bond for \$10,000, carried by the necessary two-thirds vote at a special election. The state will contribute \$35,000.

Ionia—Dr. William R. Cutter, 97 years old, the first dentist to practice in Ionia, is dead. Dr. Cutter was engaged in the drug business here for nearly 50 years. He retired five years ago.

Ludington—Rasmus Rasmussen, 65, former merchant, died in the baseball park grandstand of "apoplexy" when the Ludington team drove in seven runs in one inning and won the game against Grand Rapids.

Lansing—The state health department has been given complete authority over the health divisions of all state institutions. Dr. R. M. Olin, head of the state department of health, will act in a supervisory capacity over the institutional physicians.

Wheeler—Orbie Darling, a teamster working on the paving construction on the main street of this town killed a rattlesnake in the street. Years ago snakes were common about here in swampland places but this is the first rattlesnake seen in this vicinity for several years.

Grand Rapids—Dr. C. W. Munger,

superintendent of Columbia hospital, Milwaukee, Wis., has been appointed as successor to Dr. Merrill Wells, medical director and superintendent of Bogott Memorial hospital since June 1919. Dr. Wells' resignation becomes effective October 1.

Ann Arbor—A total of 56,507 children and adults took part in activities at Ann Arbor's four municipal parks this summer according to announcement by Supervisor L. W. Olds. This is the largest number to receive the benefits of outdoor play grounds in the city's history.

Allegan—Gene Marquiss, 13 years old, a farmer who lived alone in a shack six miles west of this city, is still in a serious condition as the result of mistreatment by the hands of robbers. When he left the robbers that all his money was in the bank, they took away his clothes and beat him with sticks.

Pontiac—Albert Wolf, a painter, employed at the Wilson Foundry & Machine Co., was badly shocked and injured when striking an electrical tower in the plant. He came into contact with the heavy wire, a wire there. He was taken to the city hospital where physicians gave him medical attention.

Lansing—Sheriff, chiefs of police and prosecuting attorney of Ingham county meet here Sept. 22, when it is expected that some method will be worked out to provide for cooperation between police officers and county officials to give information on protected persons.

Alpena—The McLouth structural cement carrier, built up on the dock at the Huron River, completed its plant, while preparing to leave the dock with 15,000 barrels of cement. Investigation revealed a hole in the hull of the ship, possibly caused by its striking a large white oak dock.

Lansing—"The Crusade Lance" is the name of a new Michigan publication issued by the Detroit Tabernacle recently. The "Lance" is devoted to the interests of the Modern Heir Club in Detroit and Wayne County. There are already nearly twenty thousand members in the meeting centers throughout the country.

Alpena—A young person never before seen performed in the band of "Porkchopper Fred" Tracy. "Fred" is noted for his strength and it was released that he would be the band leader for several hours when the conductor was anxious to learn the details. A 700 member band on the last leg had the following "E. 2. 8."

Dr. Creek—Dr. Edward Rawson, well-known physician and longest in active service at Northville Hospital at the age of 84 years. Dr. Rawson was a prominent Chicago surgeon in his younger days but his property and offices were wiped out by the great fire in 1871. This experience broke his spirit and he never quite came back. Dr. Rawson never married and since the death of his sister, ten years ago, has lived much like a hermit.

Dr. Townsend—Suggestion that a new national highway to be known as the "Townsend" road be a continuation of good roads work in United States Senator Charles E. Townsend be constructed from Mackinaw City to Mobile, Ala., was made by J. A. Roundtree, director general of the United States Good Roads Association, before the Michigan Good Roads Association in convention here. The proposal met with applause from delegates and it was said an effort would be made to adopt a resolution favoring the proposed highway.



Following a period of high prices, accompanied by a great increase of indebtedness, such as the period from which we are now emerging, such a contract of deposits and of loans inevitably causes hardship to many. It is part of the necessary task of getting back to a normal situation. Rapidly advancing prices are followed, as a rule, by rapidly falling prices; sudden and unusual profits by equally sudden and unusual losses. Deposits which rise from the sale of products represent real values which must be honored and shifted about with safety, but remember all the time that if you want the banking business to be kept on a safe basis, it must confine itself to funds of this character, received from the public.

Whenever the banks begin to create deposits or money, by manufacturing credit they are dealing with something unsubstantial, fictitious, and charged with possibilities of great mischief.—National City Bank of New York

\$1,000,000 MAIL THIEVES ESCAPE

THREE CONVICTED IN HOLDUPS
AT TOLEDO SLUG WAY OUT
OF COUNTY LOCKUP.

KNOCK TURNKEY UNCONSCIOUS

Jail Physician Prevents Others From
Getting Away By Locking
Door of Corridor.

Toledo, Ohio.—One of the \$1,000,000 Toledo postoffice robbery band escaped from the Lucas County jail for Day, after failing to overpower a turnkey, Deputy Sam Zimmerman and Dr. William Shapiro, jail physician. The escape was made without revolvers or the aid of outside confederates.

Dr. Shapiro prevented the escape of the other eight members of the ring by leaping into a cell with corridor keys and locking the door.

The men who got away are George Rogers, alias Lewis, leader of the band; Charles Schultz, and Joe Urditis, driver of the robbers' car.

