The late afternoon hours were given over to the reunion and business meeting and the following officers were chosen for the ensuing year: President, W. G. Taft; vice-president, Miss Elizabeth Lapham; secretary, Miss Ada Ely, treasurer, Harold Bloom.

Soon after six o'clock the banquet was announced and the guests marched into the gymnasium and found their places at the attractive tables. The gymnasium was beautifully decorated for the occasion, a color scheme of yellow, white and green being carried out in the baskets of field daisies which ornamented each table and white disks which floated in the air or were suspended by dainty yellow and white streamers, while the balcony rail was gaily interwoven with green branches. The second game will be between Northville's team and the Times Good Roads Tigers and the contest gives promise of being the best of the season thus far.

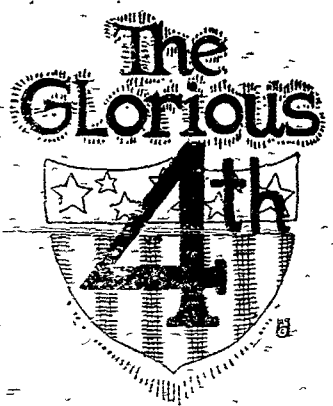
The public is cordially invited to attend the games and to spend a pleasant half day in Northville.

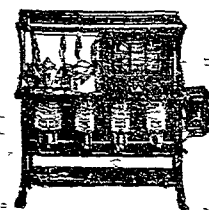

# TO TRAIN SUNDAY SCHOOL WORKERS.

The Michigan Sunday School Council of Religious Education has established a school for the special training of Sunday-school teachers. For this year the school will convene July 6th near Benton Harbor, at Camp Warren; the beautiful nature spot set aside by the late E. K. Warren of featherbone fame. The school continues for eleven days at a cost, including board, cottage, books and tuition, of less than \$20.00. Choice cottages have been built on the grounds. An administration building and dining hall and other conveniences to make the grounds attractive and comfortable for the registered workers have been erected and installed.

Persons registering are permitted to take three courses, one in Bible Study, one in Psychology or Pedagogy and one in specialization work and Methods of Teaching specific groups. Study periods are designated from time to time, but the greater part of the afternoon has been set aside for recreation, including a period for swimming. The evening vespers on the hillside provides an attractive close for the day. Those who have registered in the past years are unanimous in their expressions of personal help secured at the school. Students interested in registering should communicate with the Michigan Sunday School Council at Lansing. No person under sixteen years of age is admitted. Pupils of mature years are particularly wanted. The registration fee of \$2.00 is all the tuition that is required and this amount should be sent to the above address in time to guarantee the necessary accommodations as the grounds are limited.

