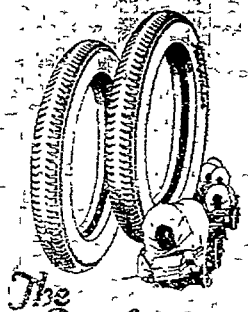

Michigan Happenings

Michigan creameries were given 30 days in which to report plans for fighting Michigan streams of their pollution at a meeting held recently by representatives of creameries in Lansing. The creameries, like numerous other industries, were summoned to appear for a conference with representatives of the Attorney General's office, the State Conservation Department and the Department of Health to discuss methods of ending stream pollution.

An annual physical examination of every individual was urged by the state's medical society, during its recent meeting at Grand Rapids. If every physician would submit to yearly examination, and if doctors would keep a card index of all their patients' vital statistics would be averaged, life would be prolonged for the average individual and "fit and well" medical advice would disappear, they said.

More teachers of the beaten and type of the French pastry type, was offered as the panacea for the general indifference towards scholarship in high schools, by C. E. Gamard, superintendent of the Pleasant schools, at the final session of the department of superintendents and school board members of the Michigan State Teachers' association, which met at Le Roy, recently.

Representative W. Frank Jones of the Twelfth Michigan district, has sent the name of Isaac McManis to the postoffice department with the recommendation that he be appointed postmaster at Keweenaw Bar, Baraga County. McManis has been acting postmaster.

Battle Creek College has been admitted to full standing by the North Central Association of Colleges and Secondary Schools as a four-year college. It has been announced by Dr. Paul E. Voelter, president of the college. The college recently was reorganized.

The comptroller of currency at Washington, has approved the application of the Peoples State bank of Plymouth for conversion to the First National bank in Plymouth. The capital will be \$50,000.

Thirty thousand pine seedlings will be planted in the Traverse City municipal forest this month, according to announcement by the reforestation committee of the Isaac Walton League. This means that 30 acres of land now unproductive or, at best, covered with inferior forest growth, will be given a planting of white and Norway pine. This is by far the largest planting to be made in the state this spring, excepting in the state forest preserves.

Postmaster G. W. Weaver, of Charlotte, Mich., has been named by the United States postoffice bureau telephone call between Charlotte and Northville, and the breaking up of the Charlotte-Lake Michigan, thus severing a communication with Beaver. It is making every effort with the postoffice department at Washington to procure temporary airplane service to that point. Captain Weaver is ready to take up the matter with the postmaster general and Congressman Scott and is awaiting their replies.

Governor Frank O. Lowden, of Illinois, chairman of American forest week committee, has named T. E. Marston, of Bay City, as Michigan chairman of forest week, April 18-24. It has been announced. In accordance with President Coolidge's proclamation, forest week will mark an effort to encourage forest creation and conservation. Under Marston's leadership it is planned for forest week to have commercial tree culture emphasized in many schools, dinner tables, women's clubs and religious associations.

Gar Brown, former well known former man committed to the Pontiac state hospital following an explosion of a bomb he had admitted to making, has escaped. Police and Oakland county deputies have searched the city and adjacent territory without avail. With Brown when he fled the institution was Alvin Gardner. The two are said to have escaped from the hospital during the night.

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FORD RIVER ROUGE PLANT NOW KNOWN AS "FORDSON."

At the direction of Easel B. Ford, president of the Ford Motor Company, the name of the River Rouge plant of the company has been changed to the "Fordson" plant.

This plant, probably the largest industrial enterprise in the world, is located along the historic Rouge and has borne the name of the rather placid stream ever since its establishment about ten years ago. Recently the village of Spargwells, in

which the plant is located, voted to change its name to that of Fordson. At the gigantic Fordson plant, the Ford organization manufactures their Fordson tractors, operates its own blast furnaces, power plant, motor assembly plant, body plant, saw mill, coke ovens, steel plant and rolling mill, cement plant, paper mill, and a complete glass factory. This plant has an area of 1,100 acres, 12.3 miles of roadways and 36 miles of railroad tracks. Approximately 60,000 men are now employed there.

