

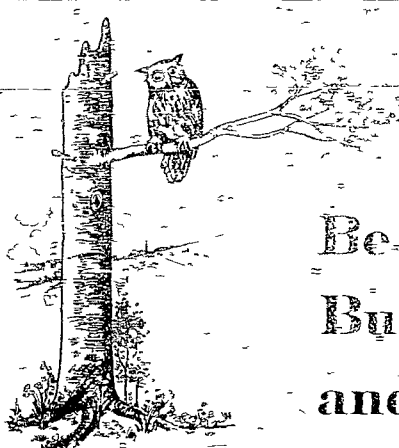

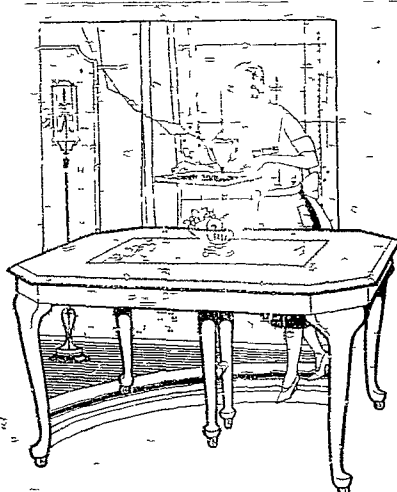

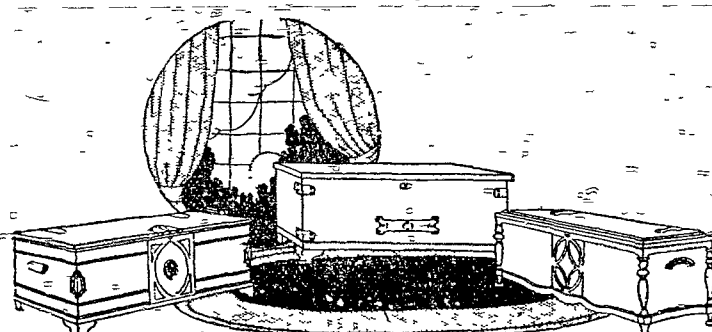

FARM BUREAU WINS IMPORTANT CASE

Farm Bureau membership dues again have been declared legally collectible by the courts. At Centerville, St. Joseph County, Nov. 13, a jury returned a verdict favorable to the Farm Bureau in a suit to collect \$20 delinquent dues from John E. Davis of Constantine. The suit was remarkable in that five of the state's most prominent attorneys were involved in a justice court proceeding which lasted three days. The jury returned a verdict for the Farm Bureau after 15 minutes deliberation. The verdict was based on the legal collectibility of the membership.

The Farm Bureau attorneys charged in open court that interests hostile to the Farm Bureau are stirring up membership dues suits in an effort to discredit the Farm Bureau. If this is so, it is believed the case will be appealed.

FARM STUDENTS TO BUILD RADIO SETS

A plan whereby all students in the various agricultural short courses at the Michigan Agricultural college this winter will have the chance to assemble their own radio receiving sets has been announced by Ashley K. Berridge, assistant director of winter courses at the college.

Plans and material for the work will be furnished by the M. A. C. farm mechanics department, and all students in the various special agricultural courses will be given the chance to enter the "wireless manufacturing" field.

Great interest in radio work among rural communities and the demand from many students for information on building home sets led to the installation of the special work.

Many of the short winter courses open on January 1, with others starting in February and March. Catalog and information on the courses may be had by writing to Director of Short Courses, M. A. C., East Lansing.

ADDS MOTORCARS TO PATROL SQUAD

More vigorous efforts to reduce violations of motor vehicle laws in Oakland county, particularly on the Detroit-Pontiac road, were announced by Sheriff James S. Butler.

From now on, in addition to the regular motorcycle patrol which has been maintained on all country highways during daylight hours and on heavily traveled roads at night, motorcycle officers in touring cars will maintain a night patrol on the main highways.

Because motorists are familiar with the motorcycle service of the county, many offenders are able to avoid prosecution. When the officers use a touring car, however, offenders, it is believed, will not be aware of their approach and many cases of reckless driving, speeding and running without tail lights will be detected.

Sheriff Butler is determined to make Oakland highways safer for careful drivers and his new plan is calculated to bring all offenders to justice—Pontiac Press.

