tradition tells us that rigin, and Robin Hood and his great men were nembers of the order, that Sherwood Forest was their rendezvous, and that the growth of the Order of Foresters in England was coeval with the great of the Knights Templar While the Foresters roamed through Sherwood Forest and levied upon the nobles and the clergy, the Crusaders erowded upon Palestine and slaughtered the unbelieving Saracens However, the exact date of the formation of the Order of Foresters has never as helieved to have een about the time of the Norman Conquest, or the year 1066. order did not thrive, however, until a great many years after that period, but we are told in history that in 1468 the undaunted Robert Hilyard had 20,000 brave Foresters under his leadership Court No. 1 of the Ancient Order of Foresters was instituted in the parish of Leeds, England, in the eighteenth century, but the exact date is not known, though it is believed to have been formed October 29th, 1745. At the end of 1799-the court had a membership of but 80 During the next few years the pioneer court made great-efforts to extend the order, but the growth was slow. In 1802 a second Court was instituted at Pudsey; between Leeds and Bradford. It was a serious thing to become a Forester in England in those days, and its members were sworn to the greatest secrecy. In 1814 there were four courts in existence, and the Supreme Court was formed. At a meeting of the Supreme Court held at Manches ter, England, in 1834, there were 297

Forestry was first planted in Canada in 1843, when Court Maple was instituted in Montreal. The first Court was established in the United State at Phileadelphia, Pa, in the year 1832, under a dispensation issued by the Leeds Court. In the early par of 1841 Court General Washington was

2 (Approved November 7, 1922) An Ordinance fixing and regulating the use of sewers by private individ-uals in the Village of Northville and rescribing the manner of construc-on and of connections, and providing of the punishment of violations of

SANITARY AND STORM WATER
SEWER SYSTEMS

Section 1. The Santary Sewer System and the Storm Water Sewer System of the Village of Northville consists of two separare and distinct systems of main and lateral conductivity with the necessary accessories Th SANITARY SEWER SYSTEM is de-SANTARY SEWER SYSTEM IS Ge-signated to carry off all liquid house waster as faeces, urine, the necessary water closet paper, liquid house or mill slops No roof water, surface water or storm water or any sort water of any solution water of any shall be connected with the Sanitary Sewer System. The STOR'S NATER SEWER SYSTEM is designated for dramage purposes to care for surfact water, sub-surface drailage water, roof water and storm water. No house wastes or sewage shall be connected to the Storm water Sewer
System. The sewers in the streets or System. The sewers in the servers of alleys passing the various lots are called afrain or lateral sewers, the sewers reading from the main or lateral sewers to the property or either side are called house drains.






