

The residence on the farm has recently been remodeled and refurnished throughout and made into an ideal home and the gathering was planned as sort of a formal opening of the house. The disagreeable weather did not keep any of the members at home who could possibly make the journey and the cordial welcome extended by Mr. Maybury as they entered the house dispelled all the clouds. Soon after twelve o'clock Mr. Maybury announced that luncheon was ready and before entering the dining room the guests were collectively introduced to Miss M. Enright, former county clerk and for some years postmaster of Detroit whose presence added greatly to the pleasure of the gathering because with his fund of stories told as only Mr. Enright can relate them, he kept the merry company in splendid humor. ## MAN KILLED BY BULL AT STARKWEATHER'S

August Rzeppa, who had been employed at the farm of E. M. Starkweather for the past six months, was killed by a bull in the cattle yard while feeding cattle Monday night about six o'clock, his chest being so badly crushed that he died almost instantly.

It seems that Rzeppa and one other employee of the farm, taking advantage of Mr. Starkweather's absence, had been drinking during the day and when feeding time came the unfortunate fellow ventured into the yard, although he had been cautioned not to do so. As he was distributing feed among the cattle the bull charged him striking him against the side of the barn. The animal did not again charge its unfortunate victim as animals usually do but stood quietly and unprovoked beside the prostrate form of Rzeppa. Other employees rescued the body from the yard and a physician was called, but nothing could be done.

The body was brought to Schrader Brothers' funeral chapel and prepared for burial and on Tuesday afternoon it was taken to Detroit. Rzeppa was 51 years of age.

## NORTHVILLE TO HAVE COMMUNITY CHRISTMAS CELEBRATION.

## GOOD NEWS FOR OWNERS OF 1919 WAR SAVINGS STAMPS.

The Northville postmaster announces that the U. S. treasury department has authorized him to offer owners of 1919 War Savings stamps an opportunity to renew their investment at a higher interest rate. Although the 1919 stamps do not mature until January 1, 1924, owners of this issue may exchange their stamps now for the new 4 1/2% treasury savings certificates. Every 1919 stamp presented at the post office this month will be accepted at its face value of five dollars as used as part payment for one or more new certificates dated January 1, 1924. This opportunity should appeal to every one who holds War Savings stamps.

## U. R. ESTABLISHING FREIGHT TRUCKING LINES.

A new motor trucking line established by the Detroit United Railway Trucking company, a subsidiary of the electric railway, was opened November 14. The motor trucks operate from the company's freight house in Jackson and run through Haverhill, Moscow, Jonesville, Hillsdale, Allen, Quincy, Coldwater, Easton, Bronson, Barr Oak and Sturgis leaving the terminals daily at 8 a. m. The primary purpose of the service is to connect with the trolley freight operation between Detroit and Jackson, but at the same time provision is made whereby freight originating in Jackson will be carried to the points named. After leaving the trolley terminal, the trucks will make both pick-up and delivery for those receiving and shipping. The establishment of the freight trucking line is experimental and its continuance depends upon the volume of business developed.

## LIVE STOCK SHOW AT DETROIT.

L. W. Lovewell of South Lyon, and who is well known in this section, will have charge of the livestock sale at the Detroit Stock Yards on the 10-11th and 12th of December. The entire exhibit consisting of between 40 and 50 carloads of choice stock (hogs, cattle, sheep) will be sold at auction. Nearly two carloads of stock from this vicinity will be entered at this show and shipment will be made Saturday, December 8th, to the local yards.

This is the second show of this kind to be held in this state. Last year the champion steer brought \$600 per pound and the champion carload brought 40¢ per pound. This price beat the International show at Chicago. Sale takes place Tuesday, December 11th at 1.00 p. m. Those interested are cordially invited to visit the yards where Mr. Lovewell will be glad to receive them and explain how the business is handled at that end.

## SOUTH LYON COW HAS FIVE RECORD.

An exceptional record for butter production was made recently by Joanna Perfection, Pentiac Lass of the Muscott Bros' herd, of South Lyon, according to the advanced registration of the Holstein-Friesian association of America.

At the age of two years and six months this cow produced 3519 lbs. milk containing 17,515 pounds butterfat equal to 22.26 pounds of butter in seven days.—South Lyon Herald.

## ALFALFA IS PROVING FARMER'S MONEY CROP.

Michigan farmers, according to Prof. J. F. Cox of the farm crops department of the M. A. C., have learned that hay, especially alfalfa, is a big money crop. One of the best showings of alfalfa in dollars and cents has been reported to the college by D. F. Rainey, extension specialist in crops, who brought in statistics of a 25-acre field of A. A. Pattullo of Deckerville, Sanilac county. The first cutting of alfalfa was two tons per acre, the report said. The second growth was left for seed and produced 40 bushels, sold to the local elevator for \$15 a bushel.

