EUGENE BOSTWICK CASE DISMISSED.

In the circuit court at Detroit Monday when the case of the People vs Eugene Bostwick was called it was dismissed upon motion of the prosecuting attorney, because of errors which were made in the complaint under which Bostwick was placed under arrest. It was originally intended to have a man named Keller, whom local officers understood to be Peter Keller, swear to the complaint and the warrant was issued in the prosecuting attorney's office after a good deal of effect on the part of local officers. When the complaint was ready to serve the man Keller refused to sign the document and finally E. L. Horne offered to sign and some necessary alterations were made in the reading of the complaint. Local officers were authorized by Justice Patterson of Plymouth to make the changes and she promised to make the necessary correction in her docket to meet the changes made here, but it is evident she neglected to do so, and when the case was called they seemed to have nothing to do but to dismiss the defendant.

At the time of Bostwick's arrest officers took a quantity of liquor which they were prepared to offer in evidence.

The unfortunate outcome of this case only deepens the conviction of Northville people that the local officers have had but little assistance or sympathy from the prosecuting attorney's office during the past two years. When they visited the prosecutor's office to seek a warrant for Bostwick's arrest they were made to feel about as small and insignificant as it is possible to make officers feel who are striving to do their duty, and had Mr. Voorhes or his assistants who handled this case been able to then duty and responsibility they would have discovered this mistake and might have had it corrected before the case was called and a whole lot of Northville people humiliated.

It is no wonder that officers frequently feel "what's the use," and close their eyes to a lot of things that ought to be corrected. They are handicapped, oftentimes, by local justice of the peace on the one hand, and humiliated when they seek the assistance and advice of the county attorney. The wonder is that so many officers do as well as they do under existing circumstances. It is certainly about time there should be a change in the policy now being followed in the office of the prosecuting attorney of Wayne county.

CAPT. E. A. NOBLE DIED SUNDAY NIGHT.

After an illness of several months' duration, Capt. Emory A. Noble died at his home on Rogers street in this village on Sunday night. Mr. Noble came to Northville about twelve years ago after having served as a member of the Detroit police force for many years. He was the first patrolman appointed to the force after the Civil war and for a period of three years he was police captain. During his long service in Detroit he made many friends and acquaintances among the older residents of the city by whom he was held in high esteem and whose friendship he highly prized.

He served the township of Northville for a few years as justice of the peace and as long as his health would permit he was faithful and efficient. He took a great interest in the Order of Eastern Star and served Orient Chapter as worthy patron with dignity and honor.

Mr. Noble was 75 years of age and is survived by his wife, who has the sympathy of a large circle of friends in her sorrow. Funeral services were held at his late home on Wednesday afternoon and were conducted by Rev. E. V. Belles. Burial took place at Rural Hill cemetery.

URGED A MUTUAL UNDERSTANDING.

A number of fans from Farmington were also conspicuous in their joy to see the Northville team pull the victory.

The team that wins the next game will take the entire gate receipts and the boys say that neither cold or snow will stop them from having another real battle so-called next Sunday.

COUNTY TAX LEVY REDUCED.

The county tax levy for the ensuing fiscal year will be \$1,176,604.34 less than that for the last year. The board of county auditors will state in a financial report to be filed Tuesday with the board of supervisors.

There will be required for all county purposes next year \$534,401.75. Of this sum there will be received from other sources of revenue and estimated \$1,304,356.64, leaving a tax levy of \$3,330,045.11. Last year's tax levy was \$5,006,049.45.

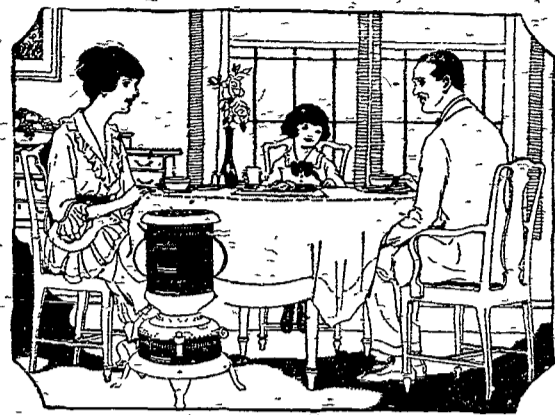
Last year's deficit of \$684,737.74 has been wiped out, the auditors will state, and there is now on hand a balance of \$55,179.73.

