WILLIAM H. PHILLIPS DIED THURSDAY AFTERNOON.

Northville people were greatly
shocked to learn of the death of
William H. Phillips, which occurred
at his home at 20 Pilgrim Avenue,
Highland Park, last Thursday after-
noon. He had suffered a stroke of
apoplexy a few days before and the
end came peacefully. For many
years Mr. Phillips was a resident of
Northville where he was identified
with numerous business enterprises.
For a period of twelve years he served
as trustee of this village. After dis-
posing of his interests here he moved
to Highland Park, but he never lost
interest in the old home town and
frequently visited here. He was a
member of the local Masonic bodies
and the Eastern Star and was held in
high esteem by all who enjoyed his
acquaintance.

Mr. and Mrs. Phillips were planning
to celebrate the fiftieth anniversary
of their marriage in February and
were looking forward to the happy
event with great anticipation. Their
home life had been a very happy one
and his death proved a great affliction
to his faithful companion.

Mr. Phillips had been serving as
juror and his affliction came without
warning one morning at his home.
He lingered between the shadows for
about ten days and then fell asleep,
calmly and peacefully.

He is survived by his wife and four
children, two sons and two daughters,
Bert C. and Arthur D. Phillips, and
Mrs. Cleo M. Carlson and Mrs. Myrtle
M. McLaughlin. Funeral services
were held at his late home on Satur-
day afternoon and interment took
place at Woodlawn cemetery.

Many Northville friends contributed
beautiful floral pieces to his memory.

NORTHVILLE SCHOOLS ARE IN SPLENDID CONDITION.

Monday H. A. Santers, an official
High School Inspector from the Uni-
versity of Michigan, paid a visit to the
Northville schools and spent the greater
part of the day here visiting the
various departments, observing teach-
ing methods, discipline, etc. At the
conclusion of his inspection he com-
plimented Superintendent Heffrich
and his teaching staff very highly and
stated that he had not found the
High School in this state where gen-
eral conditions were better, and as
far as it may seem, left without
making a single suggestion for im-
provement or offering any criticism.
Before leaving the building he handed
the following note to the board of
education:

the discipline and the earnest at-
tention of the pupils most excellent and
the system of the school and the
thoroughness of the teachers to be

MAN WHO KILLED FAMILY FOUND AT PLYMOUTH.

Richard Brusseau, who shot and
killed his wife and two sons while
they were asleep in their home at
Brightmoor, was found at the tourist
camp at Plymouth last Friday with a
bullet wound in his head. He was
rushed to the Receiving hospital in
Detroit where he died Friday night.
Funeral services were held Wednes-
day. Of the family of five only one

BODY OF MAN FOUND BESIDE HIGHWAY BROUGHT HERE.

Sunday forenoon while Mr. and
Mrs. W. J. Seibert of Detroit were
motoring to their cottage at Lakeland
they discovered a man lying at the
side of the highway on the South
Lyon road a short distance from
Grand River Avenue. At first they
thought the fellow was drunk, but
discovering blood on his face they
made a further examination and dis-
covered he had been shot in the head.
Mr. Seibert went to a near-by farm
house and summoned assistance and
the fellow was loaded into his auto-
mobile and first taken to Farmington
and afterwards brought to the Ses-
sions hospital here. The fellow was
still alive but unconscious. He was
without an overcoat and his pockets
had been turned, nothing being left on
his person by which he could be
identified except a sunset ring with
the initial "A" or "H." A hurried
examination disclosed the fact that
he had been shot in the left side of
his head and that the bullet had
lodged in his head. It was deemed
advisable to send him to a Detroit
hospital where an X-ray might
determine the location of the bullet
and Schrader Brothers' ambulance
was called. With Ray Casertine at
the wheel and accompanied by Mr.
Sessions and a deputy sheriff from
Oakland County a start was made for
the city. While at a point on the
Seven Mile road near the Beach road
the ambulance was side-swiped by a
Chrysler roadster in which three men
from Highland Park were riding.
Mr. Casertine had just passed a car
and had pulled back on his side of
the pavement when the Chrysler car, which
was going like the wind, crashed into
the side of the ambulance. The
ambulance was turned over on its side
and was badly damaged, while the
Chrysler after tipping over on its side
righted itself and headed for the
ditch. Mr. Seibert was slightly
bruised by the impact and Mr. Casertine
was cut by the steering wheel
punch, injured about the breast and
abdomen, but requiring a band on
his knee.