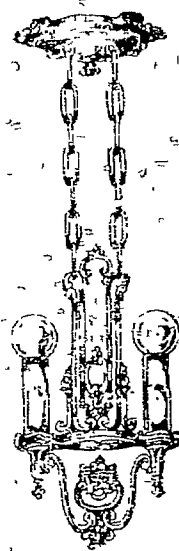

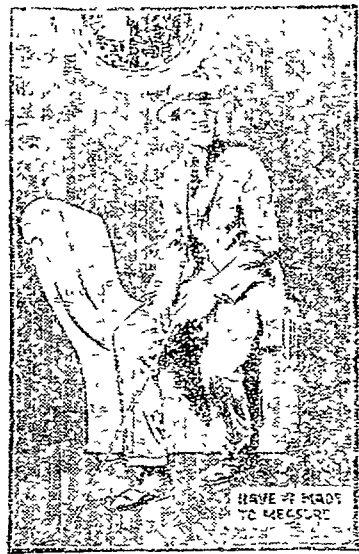

J. S. PERMITS SALE OF 3 PER CT. BREW

Two Large Breweries to Make
Medicinal Drink—Sold
at Drug Stores.

Washington—Plans of the administration to crush widespread violations of the prohibition laws, embodied in a bill offered in the senate by Senator Goff of West Virginia, propose heavy fines, jail terms and more drastic search and seizure provisions. The measure was accepted at the capitol as the answer of General Andrews to the growing agitation in congress for modification of the Volstead act.

Washington—Gen. Lincoln C. Andrews, dry czar, has dashed the hopes of the thirsty who expected legal high power beer as a result of permits granted for sale of 3.75 per cent malt extract.

Supporting the statement made by Prohibition Director James E. Jones, Andrews declared this tonic, containing 25 per cent of solids, "is by no stretch of the imagination a beer."

Officials permitted reliable manufacturers to restore these tobics to the market so they would be available to persons who need them, Andrews said. If attempts should be made to use them as beer they could instantly be withdrawn from the market, he added.

Washington—Permits have been granted by the prohibition division of the bureau of internal revenue to two large breweries to manufacture a malt liquor containing 3.75 per cent alcohol by volume and 25 percent malt solids to be sold to the public through drug stores without prescriptions or dealer permits.

The permits, it was learned, were issued on a six-months' trial during which the brewers are required to send the prohibition division in the prevention of the sale of the malt liquor to the public for "beverage purposes."

Director of Prohibition James E. Jones gave his consent to the new brew after checks of the bureau of internal revenue had reported that the tonic could not be used as a beverage.

The chief difference between the new tonic and the old was explained. The malt extract contained in it is so high that it would be impossible to take the fluid as a beverage. It could be taken only in such quantities. The output is limited, it was explained, and the manufacturer would be far more expensive than that of beer. A twelve-ounce bottle would cost 20 or 25 cents.

The tonic is described as a sort of sweet, slimy substance of heavy appearance. It is intended for use principally in hospitals and by prescription, that of physicians, the main purpose being for "medicinal" malt tonic. It was explained, were used to a great extent for medicinal purposes before the Volstead act. Prohibition officials said there seemed to be a real need for something of this kind.

The permits were issued to the two breweries, it was said, after conferences between their representatives and representatives of the government. The permits were granted a fortnight ago and already one company, it was also learned, has written to the bureau announcing it had been allowed to manufacture the product with an alcohol content of 3.75 per cent and a malt content of 25 per cent. In the latter the company wrote that the product would be palatable, but not potable to an extent that it can be used as a beverage.

The letter said that wholesalers would be permitted to sell the product in quantities of five cases weekly to small druggists and twenty-five cases weekly to large druggists, and added that it "hoped it will not find its way to illegitimate channels."

No central regulation covering the manufacture of the malt liquor, as it is already called, has been issued by the prohibition department, and accordingly it was said there are no requirements for dealer permits or bonds to govern its sale.

Prior to prohibition the general run of beers contained from 3 to 6 per cent alcohol by content and 4 to 7 per cent of solids. Beer contained 10.05 per cent solids and 5.33 per cent alcohol. American beer of the lager type was in three classifications—3.45 per cent alcohol and 5.08 per cent solids; 3.58 per cent alcohol and 5.50 per cent solids; and 4.12 per cent alcohol and 7.43 per cent solids.