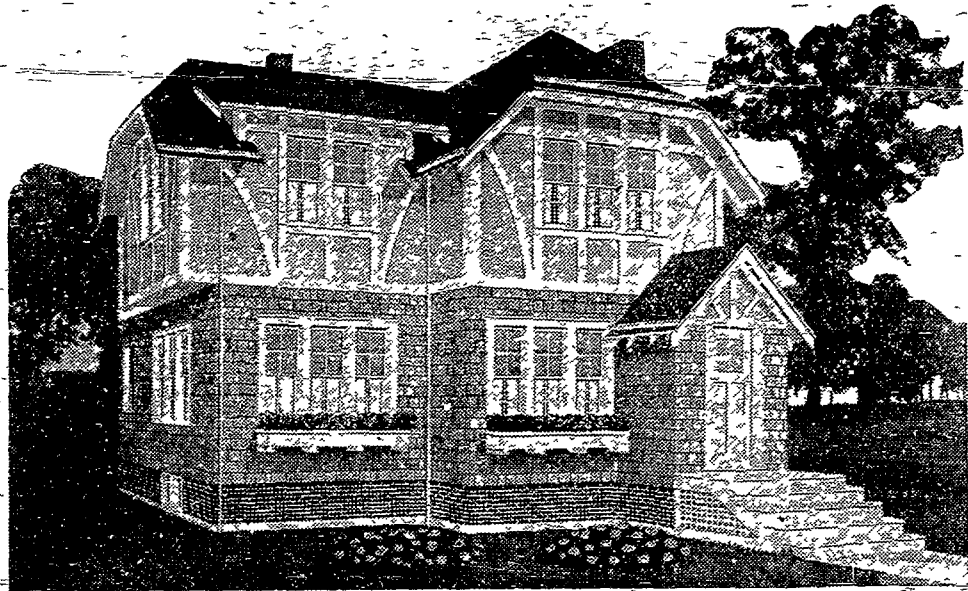



### UNUSUAL HAPPENINGS AND OTHER BRIEF NEWS

#### Coolidges Quit Capitol

Washington—President Coolidge and Mrs. Coolidge, accompanied by a staff of secretaries and attendants have left Washington to spend the summer in Swampscott, Mass.

#### Form New Railway Corporation

Indianapolis—Articles of incorporation have been filed here for the Chicago South Shore & South Bend Railway Co. in a corporation organized by Samuel Insull and his associates for the purpose of taking over the Chicago, Lake Shore & South Bend Railway Co., which is now in receivership.

#### Shepherd Goes Free

Chicago—William Darling Shepherd has been declared not guilty by a jury here after one of the most sensational murder trials on record. Shepherd was accused of having murdered his ward, William McClinlock with typhoid germs in order to obtain a million dollar estate of which he was the heir.

#### Mountain of Rocks Forms Lake

Cheyenne, Wyo.—Western Wyoming has a new and rapidly growing mountain lake, according to a report received here, which said that a great mountain of rocks forming on one side of a canon on the Gros Ventre River in the heart of the Teton National forest, toppled from its base and across the stream.

#### French Royalists Fined

Paris—Thirty-five royalists, members of an organization called the "King's Henchmen," were fined 16 francs each in police court for carrying revolvers. The judge said he only imposed a misdemeanor fine, although more severe punishment was permitted by the law because of recent communist threats against royalists and attempts to assassinate royalist leaders.

#### Mac Millan Expedition Sails

Wiscasset, Me.—While whisties shipped a farewell and thousands lined the banks of the Sheepscot raised a last thunderous cheer, the MacMillan navy Arctic expedition, comprising the staunch little vessels Peary and Bowdoin, headed down stream for the open sea and the voyage of adventure that may take Lieutenant Commander Donald B. MacMillan and his comrades to unexplored lands around the north pole.

#### Ship Passengers Serve Selves

Manila—Passengers aboard the Dollar Line President Adams, arriving here from Hongkong, reported they were forced to cook their own meals, "eat on tables" and clean their state rooms during the voyage, due to a strike of Chinese stewards at Hongkong.

As the stewards quit the vessel, shortly before the sailing hour, the President Adams dashed from the pier to prevent loss of the entire Chinese crew.

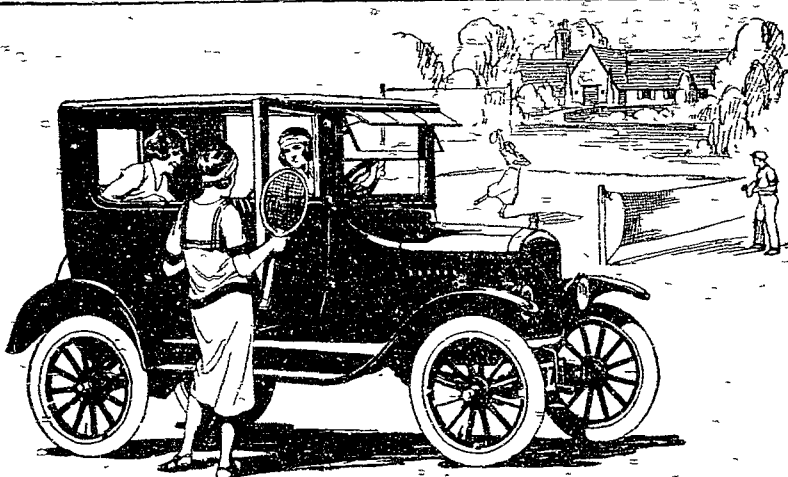

## CROPS AND SOILS MEN TO MEET IN MICHIGAN.

Leading crops and soils specialists of the nation will visit Michigan on July 9th and 10th, when the annual meeting of the society of Agronomy is held at the Michigan State College. While most of the delegates are expected from the "corn belt" states, representation from all parts of the country is assured.