The fellow who was being rushed
to the hospital was transferred to a
padding sedan and taken to Grace
hospital where he died Sunday night
soon after seven o'clock without gath-
ing consciousness. Mr. Seibert and
Mr. Casertine were brought to this
village, the latter having to be as-
sisted by his horse. The injury and
the shock proved too much and he
collapsed when put in the bed.
Restoratives were applied and he
soon recovered. His case was
most wonderful and it is to be well
if he suffers from the effects of the
accident.

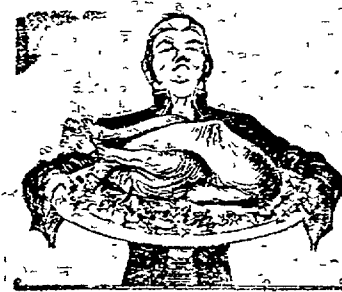
Members of the Northville Gun
Club were working in connection
with the members of the Detroit
club to make an identification of
the fellow Sunday afternoon by the
use of mugshot prints. It was a mem-
ber of the robber gang that held up
the car lot of the Amesworth Manu-
facturing Co., 1221 Pilgrim, and was
identified Monday morning by mem-
bers of the office force of the det-
roitness. At the time of the robbery
it was reported that one of the rob-
bers had been shot by an employee
of the Amesworth Company and it
was believed that this was the victim.
A blood-stained gray overcoat which was
so identified as belonging to the
stranger was found. He was under
the name of Jimmie Wright but being
Polish that was not his name.
He had a room at 2241 Kirby street, east.
If the fellow was not shot while at
the Amesworth establishment officers
are of the opinion that he was shot
by the gang with whom he had asso-
ciated, because he threatened to tell
who helped rob a Peninsula branch
bank in Detroit some time ago.

MRS. ROY E. CROWE SITS AS ARBITER.

Mrs. Ruth Crowe of Northville had
the distinction Thursday of being the
first woman to serve in Warren Cir-
cuit Court as a one-woman jury.
Mrs. Crowe was selected by agree-
ment of defense and plaintiff's counsel
to hear a \$50,000 damage suit brought
by Miss Katherine May Mitchell, 21,
of Littlefield, Conn., against Frank H.
Boyer and his chauffeur. Miss
Mitchell charged she was struck by
the Boyer car New Year's Eve, 1922,
and was confined to hospitals for 10
weeks as the result of injuries suffered.

Mrs. Crowe awarded Miss Mitchell
a verdict of \$6,000. This ratified an
agreement reached with an insurance
company out of court.—Detroit Times

ANYTHING TO SELL? TRY A RECORD LINER

MAGER SENT TO TONIA HOSPITAL AFTER HEARING

"I'd just as soon go to Pontiac. That was Marold Mager's only response when sentenced to Tonia State Hospital for the criminally insane by Circuit Judge George Sample Wednesday afternoon, for killing his father, William Mager.

Standing before the bar, cap in hand, slow, uncomprehending, his expressionless blue eyes fixed on the judge's face, he heard sentence pronounced without a trace of emotion. Asked if he had anything to say he returned to one of his original contentions—that there were others in the gang which killed his father. Questioned as to who they were, he said he did not know their names.

Then it was that Judge Sample found him guilty of the crime, and mentally incompetent, according to testimony of witnesses who were heard during the afternoon, and accordingly sentenced him to the state institution. If at any time he should sufficiently recover to be released from the hospital, within 60 days he will be returned to Washtenaw county to answer the charge to which he is not judged incompetent to plead either guilty or not guilty.

Physician's Testimony
Testimony of Dr. Theophil Klingman and Dr. Howard H. Cummings was first introduced in the hearing. The two physicians had been appointed as a sanity commission to examine Harold Mager by Judge Sample last Thursday. They found him suffering from a mental disorder, testifying he was devoid of emotions, suffering illusions of persecution, was incoherent, had no realization of the seriousness of his situation and no regret for what he had done. Dr. Klingman testified that he was in nearly the same mental condition a year ago when he first examined him. At that time he was a patient at St. Joseph's sanitarium.