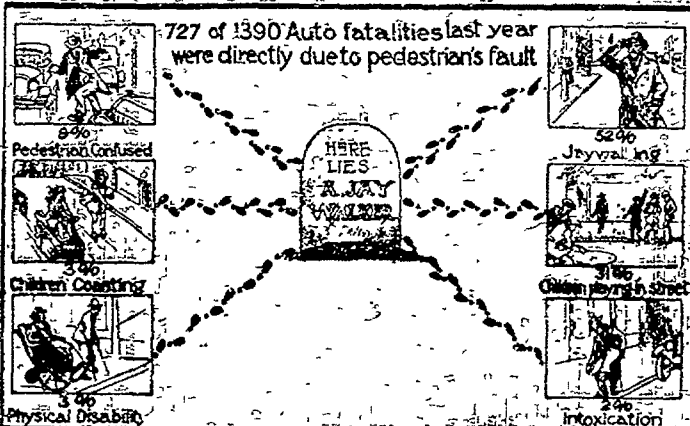

Jay Walker to Blame for Half of the Deaths by Auto



MANY a motorist whose car has figured in a fatal accident will be able to present a clear sheet to Saint Peter when his time comes, when one considers all the contributing factors outside of the driver's own fault. A total of 1,390 auto fatalities on record with the Stewart-Warner Safety Council for the prevention of automobile accidents, covering a period of seven months, shows that in 727 cases the fault was clearly the pedestrian's and cannot be put down to the driver, the weather or unavoidable circumstances.

The careless pedestrian's footsteps lead him to the grave by six distinct routes, says the Safety Council, and the most untravelled of these is jaywalking. Sixty-two per cent of the 727 auto fatalities just referred to were due to straggling across busy streets without using the proper directions. Children's playing in the streets was responsible for 31 per cent and coasting for another 3 per cent. Confusion on the part of the pedestrian, not hearing whistles and turning back his tracks brought about 9 per cent of these 727 deaths, while physical disability and intoxication rate 2 and 2 per cent respectively.

WAS

A REAL TREAT

A tired, but happy group of Northville people—members of the Senior class and a few others who had made the pilgrimage to Washington, arrived home last Saturday forenoon in the midst of the blizzard. It was not a very warm welcome, but all were glad to be home and the weather did not make any difference, because the travelers had been blessed with good weather all during their travels. They entered Ohio in a snow storm and it was snowing again last Saturday morning as the train pulled into the union station at Toledo. As the train proceeded toward Detroit and home the snow was more noticeable and when Northville was finally reached there were about five inches of snow on the level. But in spite of the unfavorable weather conditions all were glad to be home again and their visit to the national capital will always remain a pleasant memory.

Sunday, after the arrival of the visitors at Washington, the forenoon was spent at Arlington, the beautiful city of the dead, and as one walked about the sacred spot they realized they were treading upon holy ground. A group in which countless thousands of our nation's defenders are sleeping their last long sleep. From Arlington the party visited the Lincoln memorial, motored near to Washington's monument and returned to the hotel for dinner. About 7:30 cars called for us and the whole company visited the Congressional library, which is acknowledged to be one of the handsomest buildings in the world. One could spend several days there and find something new and interesting at every turn, but were limited to a couple of hours. When the party motored back to the hotel, Monday, we visited the Bureau of Engineering and Printing, the Smithsonian Institute, the old and new buildings in the Jefferson and Madison. A trip was made to Alexandria, Va. to visit the old Vernon. At Alexandria we visited the old home of George Washington and members of the family worshipped and the day was a very interesting one. The trip was made in a motor car and the scenery of the place do not do justice to the sight at this historic spot. The spacious grounds, kept in a faultless condition were an inspiration to all visitors and the many things of special interest about the house filled the two hours full to overflowing. We returned to Washington by boat and the ride on the Potomac was a most delightful feature of the outing. Cars were waiting for us at the wharf and we were hustled to our hotel for dinner. After dinner, all joined in a theatre party at Keith's and spent the evening pleasantly.

To-day morning found the party all at the city of the future and we visited a number of the famous buildings in Washington. The American Museum of Natural History and the White House where we had the privilege of passing through the corridors of the nation's history. Wednesday forenoon was spent at the Capitol building and the party was shown through the buildings. Immediately after lunch we visited the Mayflower and went direct to the great union station where we took the train for Baltimore. Md. Sightseeing busses conveyed the party about the city and Baltimore is a wonderful city—substantially built of brick and stone, because after the great fire a few years ago frame buildings were not allowed to be erected. At 3:30 we went on board the steamer State