During the two day convention, the visiting farm experts will study various phases of Michigan agriculture, with especial attention to improvement work in scientific fields. The time will be divided evenly between

the crops and the soil management ends of the program.

Great strides the state has taken in the past five years in increasing its acreage of alfalfa, and the methods whereby this has been brought about, will be one of the items of chief interest to the delegates. Michigan now ranks as the leading alfalfa state east of the Mississippi river. Members of the crops department at M. S. C. will discuss problems of seed adaptation and cultural practices which have been met in the state, not only with alfalfa but also with other crops.

Soil survey methods, soil manage-

ment systems, special care for certain types of soil, and latest laboratory developments will be included in the soil discussions. Michigan's large acreage of muck lands will be featured.

## WASHTENAW COUNTY WOMEN PLANNING CAMP.

Last week a committee of rural women met at the county agent's office and made plans for the second annual camp at Camp Bickett during the first week in August. Last year 35 women were in attendance at the camp and they were all unanimous in requesting another camp this year. Members of the committee selected by the women at the camp last year, to make arrangements for this year's camp are: Mrs. N. W. Laird, Salem; Mrs. I. R. Johnson, Salem; Mrs. Burt Kenny, Webster; Mrs. Garth Beckington, Ypsilanti; Mrs. W. H. Every, Bridgewater; Mrs. Fannie J. Jameson, Superior; and Mrs. Everett Collins, Saline.

At the last meeting of the officers of the Pomona Grange it was decided to co-operate in holding this year's rural women's camp, and asking each subordinate grange to send at least one delegate to the camp. Miss Jennie Buell and Mrs. Strang, members of the Pomona Grange attended the meeting of the committee last Friday. Miss Buell and Mrs. Laird were selected on the program committee to assist Mr. Osler in arranging this year's program.

There will be lectures and demonstrations which will include special features relative to recreation, health, and music. Among the subject to be emphasized will be household management, millinery, interior decoration, basket making, and study of birds. Special attention will be made to secure instructors for games which can be used in community meetings, such as Grange, Farmers' clubs and Parent-Teacher associations and so forth.

Every evening there will be a special assembly and camp fire meeting including singing, music and lectures from prominent speakers. Some rural women have already registered for this year's camp with the county agent. Accommodations are limited to 60 persons. Women in the county interested should send in their names at once to county agent Osler, so that when general programs and announcements are ready they can be mailed to those who are interested in going to camp.

This year the camp for the boys and girls is in July, just previous to the rural women's camp—Washtenaw Post.

## REGARDING TICKETS FOR U. OF M. FOOT-BALL GAMES.

Citizens of the state and alumni of the University of Michigan were urged to have their ticket applications for Michigan football games in the hands of the Athletic association as soon as possible after September 1st—but not before—by the board of control of athletics at its June meeting. No ticket applications will be received before September 1st. Those who do not receive application blanks may order direct by letter.

"Limitation on tickets purchases has been made necessary by the limited seating capacities" (the board announced, "and therefore tickets must be distributed with the greatest impartiality."

November 21, at Ann Arbor, with Minnesota, limited 3 tickets; \$2.50 per ticket.

Ticket orders, accompanied by remittances should be sent to the business manager, Athletic association, University of Michigan, Ann Arbor, Michigan, September 1st or immediately thereafter.

## D. U. R. IS GIVEN THREE CENT FARE.

Authority to charge three cents a mile fare on its interurban cars after July 1st, has been given to the Detroit United Railway by the Michigan Public Utilities Commission, according to word received from Lansing. This action followed a recent hearing at which no objection was made to the suggested increase.

