MRS. A. H. KOHLER

DIES FROM BURNS

A message was received by Dr. A. Kohler, last Friday bearing the sad and startling news that his mother, Mrs. A. H. Kohler, had been badly burned at her home at Pensacola, Florida. On Saturday another message was received stating that the unfortunate woman had passed away. Mrs. R. E. Terrell, a daughter, left Saturday night for the southland. From a Pensacola newspaper of last Friday we are permitted to take the following account of the terrible accident: Mrs. Anthony Kohler, aged 79 years, was badly burned this morning about 10 o'clock at her home at East Pensacola Heights, while burning trash in her yard, where she had gone a few minutes before those who heard her outcry found her in flames.

Mrs. Kohler and her daughter, Miss Leola Kohler, came to Pensacola from Michigan about a month ago, having a winter home here. Miss Kohler was not feeling very well and was lying down. When her mother, attracted by the bright sunshine and wishing to be out doors, went out to take the yard. Miss Kohler said that she had no idea that her mother had any intention of lighting a fire, but thought she was amusing herself in the garden, when she heard her outcry, and found her in flames. "Snatching a blanket she ran to her and threw it about her, smothering the flames, badly burning her hands in the effort to save her mother. She flames by this time, however, had enveloped Mrs. Kohler and she was so badly burned that she is feared she will not recover."

The news of Mrs. Kohler's tragic death was a great shock to her many friends and acquaintances here and all who knew her with kind and sincere sympathy to the bereaved family. The remains will be brought to Northville for burial at a future date.

RAST LINE ROAD TO BE IMPROVED

A. E. Lasing, a well known Detroit real estate dealer, states that the improvement of the Rast line road, under state supervision, will be commenced this year and much of the work completed. The distance from Michigan avenue in Macomb county to its intersection with Grand River road at Charlevoix is 21 miles and from this point to Division Street at Farmington is 10 miles. The road is 24 miles long. The new road will be a part of the super-highway system master plan. It will be built on a 20-foot right of way, the center of which will be the Macomb-Wayne-Oakland county line. This width will permit necessary sewers and ditches for a highway of the first class—Farmington Enterprise.

Mr. Lasing says: "The Rast line road is a real gem of one of the most important thoroughfares in the state, because it is the Rast line road, extending from Lake St. Clair to Lake Michigan, from which all north and south routes are made."

While the new road will not be a part of the super-highway system master plan, it will be built on a 20-foot right of way, the center of which will be the Macomb-Wayne-Oakland county line. This width will permit necessary sewers and ditches for a highway of the first class—Farmington Enterprise.

TOOK THE DRAWINGS OVER.

Architect's drawings of the proposed new village building are on display in the window of the Lovell-Smith Realty Company, and all citizens of the village are requested to stop and look them over. The new structure will provide suitable space for our fire apparatus, convenient and comfortable public rest rooms and toilets, space for a heating plant, a cell block and a room suitable for public meetings and other public gatherings. It is estimated that the building will cost upwards of \$25,000 complete.

The village certainly needs a building centrally located for our fire fighting apparatus and for public rest rooms. For the past few months, since the rooms in the basement of the Park Hotel were closed to the public, there has been no comfort station here available to the general public and that is a condition that ought not to be tolerated longer. The new building will serve a real public need and will be a great improvement to the appearance of the business section.

NORTHVILLE MAN NEW EDISON AGENT AT MILFORD

Effective as of April 1st, the Detroit Edison Co. has made a change in its local agent. Andrew Crawford has resigned and his place has been taken by Arthur Litsenberger of Northville, who expects to move his family here later. Milford Times.

Many Northville friends will be pleased to learn that Mr. Litsenberger has been given this promotion, which is a well-deserved one.

PLANNING FOR A BIGGER AND BETTER FAIR FOR 1926.