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...a bound for Norfolk, Va. The journey was made over the Old Bay Line and our party was shown a courtesy by those in charge of the boat. A delightful dinner was enjoyed and after the evening meal those who did so enjoyed about the deck or danced in the plan room. Thursday morning found us at Old Point Comfort and soon our boat was docked at Norfolk. The party enjoyed a stroll about the city and then proceeded to the wharf where we embarked for Newport News where we continued for Williamsburg, the home of the College of William and Mary, which received its charter from the Crown under the Seal of the Virginia Council in 1693. We were met at the station by a number of students of the college and on our way to the college campus where permitted to visit the Bruton Parish Church, established in 1632, in which building worshiped seven royal governors and Revolution Fathers, and early statesmen of Virginia including Washington, Jefferson, Monroe, Tyler, Henry, Marshall and many others. In the church yard adjoining the church and in the church are buried a number of men who gave their lives for the cause of America. We were then shown about the campus and the large buildings which still grace the spacious grounds. The main building which was erected in 1694-5-6 although damaged by fire upon a number of occasions, still stands; a monument to the individual will and perseverance of its founders. The first fire occurred in 1705 and the second in 1859, and in September, 1862, this building was again damaged by fire, but the original foundation and side walls were not seriously damaged. A few years ago the college was taken over by the state of Virginia and its enrollment has increased from 269 to more than one thousand young men and women. New buildings are being erected on the campus and everything about the institution has the appearance of activity and growth. Our day was a very enjoyable one. Cincinnati was reached at 6:30, where we had dinner and at 1:15 we boarded the B & O train for Detroit and home.

The big stage was made under the direction of Earl Potter and accompanied us to Washington and remained with us until Wednesday when we were taken in charge by R. J. Johnson, traveling passenger agent of the B & O system and he remained with the party until their return to Detroit Saturday morning. He was very considerate and did everything he could to make the trip a pleasant one. At Norfolk our party was joined by N. F. Brown, traveling passenger agent for the C & O railway and he accompanied the party to Cincinnati and because of his familiarity with the country through which the C & O lines run he was able to explain many places of interest. He showed members of the party every corner and his presence added a great deal to the pleasure of the homeward journey.

All were deeply grateful to Mrs. Zenaida Larkins, principal of our high school for her kindly interest in the welfare of all who composed the party. The outing from first to last was a real intellectual treat and an inspiration. No town can send forth a better behaved group of young people and the writer received many compliments from those with whom our party came in contact for the manner in which our young people conducted themselves. It was a real pleasure to have been with them and to have been able to enjoy this wonderful treat. All came home with the conviction that Northville is about as nicely situated as any town in the country.

We have many advantages and conveniences that towns through the south do not enjoy and we are close enough to other cities that we can enjoy some of the special treats that people through the south have to travel a long way for.

TURTLES RAISED ON FARM BY DOUGHBOY

Got Idea to Breed Snappers in Monte Carlo

Fortie, Iowa—Since 20,000 snapping turtles, new to the world beneath the heavy carcasses of the bill country of north Iowa, enjoying their long winter sleep, because the World War broke out in Europe in 1914. Europe is a long way from Fortie, but it is where Henry Johnson, a thoughtful soldier, got his idea for the establishment of a turtle farm that supplies a large per cent of the turtle stock that eventually finds its way to the dining rooms of America's top hotel.

Johnson was a Doughboy in the Eighty eighth division of the A. E. F. In September, 1917 he obtained a leave of absence and, after a long drive to Monte Carlo, of gambling fame, and a wealthy American, a steel company vice president, invited Johnson and a number of companions to live with him at the Grand Hotel in the Casino. Trépanier made a brook, a soup made from the flesh of a species of West Indian turtle, was served. The check for it is large.

See Business Chance. Johnson reasoned that if wealthy men paid without protest such high prices for muds in broth, it would pay to go into the business of supplying the market. Thus was born the idea of Fortie's turtle farm, the plans for which Johnson put into effect after he came home. Five years ago Johnson began his work by leasing ten acres of river bottom land, making it success of the venture from the start.

Mr. Johnson denies his chief revenue from the sale of eggs and choice breeding stock. He also has a good income from the sale of turtle oil, supplying many large hospitals. During the winter months he supplies a great many eastern hotels with choice table stock, fed and fattened throughout August and September on sweet potatoes and buttermilk.

Bettered by Cross Breeding. The first 500 turtles were placed on the farm in 1920. They were a species known as the "snapping turtle." A reptile despised by fishermen. They were taken from the streams and lakes of north Iowa. Placed on the farm, they have been greatly improved by crossing with a species of chicken tortoise, somewhat resembling the leatherneck. The resulting strain is a grotesque creature resembling in some respects the chelydes and mammoth reptiles of South America. However, their flavor is appealing. Of the 20,000 turtles now on the farm possibly 1,000 are of the new hybrid species.

On the farm itself there are ten low-lying acres of mudrocks and bog, and nothing more. There are no buildings of any kind, except three dams of stone and wastewood thrown across a till of mound-spring water that trickles toward a larger stream skirting the south border of the farm. Waving rows of post tops mark the underground fences encircling the three ponds formed by the stone and wood obstructions in the little stream.