In hay and seed together, Mr. Rainey estimated, the 25 acres brought in \$60 an acre, or \$1,500 altogether.

## STATE NEWS IN BRIEF

**Detroit**—Of 231 applicants for automobile licenses, only 85 or 86 per cent passed the second day of the new revised police examinations.

**Lansing**—Appointment of Dean R. S. Shaw as head of the Michigan Agricultural college during the next year, was announced by the state board of agriculture.

**Corunna**—The East-Michigan Conference of the Free Methodist Church holding its annual meeting here, elected officers and made assignments of pastors for the ensuing year.

**Saginaw**—Changes costing about \$16,000 are being made in the west side schools here to remove fire dangers pointed out by inspectors of the Michigan Fire Prevention association in a recent inspection.

**Grand Rapids**—The proposed abolition of general property taxes and the suggestion that the state government be financed by specific taxes has received the approval of the Michigan Real Estate association.

**Lansing**—State-owned cement and board ordered a reduction of the state tax of \$1,300,000. The tax this year will be \$1,600,000, as compared with \$1,700,000 in 1922. The rate will be approximately \$2.32 a \$1,000, as compared with \$1.03 last year.

**Grand Rapids**—The largest deal in the history of Grand Rapids will be completed when the Michigan State Telephone company will give its check for \$3,851,755 in favor of the Citizens Telephone company, in payment for the properties of the latter concern, which are to be merged with the Bell company's holdings.

**Battle Creek**—Declaring that the operation of interurban freight trains through the business district of Battle Creek has become a nuisance, Mayor Charles C. Green instructed City Attorney John Wegener to investigate action necessary to eliminate freight trains in city streets during rush hours of the day.

**Lansing**—State-owned cement and fertilizer plants are feasible, according to the preliminary findings of R. A. Smith, state geologist who recently undertook an investigation at the order of the state administrative board. There are lime deposits on state-owned land near Wolverine. There are also many deposits in the Charlevoix and Alpena districts.

**Port Huron**—Unless the city commission appeals to the State Supreme Court from the decision of Judge Harry J. Dingeman, Port Huron electors will have opportunity to vote in the adoption of the new revised city charter, which provides a commissioner-manager form of government to replace the present city commission, composed of a mayor and four commissioners.

**Battle Creek**—Without food for six days, a former soldier in the German army was found unconscious on the sidewalk. He was taken to police headquarters where he was revived and given nourishment. Through an interpreter he told his experiences. He said he was robbed in Detroit and had been in the United States only three months. Later he accepted a job in a junk yard.

**Lansing**—"Broke" and unable to borrow from the banks, Arenac county appealed to the state administrative board for funds to keep up the highways in that county. The county owes the state about \$25,000 for road construction purposes. The state was indebted to the county to the extent of \$6,000 for maintenance. Governor Groesbeck and the other members of the board decided to advance the portion of the county maintenance fund now due.

**Marine City**—Edmond E. Moss, of Port Huron, D. U. R. Conductor, is dead as the result of a Rapid Railway wreck just north of Marine City. A special north-bound car, running without passengers was waiting at a switch for orders when another north-bound limited crashed into it from the rear. Conductor Moss received a shower of broken glass on the neck and face. Several arteries in his throat were severed and he bled to death within a few seconds.

**Muskegon**—A. J. Hunter has been in a serious condition as a result of a bite from a strange bug, which has caused suffering to several other people at the fashionable Lake Harbor resort. It was necessary to operate on Mr. Hunter's arm. A reward has been offered by Lake Harbor summer residents for information throwing some light on the nature of the insect. Some have expressed the belief that it is a mosquito from the tropical countries, which at rare intervals is found in this section.

**Detroit**—Charles B. Warren, former ambassador to Japan, and just returned from Mexico, where he served as high commissioner for the United States, arrived in Detroit, and forthwith silenced all rumors that he might become minister to Mexico with this statement: "I regard my mission as completed. Therefore, under no consideration would I accept appointment as ambassador to Mexico, and I have so informed President Coolidge and Secretary of State Hughes." Mr. Warren spent three months in Mexico City.

**Detroit**—Street car fares have been boosted from five to six cents. Transfers cost one cent extra.

**Saginaw**—Sugar beet yields of from eight to nine tons an acre are expected by sugar company officials.

**Mt. Clemens**—Charles D. Straight, editor and manager of the Daily Leader is dead.

**Fruitport**—Lightning came down the chimney on a home here, separated the pipe and then set fire to a broom.

**Sault Ste. Marie**—Soo police are seeking a bold bandit who stole the police patrol from in front of the police station.