There still remains on last year's delinquent tax rolls the sum of \$126,720.60. This, however, includes \$108,443.30 state taxes, which the county is compelled by law to turn over to the state, regardless of whether or not it is collected.—The Detroit Free Press.

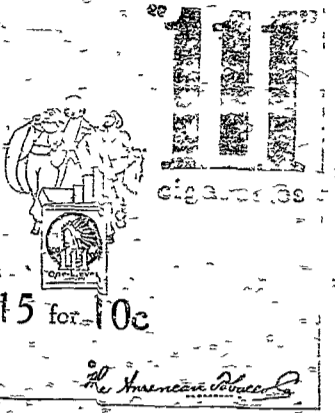

JURIST SCORES 'KANGAROO COURT'

Judge Frank L. Covert in circuit court at Pontiac Saturday expressed disapproval of the "Kangaroo court" as "an institution in the county jail." Wilfred Griffith was before the court charged with failure to pay alimony to his divorced wife. Griffith said the Kangaroo court had taken \$5 as a "contribution" while he was in jail. The circuit judge overruled the decision of the Kangaroo judge and ordered return of the money and its payment to Mrs. Griffith.

H. C. WALLACE TO BE SPEAKER AT M. A. C.

Henry C. Wallace, secretary of agriculture in the Harding cabinet, will deliver an address at the Michigan Agricultural College on Tuesday afternoon, October 31, according to announcement made here this week by President David Friday.

Wallace, who will be on a Michigan speaking tour, will stop off at East Lansing to deliver an agricultural address for students of the college and for central Michigan farmers and business men, who have been invited to attend the meeting.

Cornerstone laying ceremonies for M. A. C.'s two new buildings, now in process of construction, will be held in the morning of the same day, with Secretary Wallace taking part in the formal dedication. The new buildings are a Home Economics Building to cost about \$400,000, and a Library to cost \$450,000.

BIG M. A. C. SHORT COURSE INDICATED.

That there would be a record-breaking enrollment of students for the special sixteen-week course in general agriculture which opens at the Michigan Agricultural College on October 30 was indicated here this week by the advance registrations for the "short course" school.

Economic conditions which have made it impossible for many young men to enroll in the regular four-year agricultural courses at M. A. C., have served to bring the short courses to special demand this year. The short courses give condensed and practical information on various agricultural subjects. Nearly a dozen of these special courses, ranging from one to twelve weeks in length, start later in the fall and winter.

HEALTH MEETING SET FOR DECEMBER 4TH TO 8TH.

Lansing is making extensive preparations to receive hundreds of health officers, public health nurses, physicians and faculty members of the medical colleges who will attend the second annual health conference to be held there December 4th to 8th inclusive, under the auspices of the Michigan Department of Health and Michigan Public Health Association.

Invitations were sent out this week from the department of health to every health worker in Michigan. Early indications are that 1,000 will attend the conference. This year's plan is similar to that of the first conferences held there last year. It is designed as a short course of intensive training in public health work. The program will include lectures on the various communicable diseases, rural health problems, quarantine and the legal aspects of public health. Child hygiene work under the provisions of the Sheppard-Towner law, including the prevention of goitre, will receive special emphasis.

WILL SUPPORT BOYS' AND GIRLS' CLUB WORK.

An appropriation of \$2,000 was voted Friday afternoon by the Oakland county supervisors to be used in furtherance of the county boys' and girls' clubs. The money is to be expended under direction of a committee of three supervisors, of which Chairman Fred Dernberger of Addison township is to be chairman. He has not yet named the other members.

This work has been carried on in the past by the county farm bureau, whose annual appropriation of \$4,000 was this year turned down by the board.

The past year there have been flourishing clubs for children in East Hartland, Hickory Ridge, Highland, two in Milford, Holly, two in Waterford, Clakston, Seymour Lake, Oakwood, North Oxford, two at Rochester, Novi, North Pontiac, Oakwood and Bloomfield—Pontiac Press.

