

Mrs. Simmons has been a familiar figure in this community for so long that her absence will be hard to realize. A kindly word and thoughtful regard for everyone has been her constant motto through life.

Angeline Chilson was born December 10, 1838, in Livonia, and her entire life has been spent in this vicinity. She was one of a family of nine children, consisting of four sons and five daughters, given to Angeline and Austin Chilson. Of this family, one sister, Mrs. V. A. Gunning, and two brothers, George and Palmer Chilson, remain.

At the old homestead where she was born and raised, she was united in marriage on January 20, 1858, to J. Morrell Simmons, to which union were born five children, Ada, Johnson, Mattie Seely, Elza Simmons, Carrie Simmons and Pearl Miller, all of whom remain to mourn her departure. 

NEW YORK'S WEALTH WIDELY SCATTERED

Earnings in Many States Pay Tax in Metropolis.

WASHINGTON—The great cowbird and locust of industry and steel corporations which have their headquarters in New York has been traced by the American Association of State Highway Officials in connection with the work of that association in determining the original sources of revenue for road building. Out-of-town bank deposits in New York also have been traced with same end in view, according to a statement issued by the association.

The Union Pacific and Southern Pacific are taken as railway examples. Both of these companies pay income taxes in New York, but in each case, highway officials point out, earnings are derived from properties located half the width of a continent away from New York. The Union Pacific owns at Omaha and the Southern Pacific owns at New Orleans. Therefore, in the view of highway officials, eastern states are not New York should be credited with the \$1,700,000 paid by these corporations to the federal treasury in 1925 since their earnings come from territory outside of New York. "No attempt," says the statement, "is made to give the list of stockholders of these two railroads but it is common knowledge that they live in upper states."

Scattered Through States

The United States Steel corporation, the statement continues, pays an income tax of \$16,000,000 in New York in 1925. Only two of the 143 plants and headquarters owned by that corporation are located in New York, and of its 1,134,570 stockholders only 8,222 live in New York. The remaining 1,126,348 are scattered throughout 47 states and the District of Columbia.

HOOVER SAYS 1926 OUTLOOK IS GOOD

Dominant Favorable Factor Is Increased Productivity of U. S.

WASHINGTON—That the good-tide of prosperity which swept the nation in 1925 will rise even higher in 1926, provided "we temper our optimism with a sprinkling of caution" was the prediction of Secretary of Commerce Hoover in a statement issued here.

"On the whole, both our country and the rest of the world face a more favorable outlook at this turn of the year than for a long time past," Hoover declared, adding a warning.

"We ourselves, however, need to be on our guard against reckless optimism. What we need is an even keel in our financial controls, and our growing national efficiency will continue us in increasing prosperity."

Pointing out that the United States produced and consumed more goods in 1925 in proportion to population than ever before, thus resulting in the highest standard of living in history, Hoover takes this view of the future.

"The dominant factor in our outlook is increased productivity, due to fundamental and continuing forces such as the culmination of education, advancement of science, skill and elimination of waste."

"Other favorable indications are that stocks, of commodities are moderate, employment exists for practically every one, wages are at a high level, savings are the largest in history and capital is therefore abundant."

Much room for improvement exists in the agricultural situation, according to Hoover. Admitting that the prosperity wave has ebbed somewhat in the farming districts, he says: "Agriculture generally has not gained a stability that makes for contentment because its basic economic problem of market is unsolved."



Aged Wife Helps Lover Kill Paralyzed Spouse

CHICAGO—Twelve hours after the body of the victim was found the mystery was solved from one of Chicago's most amazing murders and the accomplices involved in the plot. The attention of the police was attracted to the first trade commission in the city, where the body of a man was found in a rooming house. The man was identified as John J. Kelly, a well-known figure in the city. The police found a note pinned to the wall which read: "The aged wife of the man who was killed for which payment made to the police in a city history of the fact of 1925, which the man had accumulated."

Gen. Hsu Killed by Son of Man He Executed

Peking—The dramatic climax to an old Chinese feud was started when Gen. Hsu Shu-cheng was assassinated.

Lu Chen-chang, was executed on orders of Little Hsu in 1919, while the latter was a cabinet secretary under President Li Yuan-hung. Captain Lu is a cousin of Fena Yu-hsiang, the Christian general.

Col. Coolidge May Never Walk Again, Says Doctor

Plymouth, N. Y.—Col. John C. Coolidge, the President's father, was "very, very comfortable," his physician reported. He sat up in his wheel chair for half an hour, and was apparently not fatigued by the exertion. But he had lost the use of his legs through faulty blood circulation, and his physician, Dr. Albert W. Craig of Bridgewater, said the prospect of his ever regaining the use of the legs was remote.

Sister of Eugene Debs Crushed to Death by Bus

Terre Haute, Ind.—Jess Brockway, thirty, pinner bus driver, faces an involuntary manslaughter charge growing out of the death of Mrs. Annie C. Beach, sister of Eugene W. Debs, Socialist leader. Mrs. Beach was struck by a pinner bus and crushed beneath a heavier bus that was behind the pinner.

Snow Blocks Roads

Madison, Wis.—Snow covers virtually the entire state and road conditions are uncertain, drifts being blown across open roads and making it impossible to have accurate reports from the highways. Engineer Donaghy said that the snow is expected to reach out Wisconsin.

NEARLY TWO HUNDRED THOUSAND PEOPLE WORK FOR FORD MOTOR COMPANY.

The expansion program carried out in 1925 by the Ford Motor Co., it was stated by officials, reflects an optimistic business outlook for 1926.

At the close of 1925 there was a total of 191,948 employes in the Ford organization throughout the United States, which includes all Ford activities, as compared with 142,262 a year ago, an increase of 49,586.

In industrial buildings the company has added 2,260,000 square feet of floor space during the year, making a total of 23,000,000 square feet.

Several large buildings were completed at River Rouge. One of these, known as the press-die building, has a floor area of 375,000 square feet.

The most notable of the River Rouge buildings, however, is the new steel mill and open hearth furnace building with a total floor area of 1,644,000 square feet.

Another expansion came with the establishment of a branch in Mexico City, Mexico.

In Europe new plants were acquired in Antwerp, Belgium and at Paris, France, where building operations are practically completed.

Each of these new plants will have an operating capacity of 150 cars daily.

Another important European development during the year, which was only recently completed, was the establishment of a Ford company at Berlin, Germany.

The company also extended its activities in the Orient during the year. Opening an assembly plant at Yokohama, Japan.

Another development in the activities of the Ford company during the year was its entrance into the manufacturing of airplanes.



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The original manuscripts of correspondence between General George Washington and General Nathaniel Greene, during the Revolutionary war, have come into the possession of the University of Michigan. The announcement was made by Regent William L. Clements, of Bay City, in an address of welcome to the American Historical association in session at Ann Arbor. The collection includes all the Revolutionary war correspondence of General Greene, as well as about 50 of Washington's letters to Greene. In addition Regent Clements announced the acquisition of the military, political and private papers of Major General Sir Percy Clinton, commander-in-chief of the British forces in North America from 1758 to 1763.

Port Huron's traction crisis is being fought to a finish. For several months the city's only trolley line, the Detroit United Railway, which owns the City Electric Railway Co., has been endeavoring to have the city council agree to a day-to-day agreement to raise the fares from five to seven cents per four tickets, for 25 cents a month.