**Cadillac**—"Concrete paving for the Mackinaw Trail, from the State line to the Straits" is the slogan of the Trail Association.

**Saginaw**—Less than 100 tons of anthracite coal now is in the hands of local dealers, according to a survey just completed. Little more is expected.

**Ionia**—Contracts were awarded at Ionia for the construction of 11.14 miles of road in Ionia and Montcalm counties; for what is known as the Colgrove state highway.

**Cadillac**—The hardest rain of the summer recently quenched all the forest fires in Westford County. The rain was general, extending from east of Cadillac to Manistee.

**Saginaw**—The local office of the United States veterans' bureau will be closed December 31 and work in this territory thereafter will be handled from the Detroit office.

**Camp Custer**—Colonel T. J. Powers, of Detroit, chief of staff of the 55th division, has been transferred to Washington, where he becomes assistant director of the budget.

**Detroit**—A letter signed by the mayor inviting David Lloyd George to visit Detroit during his American tour was sent to the former premier of Great Britain. Lloyd George is expected in this country in October.

**Hastings**—The new \$200,000 Penrock Hospital was formally opened here. Building began last spring. The building will replace the old hospital, which once was the home of Daniel Stryker, former Michigan secretary of state.

**Detroit**—The \$5,000,000 bond issue voted for street railway extensions last spring, approximately \$1,600,000 of which already has been expended in anticipation of the sale of the securities, was declared illegal Wednesday by Corporation Counsel Richard I. Lawson.

**Buchanan**—Pilot Jack Knight was at the bedside of his sick father here after a 1,000-mile race with death half way across the continent. Knight's flight set a long distance record for night flying. He came from Cheyenne, Wyo., in 10 hours and 15 minutes.

**Charlevoix**—Thousands of dollars is being spent by the Pennsylvania Railroad company near Elmira to prevent another long transportation tie-up, such as was caused last winter by snow blockades, gangs of men, with plows, scrapers and teams are leveling almost a mile.

**Ironwood**—The stand the American Legion should take on the Eighteenth Amendment, the Volstead Act, and state administration policies were the topics of discussion among delegates to the state convention which opened here. There is a diversified opinion regarding just what should be the stand on all alcoholic beverages.

**Durand**—Blame for the wreck of the Knights Templar special train from Grand Rapids to Flint, in which five persons were killed and 27 injured near Durand, June 5, is officially placed on poor track conditions, and operating officers of the Grand Trunk Western railroad are held responsible, in a report published at the interstate commerce commission offices at Washington.

**Petoskey**—That northern Michigan Emmet, Charlevoix, Otsego, Cheboygan counties—soon will become the chief source of supply of seed potatoes for Pennsylvania, Ohio, Indiana and some other states, was the prediction made here following the visit of the second annual Michigan potato tour. Interest in potato growing is increasing in northern Michigan, where scientific methods are being studied in an effort to produce more and better potatoes to the acre.

**Muskegon**—The cold weather has brought an end to extensive moonshine operations in Muskegon and other Western Michigan counties, according to Charles Walker, special liquor law enforcement officer here. "The biggest stills have been located in the woods and swamps in Western Michigan during the summer," explained Mr. Walker. "The moonshiner is too wise now to operate inside. It requires warm weather for mash to work, and the first cool night ends operations."

**Lansing**—A "fleet" of automobiles, containing false gasoline tanks, will tour the state, making test purchases of gasoline. The effectiveness of this contrivance was illustrated in the arrest of a dealer in Detroit. A customer becoming suspicious of the amount of gas he was receiving, installed a false tank in his machine. "Five" gallons of gasoline purchased turned out to be four. The dealer was given thirty days in jail and fined \$100. "The slightest shortage will result in prosecution," Commissioner of Agriculture declared.



Every household should connect up with the sewer system and thereby make it more effective. Connecting up with the system eliminates those conditions to which the State of Michigan objects. The state was primarily responsible for putting the sewers in last year.

The Council is very proud of the sanitary engineering handled by Clarence W. Hubbell and of the results which he has obtained from contractors.

The Council has been doing a big volume of business during the past 18 months and this report gives you the cost of one big job they have handled.





Gentlemen: I am enclosing you herewith copy of a letter this day sent to Mr. Williams, attorney for the Pere Marquette company, regarding the Northville bridge. I think the letter is self-explanatory.

I wish you would have the records of Northville examined to ascertain what, if any, agreement was made with the Pere Marquette Railway company or the Monroe-Howell company.

In the Grand Blanc case, the records were searched, and neither the municipality or the railway company could produce any written instrument showing the agreement made at the time the bridge was first built.
