In the circuit court at Detroit Mon day when the case of the People vs Eugene Bostwick was called it was dismissed upon motion of the prosecuting attorney, because of errors were made-in the complaint under which Bostwick was placed under arrest. It was originally intended to have a man named Keller, whom local officers understood to be Peter Keller, swear to the complaint and the warrant-was issued in the prosecuting attorney's office after a good deal of effort on the part of local officers When the complaint was ready to serve the man Keller refused to sign the document and finally E L Horne alterations were made in the reading Local officers were authorized by Justice Patterson of Plymouth to make the changes and she promised to make the necessary corroceion in her docket to meet the chânges made here, but it is evident was called ther seemed to b nothing to do but to dismiss the de-

The unfortunate outcome of this ase only deepens the conviction of Northville people that the local-officers have had but little assistance or sympathy from the prosecuting attorney's office during the past two rears. When they visited the prosecutor's office to seek a warrant-for Bostwick's arrest they were made to feel aboût as small and insignificant s it is possible to make officers feel who are striving to do their duty, and Voorhies of his assistants who handled this case been alive to then duty and responsibility they vouid have discovered this mistake and might have had it corrected before thể case was called and a whole ot\_of Northville people humiliated Tt is no wonder that officers fie-quently feel "what's the use," and close then eyes to a lot of things that ought to be corrected They are andreapped, oftentimes, by local justice of the peace on the one hand, and nunfiliated when they seek the assistnce and advice or the county attorney; The wonder is that so many officers do as well as they do under existing circumstances tainly about time there should be a change in the policy now being followed in the office of the presecuting attorney of Wayne county.

He served the township of Northpeace and as long as his health would permit he was faithful and efficient He took a great interest in the Order of Eastern Star and served Orient Chapter as worthy patron with dignity and honor

Mr.=Noble was 76 years of age and is survived by his wife, who has the sympathy of a large circle of friends in her sorrow. Funeral services were held at his late home on Wednesday afternoon and were conducted by Rev E. V Belles. Burnal took place at Rural Hill cemetery



#### GEORGE LORD OPPOSES STATE IN COME TAX

Probably there not a man in Michigan who is a better authority on tax matters than George Lord of Detroit, a member of the Wayne county legislative delegation, who declared a few days ago that this is not the time for Michigan to enactia state income ax law

"I am not in favor of state in-come tax law while we have a federal income tax," Mr Lord declared. "We surrendered our rights morally to pass a state income tax law-when we allowed-the federal government to mpose one upon is For the state to mpose another would be taxation with Langeance "

The proposed amendment is so orded as to make it discretionary for the legislature to impose a tax on incomes of persons or corporations or both The legislature may make the for and tay graduated, if it wishes, as Jong as it does not exced 4% of incomes.

The object of a state income tax of course, is to relieve the heavy burden on real estate hope particularly of the farmer

'But I don't think the farmer would eally benefit My experience has een that if a new source of revenue is opened, a new way is found to spend it. Therefore the relief for real property would be neglible. Taxes on real property would be just as

What we must find is a stop spending money instead of searching for new ways to raise it. "I do not think a state income tax

would be so bad if it were made a substitute for the tax on intangible Property. am not opposed to the principle of an income tax but I am opposed to any such tax now while we allow the federal government to impose one. And the federal income tax is a pretty stiff one."