REDUCED FARES TO STOCK SHOW

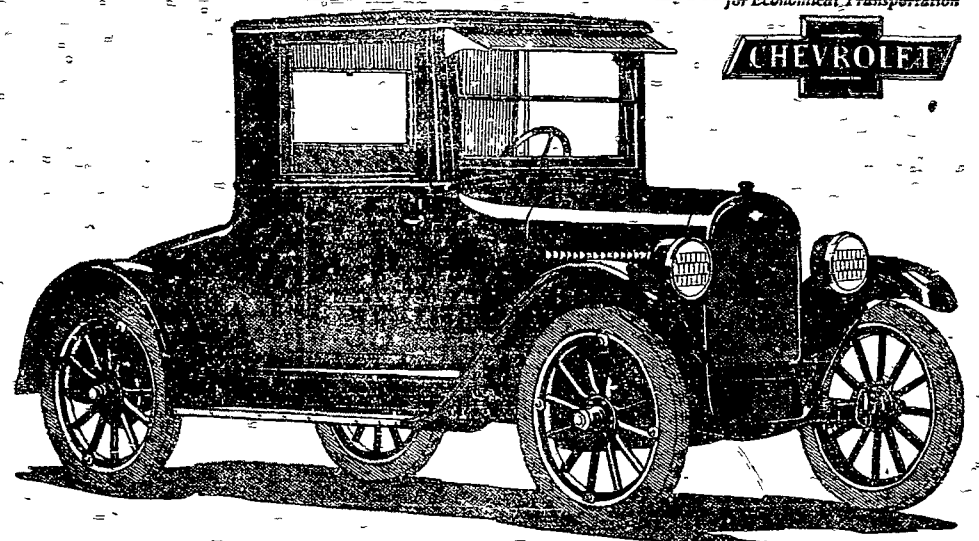

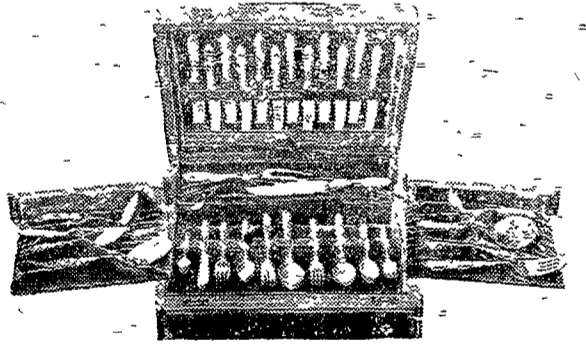

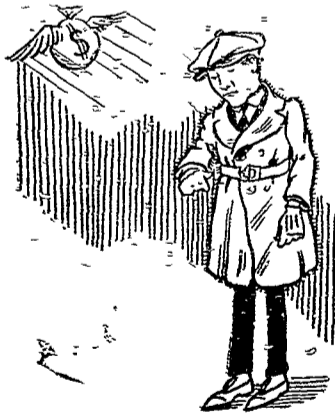

AT DETROIT THEATRES.

Leo Ditrichstein, first of our gay comedians and creator of so many famous roles, returns to Detroit Sunday, November 26th, after a season's absence for the first presentation of Ben Hecht's play "Under False Pretenses," at the Garrick theatre. Mr. Ditrichstein comes direct from his long and brilliantly successful run in Chicago. To assist Mr. Ditrichstein in this first important dramatic work of the well-known Chicago novelist and newspaper man is a company of well known players who have been carefully chosen for a group of unusual types largely drawn from newspaper life and the world of the theatre.

There will be a gala matinee on Thanksgiving Day and another on Saturday, the Wednesday matinee being omitted on account of the holiday.

Sheridan's "The School for Scandal," one of the most brilliant plays of the past two centuries, and yet a play of vivid, fascinating interest and modern manners, will be offered by the Bonstelle company at the Shubert-Michigan next week, with Miss Bonstelle playing the role of Lady Teazle, which was last played in Detroit in 1904 by Ada Renan, who played the role with the Augustus Daly company in New York. The "School for Scandal" is all that the name implies, but withal there is a vein of comedy, a vein of satire, and a vein of romance that has been equaled by few other writers. Since the days of Shakespeare, down to a very few recent years, few plays have survived, and these plays might be mentioned as Oliver Goldsmith's "She Stoops to Conquer" and Sheridan's "Rivals" and "The School for Scandal."

Detroit is to have a world premier of a notable film play next week when the Broadway Strand presents Harry Garson's production of "An Old Sweetheart of Mine," a heart-interesting story based on the famous James Waincomb Ruxton poem. Before leaving the distribution rights to a leasing corporation, Mr. Garson reserved one week for showing of "An Old Sweetheart of Mine" in Detroit at the theatre he once controlled. Therefore this engagement is positively for one week only. "An Old Sweetheart of Mine" is full of homely human touches—a picture of small town types—the lovable folks we meet in our daily life. The story reveals a generous amount of wholesome comedy, and a love story that carries the spectator along to a gripping climax.