Zimmerman, Dr. Shapiro and Dr. C. Alred of Dayton, O., a guest of the prison physician, were sitting in the jail office when they heard a scuffle and then groans from the second floor corridor where the robbers were held awaiting sentence. Zimmerman and Shapiro dashed up the stairs, where they found Turner, Szmetko unconscious. Handing the cell key to the physician on the stairs behind him, Zimmerman conducted the prisoners.

Urbayton swung a blunt strap to which a hammer hook had been fastened and knocked Zimmerman unconscious. The three convicts then made their way to the office, slugged Dr. Alred and ran into the street, one of them picking up a revolver from a desk as he fled.

Reaching Speibusch avenue, they compelled the driver of a passing automobile to stop and with the pistol pressed against him to speed away. A general police alarm was sounded and deputy sheriffs in high powered cars combed the district. One wit was said Rogers did not join his companions in the automobile but disappeared in it alone. This was Rogers' third attempt to escape.

Rogers escaped from the first story of the county jail in San Francisco three years ago when under a life sentence for mail robbery.

The \$1,000,000 robbery occurred February 15. The robbers drove to the loading platform in the rear of the central postoffice compelled the workers to lie face downards on the platform and fled with the registered mail.

VIOLENCE TAKES FAMILY OF 7

Ex Bank Gaither Spots Wife and
Children, Then Himself.

Ornish, Minn.—A family of seven—the father, mother and five children—were found shot to death in their home here late Monday. One of its sad indications was that the father knew his wife had killed his family and had himself with a revolver which was found under his left arm. There was evidence that an anaesthetic had been used to numb the victims before they were killed.

The things were discovered by a neighbor who had brought the \$2,000 collection to Mrs. Kloeden, who was treasurer of the organization.

500 Minnesota National Guardsmen

The most serious blaze was near McGrath in Aitkin county, where nearly 500 Minnesota national guardsmen were being concentrated to aid in fighting the flames. There has been no loss of life reported.

Two towns—White Pine and Salona—have been abandoned because of forest fires as a precaution against loss of life, and it may become necessary to abandon McGrath. Reports indicated that the situation was growing more serious.

TWO DEAD IN OHIO RACE RIOT

Negroes and Italians Fight It Out
With Knives and Guns.

Canton, O.—Two men are dead, four are in a local hospital and two are in jail following a race riot here between Italians and negroes in the "jungles" district. Revolvers and knives were the weapons. "Dock" Lowe, Negro, and Tony Santellia, Italian, are the fatalities.

Of the casualties in the hospital three are Negroes and one Italian.

The trouble started, police report, when a Italian pushed a Negro off the sidewalk, a fight followed, and the race riot grew.

The sympathy of the whole community is with the sorrowing family.

FIELD SELECTION OF SEED CORN HUBAM CLOVER READY FOR HARVEST EARLY.

Michigan farmers are denouncing Hubam, the new annual white sweet more sound seed corn of high yield, clover, will be ready for harvest in an unusually early date this season according to Prof. J. F. Cox, head of the M. A. C. farm crops department. Attention to field selection of seed from fields of the best varieties, in order to prepare for the added harvest early in September, about two weeks earlier than usual. When about half of the seed hills are brown and rest of the seed is in the dough stage, the crop is ready for harvest. Wind will do much damage to a mature crop, loss being caused by shattering.

GRIEF IS CAUSE OF GIRL'S SUICIDE

UNABLE TO WED COUSIN; AND
MOURNING LOSS OF MOTHER,
FATAL SHOT FIRED.

HAPPINESS IS ENDED FOR HER

"There Was Nothing More for Which
I Might Live," She Tells
Sister After Shot.

Detroit—Separated by fate from two whom she "loved more than anyone else in the world"—her mother and her sweetheart, Miss Burr Roberts, 18 years old, of River Rouge, committed suicide by shooting herself above the heart.

Only a few hours before she had pressed the barrel of her brother-in-law's army revolver to her breast, she and Roy Fother, her sweetheart, had agreed they must not love. They were first cousins.

Through the night Miss Roberts studied over this decision, and at 7:30 o'clock in the morning, as she sat in her nightclothing on her bed, she shot herself.

"There was nothing more for which I might live," she told her sister, Mrs. Jessie Baker, when the latter hurried to the room. Miss Baker had been in the basement of their home when she heard the shot. She believed she said, that intruders had fired.

The girl was conscious when they found her. Stretched across her bed, she begged to be allowed to die. "With mother and Roy taken from me, I cannot bear to live," she is quoted as saying.

She died in Delray Industrial hospital two hours later. Before her death she gave a statement to Walter Hancock, of the River Rouge police department.

She told how she had come here two years ago from North Carolina, she and her mother, and of the happiness they had known in their little home in River Rouge. She sobbed heartbroken when she told of her mother's death.

Then she told of the romance shattered by the kinship of her sweet heart. Two years, she said, she had loved Roy Fother, and he had loved her.

Two days ago Fother had to meet his fate squarely. In the face. He told her, they must not be sweethearts longer, that they could not marry, because of their relationship.

Fother was grief stricken when he learned of the act of Burr. He told her he had done what he thought was right that he had tried to gain for her to tell her of the truth instead of her.

SECOND WARRANT FOR HAAN

Lawmaker Fails to Return to Face
Charges, As Agreed.

TODAY IT WAS—for the second time in the difficulties here, the bond of State Representative William A. Haan has been forfeited and a bench warrant has been issued for his arrest.