At the regular monthly meeting of the officers and directors of the Northville Fair Association last Thursday night plans were discussed for the 1926 fair and it was the opinion of all present that every effort should be put forward to make the fair this year exceed any of the previous ones. It was decided to designate Friday, as children's day, when all school children under 12 years of age will be admitted to the grounds free. It was also decided to have a dog show again this year and Wednesday was set aside for the horse show. There will be a good face program on Tuesday, Thursday, Friday and Saturday afternoons, with ball games as usual. The free attractions this year will be better than those of last season, and equal to any to be shown at any of the surrounding fairs.

It was voted to build an addition on the west side of the main hall to provide more display room for the fruit and vegetable displays. Harry G. Bachman will have charge of the horticultural department again, his year and liberal purses will be offered for large displays as well as individual exhibits.

Every superintendent promised a better display than last year, and these men usually keep their promise.

HOWARD COLE APPOINTED VILLAGE MARSHAL

At the meeting of the village council Monday evening, President E. L. Smith made his appointments for the ensuing year and they were confirmed by the trustees. Howard Cole was appointed marshal and his duties will include the care and upkeep of the fire fighting apparatus belonging to the village. Other appointments were as follows: Nightwatch, Mr. Wain, health officer, Dr. Schuyler, fire chief, Lester Brown, overseer of streets, covers and water works, Ernie Lyke, village attorney, E. J. Coulman, president of town, C. E. Langfield.

The hall chairman of committees and the other proceedings of the meeting will be found elsewhere in today's paper.

It was decided to call a special election for the purpose of submitting the proposition of issuing bonds in the sum of not to exceed \$25,000 for the erection of a building for the housing of the fire apparatus and engines, a call block, public rest and toilet room, coal room and quarters for those employed by the fire department. The date chosen for the special election is Monday, May 1st.

The annual meeting of the Presbyterian church was held at the church parlors last Thursday night, being preceded by a bountiful dinner which was enjoyed by more than 100 persons. The report submitted showed the church to be in a very satisfactory condition and the fine attendance indicated a good interest.

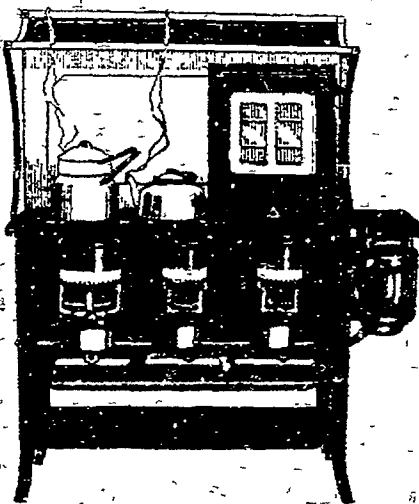

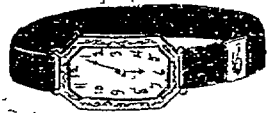

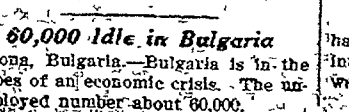

NOTHING TO INDICATE COLD SUMMER—WHEN IT ARRIVES

Little credence is given predictions that the summer of 1926 will be a cold one by Prof. William J. Hussey, professor of astronomy and director of the observatory of the Michigan University. Prof. Hussey points out that predictions were made last fall that the winter would be an exceptionally

cold one. While the temperatures were somewhat lower than average, the winter was not unusually cold, he says.

Likewise there is no reason to believe that the coming summer will be exceptional, the professor asserts. The weather bureau, he says, which is best prepared to make predictions, refuses to foretell conditions more

than a few days in advance so too much dependence should not be laid on long-time prophecies of other agencies.

Reports that the earth is visited with cold summers every 39 years was ridiculed by the professor, who states that the summer of 1887 was an exceptionally warm one.

NEW TORCH MELTS STEEL UNDER WATER

Will Be Used to Open Hull of Wrecked Submarine.