Testimony of other witnesses in the case followed. Clinton Adams, hired man on the William Mager farm, told of events on the day William Mager was slain. He had directed Harold Mager to the sheep barn where his father was at work. He said the shepherd Harold then his car to the back of the barn and then drive away. When he went to investigate he found only a pool of blood. Mr. Mager was gone.

Brother Testified
Harold Mager, the dead man's brother, testified to quarrels Harold had had with his father only the day before.

Dick Elliott and John Cunningham told of the search for Harold which ended when he was arrested by Ypsilanti police officers, and the long ride over country roads before Harold finally directed them to the place where he had buried his father. There and later in the sheriff's pen, he had confessed that he alone had committed the crime.

After hearing all evidence Judge Sample pronounced sentence. No deliberation by the jury was wanted, he Lewis Buck who had been charged to represent Mager's father and who is to be appointed by the circuit judge to the daily press.

The community only, but was taken to the hospital last night by Deputy Sheriff J. H. Osborne of Ann Arbor and Frank T. Davis of Pontiac. During the long ride to Tonia Hospital did not speak to any one. While he was taken to the institution he talked with the officers but his mind seemed to be blank so far as regarding what he was concerned.

OAKLAND'S RED CROSS CHAPTER ACTIVITIES

During the year ending October 31, 1925 the Oakland County Chapter, American Red Cross had charge of 265 cases. 1168 first aid kits were held in the office. 291 calls were made and there were 43 telephone calls in the interest of the various cases. It is now necessary to make more home calls, as the United States Veterans' Bureau has asked for information relative to the present condition of a great many of the disabled ex-service men. Also some calls have been made at the request of the government regarding the home conditions of men who have asked to be discharged. During the same period of time \$585.95 was expended throughout the county for the relief of disabled ex-service men and their families.

AMONG OUR NEIGHBORS

Hugh Ward of Fowlerville, entered the winning litter of pigs in the state "litter" contest, held last summer by the annual husbandry department of the Michigan State College. The litter consisted of 13 O. I. C. pigs with a total weight of 3,025 pounds when they were 180 days old.

An old teacher's contract was found by a family in Highland in which the lady agreed to teach the school in the West Highland district for ten weeks. The contract was dated June 1, 1863, and the exorbitant salary named was one dollar and fifty cents a week.

A tree has been found at Oakdale Park which produced liquor, so it was said by three young men whom the sheriff and his deputies arrested. Dances are given at a hall there twice a week and the young men present always find bottles of liquor in the roots of the tree. The sheriff has given orders to have the tree removed.

Village President Harry C. Robinson of Plymouth received from R. W. Winfield, mayor of Plymouth, England, a beautiful engraved copy of a resolution passed by the town council of that borough which confers a signal honor upon Plymouth, Michigan. The resolution, bearing the coat of arms of England in gold leaf, along with the letter which accompanied it, will be framed and hung in the council chamber of the city hall.

Charles V. Lane, head of the department of public safety of Michigan, has planned to do some motion picture filming in a strip of woods between Brighton and New Hudson. He will start a raging fire with the help of gasoline then film the fire and the scene will be worked into some pictures.

The Brighton State Savings Bank was bought recently by a group of men who have been interested in it as a sound business proposition for some time. The Union Trust Company will act as trustees but are not allowed to give the name of the new owners.

Ground has been broken for Clarenceville's new Community House which is to have a frontage of 60 feet and depth of 100 feet. The Township Community Association are the sponsors and they have planned to have a dining room and a large hall and stage on the second floor.

Tires and tubes valued at \$1,500 were stolen from the Outson Service station at Holly between one and two o'clock in the morning. The night watch discovered the burglary almost immediately and the sheriff of Holly and Farmington were notified, but the fellows escaped in a truck.

