NORTHVILLE WON CONSOLATION CUP

Northville's High School basket ball team returned from the tournament at Ypsilanti late Saturday night, bringing with them the consolation cup for class C. The members of the team, accompanied by Coach Wilm, and a large number of loyal and enthusiastic supporters went to Ypsilanti Thursday afternoon and when the schedule for the tournament was announced Northville had been chosen to play Milan, one of the fastest teams present. Northville was not unmindful of the ability of their opponents but with the Northville spirit and determination the boys entered the game. From the first the game was fast and furious and at the close of the first half the score was a tie—5 and 5, while the score at the close of the third quarter stood 18 to 7 in favor of Milan. Milan made a rally in the last quarter and the game closed with a score of 7-17 in favor of our opponents.

Friday morning Northville played Belleville and in the afternoon met Saline, defeating both teams easily. On Saturday morning our boys contested with Mt. Morris and won and had the afternoon in which to rest for their battle with Britton. Northville was defeated by Britton early in the season by just one point on Britton's floor and won in a fast and brilliant game—but when Britton came for a return game the teams were pretty evenly matched and interest in the contest was keen and all the visiting fans at Ypsilanti were on "edge" when the whistle blew. The people of Britton turned out almost to a man—and women also—and it was reported that the village stores were closed to eager were the people to witness the final game in which they hoped and believed Britton would win. The Britton fans were doomed to disappointment, however, and while they cheered their team to the best of their ability, Northville outplayed them and the final score was 36 to 37 in our favor.

The Cup was brought home by the victory and on Monday was placed on exhibition in the window at Redford's clothing store. Naturally our boys were mighty proud of their victory and they had a right to be and every Northville fan rejoiced with them. The boys played good during the first few months and best of all they have played well. In victory and in defeat they have shown good sportsmanship and have conducted themselves in a manner that has brought credit and honor to the school and to the community which has supported them loyally and enthusiastically.

A SCHOOL FOR COACHES.

Particulars concerning the courses in athletic coaching and administration to be given during the summer session at the University of Michigan were announced March 18.

The classes have been arranged primarily for instructors already engaged in teaching or coaching during the regular school year but are open to anyone wishing to supplement the preparation received in colleges and professional schools.

The courses take up all of the important problems of coaching, and are intended to fit men to take charge of athletics and gymnastics throughout the country.

Fielding H. Yost, director of inter-collegiate athletics and head coach in football, will be director of the school as instructor in the theory and practice of football.

He will be assisted by Elton E. Werner, University line-coach.

Instruction in track and field athletic training will be conducted under Keene Lutzpatrick for twenty-three years track coach at Michigan and Princeton. He will be assisted by George Ferrer and Helen of the regular university staff.

This year's basketball will be given by Coach E. J. Marner of the faculty, and the course in the fundamentals of basketball will be under the direction of Ray L. Fisher, formerly of the New York and Chicago amateur basketball teams.

BODIES OF SCOUT VICTIMS FOUND

SOUTH BEND SCOUTMASTER AND SEVEN OTHERS DROWNED IN MAGICIAN LAKE

UNSEAWORTHY CRAFT BLAMED

New Boat Being Tried Out, Goes Under Way Waves Stop Outboard Motor.

Doxasie, Mich.—Grapplers, within three hours Sunday morning, recovered all eight of the bodies lost in Magician lake, here. Saturday afternoon, when a 14-foot "boy scout" boat sank. At intervals of a half an hour the bodies were brought to shore where grieft stricken relatives claimed them.

There were pathetic scenes on the bleak shores of the lake when fathers identified sons. Mothers and sisters stayed at a nearby farm house.

The body of J. N. Taylor, 36 years old, executive of the boy scouts, of South Bend, was recovered first, at 7 o'clock Sunday morning. The last recovered was that of his son, Jimmie, 9 years old, whom his father tried vainly to save holding him above his head as they sank. While W. C. Harper, real rowboat was within 20 feet of him. The other bodies recovered were Philip Meitzel, 13 years old, boy scout, Vern C. Murphy, 15 years old, scoutmaster, Clinton Matthews, 16 years old; William Kingsley, 15 years old, and Kenneth Burroughs, 14 years old, scouts.

Taylor and the boys were members of a working party which had driven to the lake in an automobile to prepare a site for the scouts summer camp. Some 300 scouts own Hemlock Island in the lake.