The work of establishing and maintaining the boys' and girls' club work has been done through the county farm bureau and just how it will be handled in the future has not been determined. The board of supervisors refused last week to appropriate \$4,000 for carrying on the work of the farm bureau in Oakland county.

The Oakland county board of supervisors on Monday refused to adopt a resolution to repeal the Covert highway law, and went on record as favoring a one-cent a gallon tax on gasoline, the money to be derived from the tax to be applied on highway work.

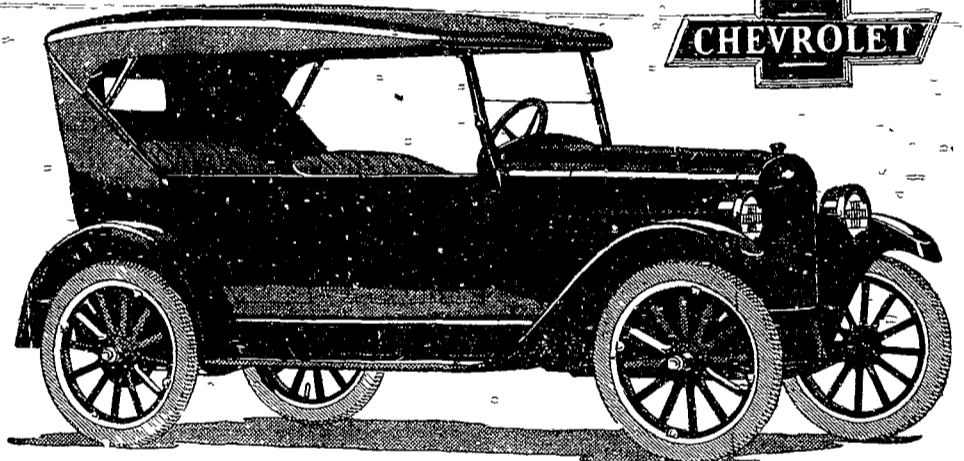

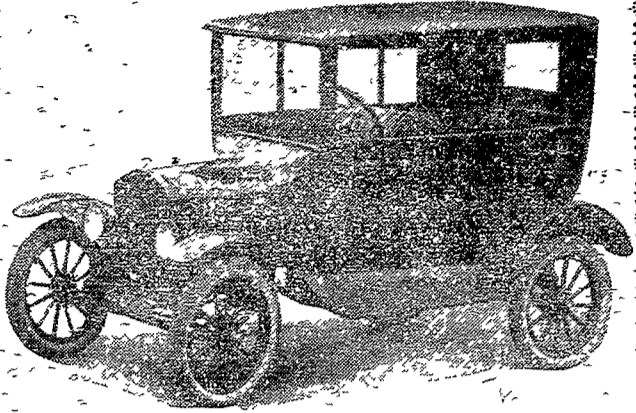

FRANCE SUBMITS REPARATION PLAN

ALL NATIONS OF WORLD INVITED TO JOIN CONFERENCE ON GERMANY.

DIFFERS FROM BRITISH PROJECT.

M. Barthou Declares Moment Has Come When Allies Must Take Energetic Steps.

Paris—Complete and right control of all German finances, power to expenses and regulate trade and authority to dictate the amount of the budgets of the various German states are among the proposals contained in the plan of the French government for a solution of Germany's financial difficulties and placing the country in a position to meet her reparations payments.

The plan was submitted to the Reparations Commission by Louis Barthou, French representative on the commission and discussion of the project has begun.

Though not mentioned in the official summary, Mr. Barthou's plan contemplates a meeting of leading business men of the world to determine Germany's capacity to pay and to consider the question of inter Allied debts.

The plan, in effect, is a reply to the British reparations project recently placed before the commission by Sir John Bradbury. It differs radically from the British point of view.

Mr. Barthou urges the calling of a Brussels conference to deal with a broad reparations settlement and Allied debts and the question of German payments in 1923 and 1924. France would limit the powers of the Reparations Commission to the application of new guarantees and reforms for Germany leaving the more comprehensive issues to an international meeting.