NEXT SUNDAY WILL BE OBSERVED AS "HEALTH SUNDAY"

A nation wide observance on the part of the churches and clergy of America will characterize the last Sunday of this month which has been set aside as Health Sunday. In a vast number of churches a portion of the sermon hour will be given over to a discussion of the crusade against tuberculosis, which is being waged by the National, state, and local tuberculosis associations. The long story of the plague, acknowledge to be the most terrible in history because so threatening, will be told. The scientific aspects of the fight against the disease and its philanthropic aspects will be touched upon. Clergymen will, almost unanimously, from the pulpits of all denominations unite in urging upon their people the importance of giving their support to the hosts arrayed against tuberculosis.

Health Sunday in Michigan has the active endorsement not only of the clergy but of Governor Groesbeck who says: "In the daily round of our busy lives it sometimes happens that we unintentionally forget our obligations to the afflicted. It, therefore, seems fitting to me that Sunday, November 22nd, should be set aside in Michigan, as I understand it is throughout the nation as a day for considering in our churches man's great scourge, tuberculosis."

RESCUE ALL BUT ONE FROM BURNING SHIP

367 Persons Saved From Lenape—Craft Ablaze From Stem to Stern.

Lewes, Del.—Rescued from the blazing, Clyde liner, Lenape while the flames from its flaming superstructure lit up the water of the Delaware break water, 367 persons, all but one of its passengers and crew, were safely landed here at the end of a frantic 30-minute dash from the sea.

One maid, Robert Leverton, 27 years old, of 11 Factory place, Wilmington, Miss., lost his life. He leaped from the burning vessel when flames burst through the deck and was drowned. His body, with a life belt about the knees, was found by a fisherman.

The ship is believed to be almost a total loss. In the early morning hours, while passengers and crew leaped from her or slid down ladders to the safety of rescue boats, she was swamped with flames from stem to stern. She was scuttled inside the breakwater.

Army-Navy Trials Clash

Over Expert Air Witness

Washington.—The army court-martial tried Col. William Mitchell on charges of insubordination and the navy court of inquiry into the Shenandoah disaster overlapped in their investigation, with a clash between the two hearings over which should have the right to hear Maj. Frank M. Kennedy as an aircraft expert. The court martial issued the first subpoena.

Major Kennedy was questioned by the Mitchell court-martial as to many technical details of aviation, supporting Colonel Mitchell's theory that the use of calcium chloride in the Shenandoah's motors had a destructive effect on the dirigible's framework.

Admiral William S. Sims' report to the court martial that the report with the navy was favorable on the part of high-ranking officials, due to lack of modern naval tactics such as could be given by the navy war college.

Flames Sweep French City: Loss Estimated at \$400,000

Paris.—Fire destroyed the town of London, a suburb of Southern France. The loss was estimated at \$400,000.

The fire started in the old abbey and soon reached the surrounding buildings and great piles of old wooden boxes and refuse, lighting up the entire town for miles around. All efforts failed to quell the blaze, however, and soon the huge newly installed electric plant, full of new American machinery, was in flames, plunging the town into darkness.

All Alcohol Permits to Be Revoked December 31

Washington.—The government will revoke all permits issued under the federal prohibition law, simultaneously. Five years investigation was begun to determine whether any of the permits should be renewed. The revocation decision was signed by Secretary Mellon and U. S. Attorney General Cummings on Thursday.

\$2,000,000 Fire Destroys Docks at New Orleans

New Orleans.—Fire which broke out in the Mississippi river destroyed a large dock estimated at more than \$2,000,000 before it was defeated. It has been brought under control by high winds, the flames threatened millions of dollars in cotton and other merchandise stored in nearby docks. The wholesale and business district of the city was for a time believed to be threatened.

Commons Votes 385 to 13 to Ratify Locarno Pact

London.—These treaties do not make war impossible but they render war infinitely more difficult, said Foreign Secretary Austen Chamberlain in the house of commons. The house was crowded to hear the foreign secretary propose the ratification of the Locarno pact.

Shortly after seven o'clock the house of commons voted ratification of the pact by a vote of 375 to 13.

Gasoline Up Ten Cents

Chippewa Falls, Wis.—The local retail gasoline price rose from 9 to 19 cents a gallon with the ending of the gas war.

Army Runs on Cash Basis

Washington.—Maj. Gen. Knute Walker, chief of finance of the army, in his annual report declared that the army did business last year on virtually a cash basis and saved \$214,918 through commercial discounts.