According to railway officials and the receivers, this increase will not enable the company to pay seven per cent on its capitalization, but with the partial substitution of buses for cars the receivers hope to find a way out of their bankruptcy tangle.

Interurban service will be maintained only by fast limited cars, all short haul business being handled in

the future by buses, over which the company already has secured control, it was said in the Lansing hearing.

### NEW ANTI BOLSHEVIX MOVEMENT LAUNCHED



GRAND DUKE NICHOLAS.

Paris—Grand Duke Nicholas has become chief of the new anti-soviet movement—not as a Romanoff, it is declared by leaders in the new movement—but as commander-in-chief of the former Russian army. Many members of the former general staff recently have come to Paris, including General Denikine. These are organized with Grand Duke Nicholas as head of the general staff. The grand duke disavows any intention to become czar, but says it is an attempt to establish a provisional government. More significance seems to attach to the movement than to any previous efforts in the same direction during the last few years, because of the interest shown by England and other conservative governments, due to Soviet activities in Asia.

### Nova Scotia Liberals Lose.

Halifax, N. S.—The provincial elections resulted in a complete landslide for the Conservative party and the end of 43 years' reign of the Liberals in Nova Scotia. Indications point to a new assembly of 41 Conservatives and two Liberals. Premier Armstrong, who headed the Liberal government since 1923, was defeated in his own constituency of Shelbourne. The only member of the last government to be returned was Hon. William Chisholm, minister of works and mines, elected in Antigonish.

### Speedy Justice for Slayer

Bay City, Mich.—Exactly 24 hours after he had slain Mr. and Mrs. Frank Cady with an ax, Isaac Craven was sentenced to double life imprisonment by Judge Samuel O. Houghton.

Court was quickly convened and in reply to the usual question as to what he had to say, Craven declared, "I only intended to give them a beating and didn't expect to kill them, but I am guilty and ready to take punishment." Thereupon the judge pronounced sentence.

### Norris Heads Insurgents

Washington—Senator George W. Norris, of Nebraska, has been chosen as the spokesman for the little band of "insurgents" in the senate, which for so many years was under the control of the late Senator La Follette. Thus has been settled definitely the question of who would take up the reins of leadership in the senate wrested from La Follette by death, in the opinion of political observers here.

### Crash On Chicago "L"

Chicago—One man an employee, was killed and a number of passengers injured in a rear end collision of two elevated trains on the South Side of the Chicago Rapid Transit Co. near Fifth street station. An empty car crashed into a northbound Howard avenue express train and one of the coaches was thrown from the track but remained on the elevated structure.

### Earthquake Shakes Montana

Billings, Mont.—Nearly two thirds of the state of Montana was shaken by two series of earthquake shocks June 27. Panic seized thousands of persons in Butte, Billings, Anaconda, Great Falls, Missoula, Livingston and Helena as they rushed clear of the buildings fearing for their lives. Although no loss of life was reported, considerable property damage was reported.

### Fishing Schooner-Sunk

Gloucester, Mass.—Fourteen men and a boy on the fishing schooner Rex of this port were lost when the brush steamer Tuscania of the Anchor line ran down and sank the fisherman off Quero Bank in the North Atlantic in a thick fog, according to a telegram received here. Nine men were rescued.

### Wood Mined in Swamp

Chicago—Mining for timber goes on in a swamp not far from Chicago. Thousands of years ago a storm flattened a forest of white oak, but some chemical in the soil or water preserved the wood except for a thin layer of decay on the outside of the logs. The wood brings high prices.

### TRYING TO CURB RABIES AMONG DOGS.

The state department of agriculture on Tuesday acted to curb the spreading epidemic of rabies among dogs in the southeastern part of Michigan. Quarantine orders were issued and local authorities have been requested to act in enforcing them.

The newest quarantines affect the counties of Lenawee and Samslac and three townships of Washtenaw and Wayne counties in which the disease is admittedly most common and dangerous. Oakland and Lapeer face a tightening of the quarantine which has been in effect since early this year.

The condition in Wayne is particularly serious, although the epidemic has receded materially from the conditions which prompted wholesale vaccination of dogs last year.