The moment has come, according to M. Barthou, when the Allies must take energetic steps or else see faced by a Germany proclaimed before the world as a ruined nation, despite the fact that her actual capital is near a half a trillion francs, which practically amounts to seizure of the entire country is what France will demand from Germany at the Brussels conference according to information leaking out here.

1 Red Cross Work in Wayne county. (a) During the last fiscal year, a total of \$86,321.49 was spent in Wayne county for the relief of disabled veterans of the World War. Out of this amount, \$39,756.33 was for loans and direct material relief for ex-service men, of which \$17,548.26 was returned by the men.

(b) A total of \$88,765.68 was spent for the various activities of the committee on Nursing Service.

The nurses of this committee made 15,972 visits, assisted in the examination of 11,747 school children, and assisted doctors and dentists provided by the committee at 493 clinics with an attendance of 5,224. Instructors in Home Hygiene and care of the sick organized 26 classes and taught 669 pupils.

(c) The committee on Production spent \$1,664 on new garments, 1,128 pairs of shoes, and 6,281 used garments in good condition for use overseas. It also spent some production for home needs. The expenses for cloth and other material, shipping expenses and salaries of the central work room at Northville, amounted to \$7,199.97.

2 National Association of Red Crosses. (a) The national organization provides a nucleus for chapter work throughout the United States.

(b) During the current year it is spending \$2,000,000 for the relief and care of disabled veterans in government hospitals and at other points.

(c) It is spending in the neighborhood of 2,000,000 for medical and hospital relief in Russia in co-operation with Hoover's American Relief administration.

(d) The national organization has functioned in numerous disasters during the year, at home and abroad. The first week in October, 1922, it was summoned by President Harding to co-operate with the Near East Relief in making provision for a half-million Christian refugees from Asia Minor, following the successful advances of the Turkish army. Red Cross nurses have been ordered to Athens, to provide for sick refugees and thousands of dollars of provisions have already been ordered for the refugees.

24 FAMILIES TRAPPED, 15 DIE

N. Y. Police Looking for Fire Bug Who Started Fire.

New York—Fifteen persons including children, are dead, others are missing, and 20 or more are critically injured, as the result of a fire set by a pyromaniac, that burned two five-story Lexington Avenue tenement houses here Sun. So rapidly did the flames spread that members of the 24 families who were trapped in the buildings had to jump to safety.

After fighting the blaze that started in hallways in baby carriages for hours, an army of firemen, who were handicapped by intense heat finally overcame the fire and began searching ruins for other dead.

Simultaneously police threw out a dragnet for a bandish fire bug, believed to have set Sunday's and four others in the same neighborhood.

DRY SHIP RULING IS EFFECTIVE

Nine Ship Companies Exempt, Pending Decision By Judge Hand.

Washington—Ocean steamers which sailed from foreign ports Sunday for the United States faced the necessity of carefully computing the amount of alcoholic beverages on board against the mileage shown by the ship's daily log. The last stein and decanter must be emptied before the ship crossed the three-mile line marking the accepted limit of American maritime jurisdiction, under an interpretation of the prohibition laws which became effective at 12:01 o'clock Sunday morning.

Fleets of nine ship companies are temporarily exempt from operation of the law by reason of injunction proceedings pending before Federal Judge Hand in New York.

PLEADS FOR WAR PRISONERS

Dr. Ryan Says President Promised Amnesty in Letter.

Washington—President Harding has been taken to task for his refusal to grant general amnesty to political prisoners, in a letter from Dr. John A. Ryan, of the National Catholic Welfare Council.

Dr. Ryan at the same time made public a letter he received from the president on September 26, in which the executive, after reiterating his opposition to general amnesty, wrote:

"In a very short time there will be a considerable number of sentences commuted."

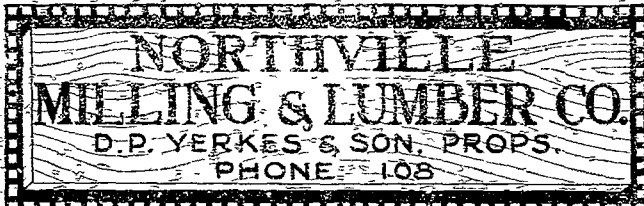