Florida to Get Air Mail Line

Washington.—Postmaster General New has decided upon the establishment by June 1 of air-mail service between Jacksonville, Tampa and Miami, Fla., and probably Atlanta, Ga.

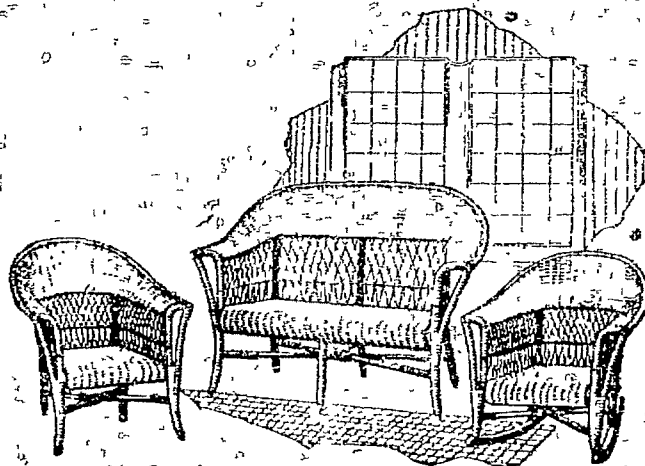

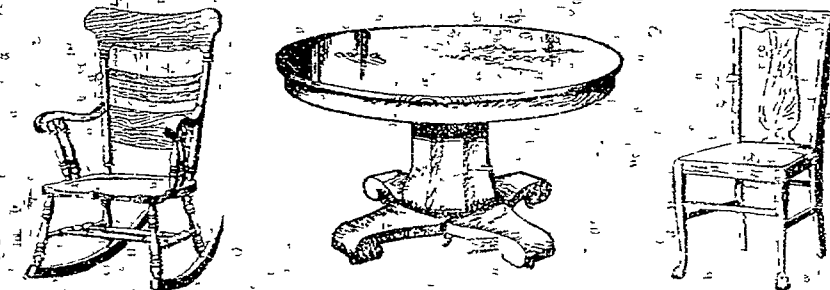

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D. U. R. SERVICE GREATLY CUR-

TAILED.

The blow has fallen, and though it was not "unlooked for," because Northville people have seen the change coming.

Friday the D. U. R. will change its service between Northville and Detroit to every two hours; and patrons of the line will have to change cars at Farmington Junction, except those who travel back and forth on the limited.

The limited will leave Northville for Detroit at 6:38 a. m. and the local will leave at 6:55 and continue every two hours until 2:55, then at 1:50 and every two hours until 8:50 and 10:50, which will be the last car to leave for Detroit.

Locals will leave Detroit for Northville at 7:15 a. m. and every two hours thereafter until 3:15. The limited will leave at 5:50 and the local will follow at 6:50 and 8:50, which will be the last car from Detroit upon which people can reach Northville.

Cars for Plymouth and Wayne will run about as they do now—at 6:05, 6:00 and 7:00 a. m. and every two hours until 9:00 p. m.

The privately owned automobiles have greatly reduced the number of passengers traveling over the D. U. R. from Northville to Detroit and during the past few months the number of travelers have been divided between the street railway and the bus line with the result that neither company is getting sufficient business to sustain the service which they have been giving.

The late cars from Detroit to Northville have carried but few people for months, frequently but one or two, and because of this curtailment of earnings the receivers in charge of the company's affairs have decided to make this drastic change.