"Douglas Fairbanks in Robin Hood" opens its fourth week next Sunday at the Orpheum theatre, under the auspices of Shadukiam Grotto. "Rest and good food, fresh air and freedom from worry, the sanatorium superintendent told John Reilly, when he gave him his final chest examination.

John was not cured, of course, but he was so much improved that the superintendent believed that he might complete the cure in his own home.

But at home John Reilly had three children and a frail wife, and rest, on which the doctor had laid so much emphasis, was a prescription he could not follow, except at their expense. Ten days after he left the sanatorium he went to work at his old job on the section.

Last week, in answer to a letter of inquiry, he wrote this account of himself to the Michigan Tuberculosis Association.

"We were laying rails this summer and the boss put me to flagging or I couldn't have stood it.

"I haven't had any examination since I left the sanatorium. I have

lost some weight and I've been having some pleurisy. I'm right as to the last now.

Probably it is the Michigan Tuberculosis Association that has helped me. It is no a pauper with me that he had a home on which I could depend.

Given a chance to take proper care of himself for a few months longer, he might reasonably be expected to be cured of a permanent nature.

But if he were to struggle through days of hard work and worry now, in the hopeless effort to do the work of a well man, the end of John Reilly's story is certain and near at hand.

AN ORDINANCE Fixing and Regulating Use of Sewers by Private Persons.

(Approved November 7, 1922) An Ordinance fixing and regulating the use of sewers by private individuals in the Village of Northville and prescribing the manner of construction and of connections, and providing for the punishment of violations of this Ordinance. The Village of Northville Ordains: Section 1. The Sanitary Sewer System and the Storm Water Sewer System of the Village of Northville consists of two separate and distinct systems of main and lateral conduits with the necessary accessories.

Section 2. No person, firm or corporation shall impair, break or remove any portion of any man-hole or any part of the sewer systems or their appurtenances or cause to be thrown or deposited in any sewer opening or receptacle connecting with the sewer system, any garbage, refuse, dead animals, vegetable parings, ashes, cinders, fags, newspapers, gasoline, oil or any other thing which may be liable to injure the sewers or obstruct the flow.

Section 3. All connections of house sewers, drain or plumbing work with the sewer system of the Village of Northville shall be made in accordance with the provisions of this ordinance and the provisions of the ordinance and housing code of Michigan, being Act No. 10 of the Public Acts of 1917.

Section 4. No connection with any sewer of the sanitary system or storm water system of the Village of Northville and no extension of any house drain from a connection previously made shall be made by any person, firm or corporation until a written permit for doing the same shall have been obtained from the Village Clerk.

Section 5. Applications for permits to connect with the sewer system must be made in writing by the owner of the property to be drained, or his authorized agent. Such application shall give the exact location of the property, number of lot, number of feet front, number of buildings to be connected and shall state the kind of connection whether "sanitary" or "storm water," and shall be made on the blanks furnished for the purpose.

Section 6. At least twenty-four hours notice must be given at the office of the Village Clerk before any street or public way can be opened for the purpose of laying a house drain. No work of laying house drains shall be commenced or continued unless permit is on the line of the work.

Section 7. No excavating for house drains shall begin until location of Y-branch or point of connection has been designated by the Village Clerk. The person making the loose connection shall commence excavating at the point indicated on the main sewer or lateral and when the same is uncovered and banks properly sheeted, notice shall be given the Village Clerk to provide a tapper.

Section 8. All corks laid from the connection at the main sewer provided by the Village tapper to and including connection with the house line shall be inspected as laid and shall be subject to the approval of the Village Inspector. The cost of the Village Inspector shall be deducted from the deposit provided for inspection and the balance returned to the owner after the connection has been accepted and approved.

MICHIGAN GROWERS WIN AT POTATO SHOW.

Potato growers of Michigan, exhibiting at the International Potato Show held at Duluth, Minnesota, last week, won unusually high honors, according to word just received from J. W. Weston, potato specialist at the Michigan Agricultural college, who attended the big show.

Competing against entries from the leading potato growing sections of the entire continent, Michigan men managed to make a clean sweep of prizes in the Russet rural class, and to score notable victories in other classes as well.

In the Russet rural field, Ernest Pettifor of Gaylord, won first place; Brudy Brothers of Wolverine, second; Frank Wyreck of Alanson, third; Lee Sneathen, Charleyoux, fourth; and W. L. Thomas of Afton fifth.

There were 27 exhibits from Michigan, four of which came from the Upper Peninsula. D. B. Jewell, county agricultural agent in Cheboygan county, was in charge of the state exhibits.

Section 10. All backfilling over that part of any house drain, within the boundaries of any street, alley or public grounds, must be either thoroughly puddled or tamped in layers, not exceeding six inches in thickness, and the question which shall be done shall be determined by the Village Clerk. Gravel or paving in roadways shall be replaced to the full satisfaction of the village.