The quarantine regulations provide that only vaccinated dogs will be allowed to be taken off owners' premises unmuzzled, and dogs not vaccinated must either be kept at home or muzzled.

Dr. W. T. Killham, state veterinarian, declares much of the spread of the disease has been due to failure of local authorities to co-operate in enforcing previous quarantines.

Rabies can be transmitted only by the bite of a diseased animal, he explains, and weather conditions, and water supply certainly cannot cause dogs suddenly to be seized with rabies.

Killham traces the present trouble directly to the Wayne county epidemic in the spring of 1924. The spread from that county was into Oakland and Monroe, and he blames Detroit hunting dogs for the spread into the other county last fall. Conditions up until a few weeks ago had been improving in the upstate counties, which have been under quarantine at various times this year but mounting reports of the disease made the additional quarantine necessary.

Local officers should co-operate, in every way possible with the state authorities in trying to prevent the spread of this scourge. Conditions in some localities not far from Northville are alarming and only by a strict observance of the quarantine regulations can the disease be controlled.

### BOWLES CLEARED OF FRAUD CHARGE.

Charles Bowles, sticker candidate for mayor of Detroit last fall, was completely exonerated of fraud as president of the Northland Country club, Detroit, in a decision made Monday by Circuit Judge Eugene F. Law. Members of the club charged Bowles and other officers with malfeasance, misfeasance and non-feasance in office and even claimed that moneys and resources of the club were used by them in furthering their own interests.

A full statement made by a reputable firm of public accountants failed to show any fraud or dishonesty in the use of club money, Judge Law held.

## STATE NEWS IN BRIEF

**Flint**—The will of the late J. Dallas Dort, prominent automobile magnate who died here last month while playing golf, has been admitted to probate by Judge Fred A. Wertman.

**Grand Rapids**—While repairing a brick wall on his farm, one mile west of Stanwood, William H. Lane, 67 years old, a retired farmer, was killed when the wall collapsed, burying him.

**Ann Arbor**—W. A. Landon, of Kalamazoo, was elected president of the Michigan Federation of Typographical Unions at the closing session of the annual state convention of the organization.

**Grand Rapids**—Inhalant and swallowing a poisonous powder, Barbara, 7 months-old daughter of John Christensen, of this city, died. The baby was playing with a box of the powder when she raised it over her head. The contents fell on her face and entered her nose and mouth.

**Owosso**—The death of hundreds of fish in the Shiawassee River June 17, was caused by a lack of oxygen, resulting from pollution by industrial and domestic sewage, according to a report received from the State Department of Health, which sent an engineer here to investigate.

**Clarksville**—Plans were announced by the Community Club here for a grand celebration on July 30, when the golden jubilee and an oil road will take place. It will mark the fiftieth anniversary of the settlement and the pride of being incorporated, which occurred only a few weeks ago.

**Lansing**—A 200-foot superhighway between Lansing and East Lansing, has been agreed to by Gov. Greenback. Highway Commissioner Frank E. Rogers and the mayors of the two cities. The distance is only about two miles. Plans for the project have been under consideration for some time.

**Port Huron**—The petition to incorporate Fair Haven as a village which has come before the board of supervisors, is expected to develop a lively tilt between citizens. The law and order element believes that with Fair Haven incorporated as a village it can enact its own laws to better advantage than by relying upon out side law enforcement.

**Detroit**—The Chrysler Corporation has acquired all of the business and properties of the Maxwell Motor Corporation. The sale, pursuant to the plan of April 15, 1925, was authorized at a meeting of the Maxwell stockholders held in Detroit. Walter P. Chrysler stated that the new company was beginning its career under most auspicious circumstances.

**Pontiac**—A Michigan supreme court decision of far-reaching importance in connection with wider Woodward avenue condemnation proceedings was made known when the Leo Breisacher appeal was decided, holding that all the condemnation proceedings had been regularly handled. The improvement was found a necessity and the procedure regular but the amount of damages allowed was questioned. It was sent back for a reassessment of damages.