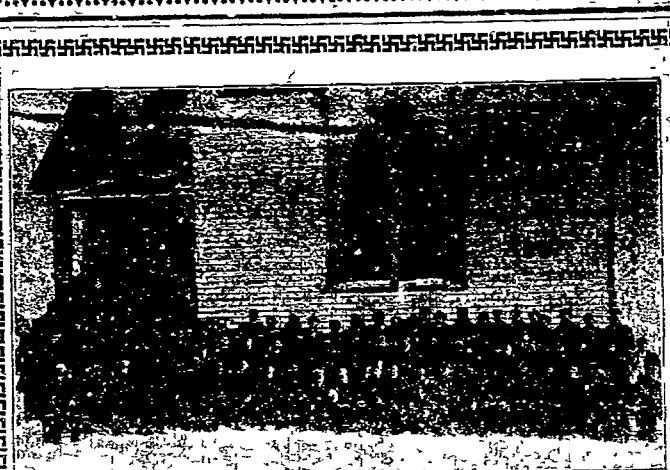

VALIANT EFFORT FAILS IN RESCUE

UPPER PENINSULA LAD FREEZES WHILE TROOPERS SEARCH FOR HIM

A valiant effort of the State Police of the Negaunee post to save a life failed because the first snow storm of the season had broken down the telephone wires and delayed the receipt by the officers of information. As a result the coming of the woods near Negaunee in search of a lost boy was delayed until too late to make rescue possible.

Alvin Johnson and Walter Maki were two of a party of five boys who left Negaunee for a day in the woods just prior to the coming on of the storm. Three days later, weather caused the boys to decide to return home but they became separated in the snow. Three hours' searching home in the afternoon but the other two did not appear.

When the two lads had not come home the next morning, it was certain that they were lost. The telephone wires were down however and information of the affair did not reach the State Police until a day later.

Search Party Organized

Lieutenant Fred L. Bedard at once set out with a sergeant and three troopers. He also recruited a posse of sportsmen and lumber men who knew the woods and a thorough search was organized. Game wardens also joined for the hunt.

That afternoon it was learned that Alvin Johnson had wandered to a log cabin in a frozen condition. From this fact alone the boys' footprints were in track, and the search was led to a brush shelter where the boys had constructed and in which they spent the night, with Alvin Johnson in the forest about him in the morning they became separated.

Alvin Johnson's body was found, by troopers in the snow. He had been dead only a comparatively short time and it is a fortunate fact that there were facilities for notifying the authorities and getting the search started, he might have been frozen before the cold overcame him.

The State Police met the searchers who had found the body and other members of the posse were called in by the firing of rifle shots as a notification that the search was over.

MEXICANS WOUND RAILROAD OFFICER

Some peculiar features attended a shooting case in Wayne county recently in which J. W. Walker, a railroad detective, was seriously wounded. He and another detective were watching for freight car thieves when they were fired upon from a section gang bunk car in which Mexican section hands were hiding.

State Police were notified and Sergeant R. W. Eato of the Wayne detachment first took Walker to a hospital and then arrested two Mexicans, one of whom confessed to the shooting.

It remains to be proved in court whether the Mexicans, being unfamiliar with American conditions, mistook the two detectives for prowlers or whether there is a connection between the thefts and the shooting.

Arrest Airplane Thieves

More troubles for the State policeman. A recent arrest in Saginaw county, Michigan, proved to members of the Michigan State Police, that they have another job which in the natural course of events may grow into a real one. This new job is watching out for airplane thieves.

Two men were arrested by Lieut. Joseph Kearney and Trooper Bruce McGone of the Saginaw detachment charged with stealing an airplane in Detroit. They confessed they had stolen the plane from a field in Detroit and had piloted it to Saginaw, where trouble developed and they were forced to descend to make repairs.

Both men were convicted in court and sentenced to from six months to five years in the Reformatory.

Orchard Lake Cars will operate between Detroit and Farmington Junction on a forty (40) minute base schedule, with necessary trippers in the forenoon and afternoon. The Through Service to Northville will be discontinued other than one car in the forenoon and afternoon.

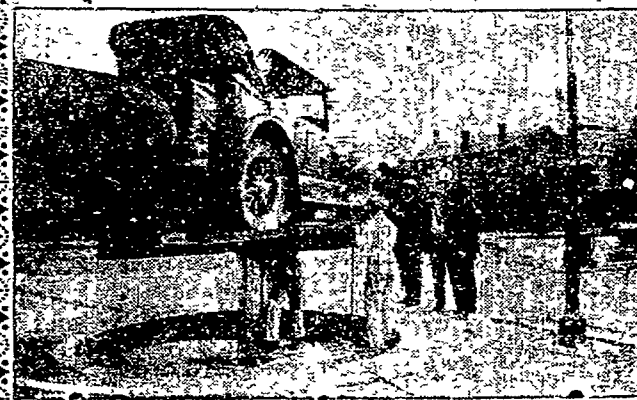