New York.—A torch that can melt and cut steel at any depth under water has been perfected by the United States navy, and will be used in opening the sunken submarine S-51, now on the floor of the ocean off Block Island. Commander Ellsberg of the Brooklyn navy yard has told a reporter.

Such a torch is hailed as a valuable aid in cutting through the steel plates of submarines and submarine compartments. It was the lack of an adequately powerful torch that prevented the piercing of the submarine S-51 last fall, after it was rammed amidships by the steamer City of Rome in September. At that time acetylene torches were used, and they were practically useless when forced to pressure of more than 20 pounds under water.

The new torch consists of jets of hydrogen and oxygen which emanate from two separate sleeves to the tip of the torch. From a third sleeve comes compressed air. When the compressed air is applied at any depth under water it forces an air bubble to surround the hydrogen and oxygen. Thus protected from the water, the fire within the bubble of air is injected into the steel. It usually reaches a temperature of 5,000 degrees Fahrenheit, according to Commander Ellsberg.

The steel plate melts. From the time the flame is applied the steel plate, usually an inch thick or less on submarines, can be cut at the rate of a foot a minute.

The navy has been experimenting on the torch for several years. When the submarine S-51 sank, the torch was in the experimental stage.

With the aid of the torch it will be possible to get into the innermost compartments of the submarine. Holes will be burned in the hull of the submarine as well as in the walls of the compartments, and the compressed air will be forced into the hull, thus driving out the water and making the craft more buoyant.

The torch is of 24-inch size still in the submarine. It is heated and cooled by a tank of oil and gas on the submarine is lifted to the surface.

Working Model of Solar System Built by Alien

Chicago.—A mechanical model of the solar system which, according to Professor P. H. Moulton, head of the department of astronomy at the University of Chicago, shows more of the facts of the motion of the earth and moon than any similar machine in the world, is now on display at the Chicago Science Museum.

Dr. Moulton was educated as a mechanical engineer at the Technical School of Marjory K. K. Moulton, at Polk, Iowa, and came to Chicago in 1912. Changing to read astronomy, he became intrigued by the mechanics of the universe and determined to construct an accurate model in miniature.

He spent three years of arduous calculations before he began constructing his model. The work itself required four years' labor in the little shop at the rear of his home here, with the simplest of tools. He frequently worked all night, refusing to stop even for meals.

An electric light ball represents the sun in Dr. Moulton's model. The machine is motivated by a clock, registering central time the day, month and year, and operating 170 gears that control movements ranging from one minute to 12,500 years. Thus the position of the models at a given second corresponds to that of the planets, and the movements of the moon around the earth and the earth around the sun are portrayed with exact periodicity and eccentricity. The entire mechanism is mounted in an elliptical frame 10 feet in diameter.

"In my opinion this machine is a very remarkable mechanism," said Professor Moulton. "It makes particularly clear those features which are found difficult to teach."

Coolidge Accepts Wildcat on Behalf of National Zoo

Washington.—President Coolidge has accepted as a gift a young wildcat which until recently roamed the Great Smoky mountain of Tennessee, but he specified that shipment was to be made direct to the National Zoo. The cat was caught in Sevier county, Tennessee, which the Great Smoky Mountain Conservation association advised the White House was the "strongest Republican county in the country in 1924."

Thread From Eye Seen After 11 Years

Haverstraw, N. Y.—Mrs. Margaret King of Stoney Point, who has been blind in her right eye for 11 years, went to a Doctor Hirsch to have a piece of thread removed from that eye. She works in a coat factory and the thread got into her eye while she was at work. Doctor Hirsch removed the thread and was almost as astonished as Mrs. King at her discovery that her sight had returned with its removal.

CIVIL WAR VETERAN DIES AT MILFORD

Patrick J. Ormond, 84-year-old Civil War veteran, who served in the navy for years under Admiral Farragut, died at his home near White Lake last Friday at 7:00 a. m. after being in ill health since October 25th, last, when he suffered a stroke of paralysis. Mr. Ormond had a wide acquaintance in this part of Michigan and was the first land owner in the White Lake area to subdivide his farm.

