taking this opportunity of expressing their sympathy and loyalty to the memory of all the splendid young men who went out from Northville and who are now sleeping their last long sleep. The passing years has only endeared these boys to the people of this community, who have never failed to show proper respect to their memory.




NORTHLVILLE

Banks in the United States operate in a manner quite different from those of most other important countries. We have more than 30,000 banks in this country, most of which are moderate-sized institutions kept by people in their immediate neighborhood and which confine their operations to a single town or town in mass, e. g., European countries, Canada, the British dominions and throughout the country.

The American system of individual banks, each serving its own field, has much to recommend it because it assures close contact between the bank and its clients and because enables the officers of banks to be in close touch with the men of the business men and other depositories whom the bank serves. However, until the Federal Reserve System was put into operation in 1914, this system of separate banks suffered from a serious difficulty in times of stress or when the demands for banking accommodations exceeded the capacity of the banks.

Under the old regime each bank had to stand alone in times of money stringency and there was no strong centralized reservoir of credit which could be tapped to supply unusual requirements for credits. The money panic of 1907 illustrates the difficulties with which the banks had to contend; there was plenty of wealth and plenty of consumable goods in the country, but the machinery by which these goods could be made the basis for sound credit and the assurance of sound currency.

Fortunately the Federal Reserve System came into existence before that outbreak of the European war and provided the means by which all of the banks of the country are able to pool their strength, so that in effect the united strength of the banks in the country is each of the system.





MANY LACK LEGAL PROOFS OF BIRTH

Can you prove legally you were born?"

G. C. Jayne, special agent of the U. S. Census bureau is now checking vital statistics records of the state department of health to learn what percentage of births go unrecorded in Michigan, what percentage of people have no legal proof of birth.

Births of hundreds of children born each year in the state are never recorded, present indications of the work reveal. In other words, if it is said, these children may never be able to prove legal; that is, were born and entitled to the rights of citizenship.

"This means," declares Dr. William J. W. Deacon, director of the bureau of communicable diseases and vital statistics, "that the physician, midwife, attendant or head of the family in each of these cases is guilty of malfeasance under the state law and liable to fine and imprisonment and prosecution at any time for failure to report births."

The neglect to record a child's birth is not only unlawful but is distinctly unfair to the child.

They may be denied for a time right of civil birth.

WINTER SHORT COURSES, ST. M.

The Winter Short Courses are planned for the coming and for the spring, son and daughter. They cover general and specialized phases of Michigan life culture. The one during the first month of the year. They may be attended for a tour, night or six weeks.

Young men and women 16 years and under 16 years old, are eligible for the courses.

All courses are open to both men and women 16 years of age or over.

Farm boys and girls can obtain a better knowledge of their work at a time most convenient for them.

City young people desiring to learn farming may combine these courses with a summer of practical work on an accredited farm under college supervision.

Discharged soldiers can get a specialized training in from two to sixteen weeks in a variety of agricultural lines.

Many older men and women avail themselves of the opportunities offered by these courses.

Rural ministers, club workers and other rural community leaders gain much from these courses.

Women expecting to take a Winter Short Course should correspond early with the Dean of Women, East Lansing, in regard to rooming accommodations.

Given Value by Electric Furnace.

There are many valuable metals which we could not know in their pure form if it were not for the electric furnace. This remark applies particularly to the newly discovered metals such as tantalum (used for pen points because it will not corrode), chromium (which hardens steel), rhenium (for iridescent glass), molybdenum (for giving a fine blue to pottery glazes), vanadium (for gold bronze) and scandium, the oxide of which gives a beautiful ruby color to glass for railroad and other signal lights.