**Kalamazoo**—A poison gas warfare intended to exterminate woodchucks, skunks, coyotes, wolves and other prop-destroying pests in Michigan has been started in this section of the state by county farm agents and W. R. Baldwin, representative of a large chemical company. The campaign opened in Berrien County this month and continued in Kalamazoo county, and will be carried into every important agricultural county of the state before Sept. 1, it is announced.

**Lansing**—An order authorizing a rate of three cents a mile on the Detroit United railways interurban system probably will be issued shortly, according to members of the state public utilities commission. A hearing on the petition of the receivers for the D. U. R. for permission to raise rates was held, in which witnesses for the interurbans testified passenger carrying traffic is at its lowest ebb. None of the cities nor communities affected, appeared to protest.

**Alma**—Announcement of a gift of \$45,000 to Alma college, by Mrs. John F. Dodge, of Detroit, for a memorial to John F. Dodge, by President H. M. Crooks, was a prominent feature of the commencement exercises, as the largest class in the history of Alma college completed its college work. President Harry M. Gage, of Coe college, Cedar Rapids, Ia., gave the address. "The Responsibilities of Leadership," to the graduates, calling attention to those factors, intelligence, morality, great purpose, profound convictions, patience and personality, he said were needed.

**Lansing**—The preliminary hearing on the recommendations for a shift in telephone rates which would give Detroit subscribers a five and two-tenths per cent decrease and invoke an average increase of 17.4 per cent in the outstate cities and communities, ended abruptly after Manfred K. Toeppen, engineer for the State Public Utilities Commission, had stated the salient points of his recommendations. Attorneys for Detroit and the outstate cities agreed on September 8 as the date of the next hearing.

## SPEND THE HOLIDAYS IN DETROIT.

"Spend the Holidays in Detroit" is the slogan of the Shadukam Grotto Awakening Committee and the Michigan State Fair this year, for in addition to the production of "The Awakening" for 15 nights at the State Fair grounds, June 27 to July 11, the Detroit motor classic auto races will be held on the afternoon of July 4 and all day July 5.

Over 30 of the outstanding dirt track stars of the country have entered for the two days speed contests at the fast mile oval, among whom will be winners from all parts of the United States in other speed events, including Les Allen who broke the world's I. M. C. A. 100-mile record at Detroit June 7, Sam Ross, who finished in second money, and Ralph Ormsby who while coming in third, led the race for 99 miles.

Besides there will be Paul Clancy, a world's record holder on dirt tracks, Cliff Roma, the Italian flash; Jules Deveraux, the Belgian speed ace; Fuzzy Davidson, the Pacific coast star; Kurt Ketchum, Curly Young, Cliff Woodbury, Babe Adams, Homer Ormsby, Billy Brodbeck, Bert Thomas, Lud Neilsen and others with such cars as Millers, Duessenbergs, Frontanacs, Peugeotts, Laurels, Roofs, Rajos and Fiats.

Auto races start at 3 p. m. July 4, time trials at 8.30 a. m. July 5, the 150 mile race at 2.30 p. m. July 5 and the Awakening "Cleopatra" performances at 8.15 p. m. each evening of the fifteen performances.

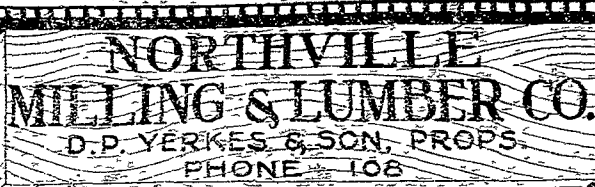

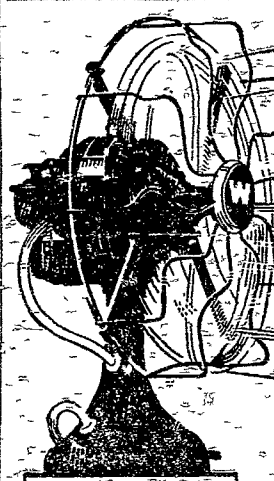