At 2 p.m. early yesterday the day of the big gale, the thunder and lightning, late afternoon decided to try out their new boat.

With a riding for Taylor's body the last in the lake, hooks fastened to the boat, it went to the bottom.

It was 25 feet long, 6 inches beam and 12 inches free board. An oak keel 10 pounds weight.

Two men said the boat was scarcely seaworthy because it was made of galvanized iron.

It was of the flat bottom type. Two men attempted to pull the boat when filled,

but it sank.

CANADIAN LIQUOR EXPORT OK'D

Mr. Coughlin Says Ontario Cannot Stop Flow into U.S.

Detroit—Quashing the conviction

that was found for keeping liquor in a warehouse that had not been granted a federal license, County Judge J. J. Coughlin at Sandwich has opened the way for an uninterrupted flow of liquor into the United States, so far as Ontario laws are concerned.

Judge Coughlin held that the Ontario temperance act cannot regulate export liquor warehouses. By this ruling, the same or more of export banries may do business without fear of being stopped by provincial officials, and license inspectors who are enforcing the temperance act along the border.

EXPLOSION ON BOAT KILLS FOUR

Omar D. Conger, Sealing at Port Huron Sunk by Blast.

Port Huron—A terrific explosion

of boilers in the ferryboat Omar D. Conger, hurled four men to death, injured scores, and caused property damage of \$150,000 Sunday afternoon.

The blast occurred as the vessel was sealing at the foot of the city's main thoroughfare. Virtually every resident in the city rushed to the streets, causing a near panic. Windows in all parts of the city were shattered and several homes were wrecked.

The dead are: R. A. Campbell, 60 years old, engineer; Clifford Althouse, fireman, 40 years old; Kenneth Cran dall, deck hand; Thomas Buckner, deck hand.

ARMOUR MILLIONS UNAVAILING

Six-Year Daughter Dead Despite Desperate Efforts of Skilled

Chicago—Gwendolyn Armour, six-year-old daughter of Philip D. Armour, III, died March 23, from a form of septicemia after a week's illness during which the millions of the Armour family, the skill of a dozen physicians and a host of nurses and the resources of the entire city of Chicago, proved unavailing.

SENATE RATIFIES 4-POWER PACT

Four Votes More Than Necessary

Two-Thirds Secured.

Washington—By a vote of 67 to 27, the four-power Pacific treaty, foundation of the accomplishments of the international conference on the limitation of armaments, was ratified by the Senate March 24.

There were four votes more than the necessary two-thirds of the senators present for this quadripartite agreement.

STATE SAVES \$200,000 ON CEMENT SUPPLY.

Contracts for approximately 1,125,000 barrels of cement, for use in the 1922 highway construction program, have been let by the state highway department, it was announced at Lansing Monday.

The base price is \$1.40 and the remainder is distributed among plants where the work is the following Michigan plants:

being done will vary from \$2.00 to \$2.26. Highway officials estimate that between \$100,000 and \$200,000 will be saved on the contracts as compared with the cost of cement in previous years.



Albion—Charles Debnar, the Paul Debnar's father, who last spring presented Albion College with \$25,000 to new president, is gone and \$25,000 to the community fund, and his elderly wife, Lydia, were guests of President and Mrs. W. L. Ladd.

Elkton—Henry Worthy, a man of slender physique, has had no trouble in getting his wagon wheel, which was driven into the wrong side of the street, fixed. A hearing was held to determine what under the circumstances.

Kalamazoo—W. A. C. Pussyfoot, Justice of the Peace, will be given address at Kalamazoo April 1, according to the creek, where he will lecture the day before. John C. Kettner, attorney for Neenah, and Alvin A. Allard, the Y. M. C. A. and the Anti-Saloon League.

HEALTH CRUSADERS

TO FIGHT DISEASE

MICHIGAN MEDICAL LEADERS ARRANGE CAMPAIGN OF EDUCATION.

MEETING WAS HELD IN DETROIT

Experts on Health Topics Will Be Available to All Communities Desiring Speakers.

DETROIT—Michigan's medical fraternity, including the state medical and dental societies, Detroit College of Medicine and Surgery and state department of public health, Monday night, was invited to a state-wide program of education in health matters that opened a novel era of service to the citizens of the state.

The educational program was approved at a dinner at the Detroit Club presided over by Marion L. Burton, president of the University of Michigan, following a series of conferences at which the general details of the plan were agreed upon.