Section 11. No connection with any sewer of the sanitary sewer system shall be made, excepting as herein provided for, and any person who shall make a permit or cause to be made a connection with such sewer in a manner contrary to the provisions of this ordinance, shall, upon conviction in the justice courts, be fined any sum not less than ten dollars, and not more than one hundred dollars in the discretion of the court, and any person who shall fail to remove any private drain connected with the sanitary sewers of the storm sewers of the Village of Northville within ten days after being notified by the Village Clerk that the same is unlawfully made, shall be subject to a penalty of five dollars for each day that such forbidden connection shall continue.

Section 12. No cesspool, privy or any method of sewage disposal shall be maintained or used in said Village after two years from date and connections with the sewers shall be such all residences and other buildings in such Village not hereafter disposing of any sewage therefrom.

Section 13. This Ordinance shall take effect thirty days after the passage thereof by the Council of the Village of Northville, Michigan. Passed by the Council of the Village of Northville, Michigan, this 7th day of November A. D. 1922.

Slemmons, Grand Rapids, city health officer, W. C. Hoar, Ann Arbor, professor of engineering, University of Michigan, Bruce I. Miller, Ann Arbor, Ann Arbor Times News, Dr. Guy L. Kiefer, Detroit, president of the Michigan public health association, Dr. A. H. Garvin, Detroit, medical director of the Detroit Tuberculosis Sanatorium and Dr. H. F. Vaghan, Detroit, city health commissioner. All communities are urged to send representatives.

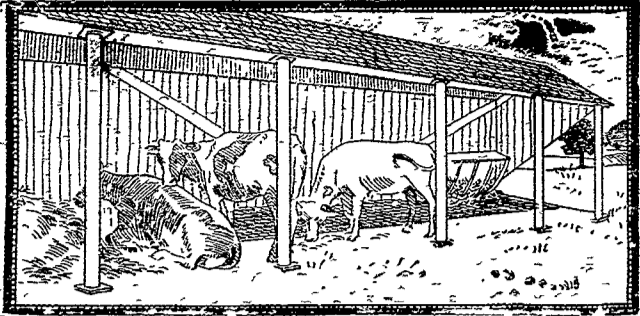

(Continued from page 1). Boston, Brooklyn and in 1865, Court Robin Hood was instituted in New York, making the second Court for that city.

By authority of the High Court of England a Subsidiary High Court was formed in the United States on December 29th, 1874, there being at that time 43 Courts in this country. The order flourished for many years and the eleventh meeting of the Subsidiary High Court was held in Detroit on August 11th, 1885. The Detroit meeting boldly refused to strike out the word "white" from its application blanks as directed by the High Court of England, and as a result of other arbitrary rulings made by the High Court it was decided to withdraw from under the jurisdiction of England and to form an American High Court, which was done. When the High Court of England found it could not control the Courts over here an effort was made to destroy them but in this they were defeated. There were 18 Courts that voted to stand by England and Michigan was among the number. In spite of this disaffection within its ranks the order continued to grow and at the thirteenth annual meeting of the Subsidiary High Court held at Minneapolis, Minn., on August 13th, 1889, there were 400 delegates present. At that meeting it was voted to sever connection with the High Court of England, and a new preamble was adopted setting forth the objects and purposes of the order, and thus the Ancient Order of Foresters of America was founded. Many changes were made in the by-laws of the order at the Minneapolis convention, among them being the word "liberty" added to the motto of the order, causing the new motto to read "Liberty, Unity, Benevolence and Concord."

There are now in the United States about 200,000 Foresters and the influence of the order have been helpful and inspiring. A loyal Forester does not wrong his neighbor, he assists the sick and the afflicted and he strives to live each day a life that will be acceptable to the Great Teacher of all men.

Since the American courts ceased from English control more than \$3,600,000.00 has been paid in sick and funeral benefits.

MARSHAL PLEADED GUILTY TO ASSAULT AND BATTERY CHARGE

As the outcome of an affair which occurred at the school grounds last Friday night in which Walter Ely and Marshal Ernie Lyke got in a "mix up" and as a result of which Ely claimed to have been struck upon the head with a pair of hand-cuffs by the village marshal, the latter was arrested Saturday morning by a deputy sheriff from Detroit and taken before Justice Phoebe Patterson of Plymouth. After listening to the reading of the complaint Lyke pleaded guilty to the charge of assault and battery and asked the leniency of the court. After having received his plea of guilty and listening to his explanation of the affair and his admission that he had been too hasty in the matter, he was permitted to go home, after paying the costs in the case, which amounted to \$5.00.