This campaign provides for the sending of members of the state medical and dental societies, of the faculty of the state university and of the state department of health into any part of Michigan where they are invited by schools, clubs, women's organizations and all kinds of societies to address mass meetings on health subjects without cost to the public or the organization.

The campaign was initiated by the state university medical society and was accepted by authorized representatives of the four most conspicuous organizations in the state having to do with the public health. It embraces medical men of the states and of the middle west who stand at the top of their profession.

The purpose of the program, which was adopted, and which will be in operation within the next 10 days or two weeks, was explained by speakers at the dinner to be a state-wide effort to carry to the men and women of Michigan an adequate knowledge of fundamental ascertained facts in regard to health and disease.

350,000 Gallons Poured by Federal Prohibition Force.

Chicago, Ill.—Federal prohibition agents dumped 350,000 gallons of wine, beer and whisky into the Chicago river while several thousand persons gathered along the bank to watch the performance.

The liquor was ordered dumped in to the river by Prohibition Director McGregor, despite the fact that Federal Prohibition Director Hayes at Washington had suggested in a long distance telephone call that it would be undesirable publicly and beneficial too ostentatious a display.

Mr. McGregor said it was necessary to dump the liquor to provide storage space and that he tried to carry out his plans secretly but that in some way they had become known.

DETROIT MAYOR SUES DOCTOR

Asks \$10,000 for Alleged Libel in Row Over Dr. Lorenz

Detroit—Suit for \$10,000 damages has been filed on behalf of Mayor Couzens by Alfred J. Murphy in circuit court against Dr. William J. Dubois of Grand Rapids, chairman of the council of the Michigan State Medical Society, alleging libel. The state council had held a stormy session in Detroit over the recent controversy about the invitation to Dr. Lorenz, and that controversy now bids fair to get a thorough airing.

The \$10,000 damage suit, which was suppressed, is understood, to be based on a circular sent out by Dr. Dubois during the hot warfare which followed the invitation to Dr. Lorenz to visit Detroit.

BERLIN WON'T PAY TAX LEVY

Wirth Declares German Government Will Spurn Allies Demands.

Berlin—Chancellor Wirth told the premiers of the Federated States and Reichstag, representing the Majority Socialists, Democrats, Clericals and the German people's party that the German government would inform the allied reparations commission that the 60,000,000 marks tax levy was not feasible, and that financial control of Germany, as stipulated in its note of last week also must be declined.

MAY DECLARE MILITARY LAW


Situation in Belfast Called Worse Than Rest of Erin.

New Orleans, La.—Fulfilling a desire often expressed to friends, Columbus Franklin Landauer, engineer, carriage, fleet and chariot maker of Mississippi mouth, who died here two weeks ago, left under his entire estate toward establishing a scholarship for poor boys at the University of Michigan. It was learned when his will was probated in civil court.

Honor System Not "Honored."
Iowa City—As a result of an investigation of the honor system by faculty members of the college of liberal arts of the University of Iowa, it is announced that the system will be dispensed with in that school and hereafter examinations will be conducted only under the supervision of an instructor. Faculty members also urge the use of "cribs" and other "cuff and notebook" methods.

Runs on Anti-Klan Ticket.
Austin, Texas—Constable Charles Hambly of Travis county, has announced himself as candidate for sheriff on an "anti Ku Klux Klan" ticket, subject to the Democratic primary. He declared that he is opposed to the Klan, which he charged, seeks to take the law in its own hands. Sheriff W. D. Miller, candidate for re-election, admitted to the grand jury several months ago that he was a member of the Ku Klux Klan.

Bandits Beat Up Detective.
Kansas City, Kan.—In a fight with three robbers in the downtown section Dick Cashin, private detective for the People's National bank, was shot and probably fatally wounded. The robbers escaped in an automobile with \$17,500 in cash, which was being transferred to another bank in the up-town section. Cashin was accompanying Sylvester Brenner, bank messenger, who was carrying a safe containing the money.

Looking for President Wilson.
Washington—Peter A. Specis, of Philadelphia, called at the White House and wanted to see President Wilson. He refused to say what he wanted from Mr. Wilson, but said he would tell that to him personally. Asked if President Harding would do, Specis replied, "I don't know him," and being furnished with the address of Mr. Wilson, he left the White House. He said he was a native of Russia, but had lived in America 18 years.