FORD MOTOR CO. USES QUANTITIES OF BRASS

The Ford Motor brass foundry at Highland Park in 1925 consumed 68,891,142 pounds of brass, bronze, and other non-ferrous metals, an increase of 17,337,542 pounds, or 25 per cent over 1924. This amount includes all non-ferrous metals used in the Model T, truck, tractor, D. T. and L. Lincoln, and machine repair businesses.

The smallest casting weighed but a fraction of an ounce, while the largest casting was of pure copper and weighed 2,300 pounds.

The furnace equipment of the foundry consists of 12 one-ton capacity electric furnaces, 14 oil furnaces of 1,400-pound capacity and six crucible furnaces of 500 pounds each.

OLD RESIDENT DIES AT PLYMOUTH

Mrs. Sarah Burch, aged 92 years, a highly respected resident of this place, passed away at the home of her son-in-law, J. B. Burch, on Main street, with whom she had lived for many years, last week Thursday morning, April 1st. Mrs. Burch had been in her usual good health all winter, but Monday morning, March 23, fell at her home and sustained a fractured hip. The shock of which, due to her advanced years, resulted in her death.

Sarah Westfall was born at Lyons, Wayne county, New York, December 10, 1833. In 1858, she was united in marriage to Lafayette Burch, who preceded her to the higher life several years ago—Plymouth Mail.

THE FORD MOTOR COMPANY HAS A BIG LITTLE SURPLUS

Assets of the Ford Motor Company as of December 31st, 1925, were \$742,915,523.98, an increase of \$1,002,146,146.00 over assets at the beginning of the year. According to the company's annual financial statement just filed with the Michigan state tax commission, the company's surplus is placed at \$623,968,993.00, a decrease of \$51,600,000 during the 12 months and of approximately \$15,000,000 during the past two years.

Included among the assets were Real estate, \$122,107,208; machinery and equipment, \$12,445,903; merchandise, \$10,631,137; debts, receivable, cash, stock, securities, patent rights and trade name, \$1,626,256. Liabilities include: Capital stock, \$7,264,500; accounts payable, \$76,638,613; funded indebtedness and mortgages, \$145,000; reserves, \$25,509,562; surplus, profits and loss, \$622,366,293.

ALL PREVIOUS PRODUCTION RECORDS ARE BROKEN

All first quarter production records in the automotive industry were shattered during the first three months of 1926 when 1,137,589 passenger cars and commercial vehicles were made in the United States and Canada. This compares with an output of 905,527 during the first quarter of 1925 and 1,094,424 during the previous record first quarter of 1924.

A new March record was established last month when 447,185 vehicles were produced, according to preliminary estimates by the National Automobile Chamber of Commerce, based upon individual factory shipping statements. This total was not only a new high for the third month, but was the second high for all time and compared with an output of 37,252 in March, 1925, and 452,436 in October last year, the high record month. There is now one motor car for every 55.5 persons in the United States and Michigan manufacturers are expected to produce 1,200,000 cars in 1926.

WET COMMITTEE NO MATCH FOR THE WOMEN

When sixty-five women, representatives of many woman's organizations in America, appeared before the Senate prohibition committee at Washington on Monday Senator Reed and his wet sympathizers were handed some pretty hard wallops. The wets may deceive some men, but they will not be able to fool the women of the country, who know that present day conditions are very much better than they were in the days of the open saloon. They know that women and children are faring much better under the present prohibition laws than they did when the men of the house could run a bar bill which must be paid every day whether they could take any money home to the family or not.

The wets are making a grand stand play for sympathy, but they will not get it with our present Congress and with the silent man in the White House. The dry forces should unite and demand a better enforcement of laws the removal from office of all public officials who neglect to do their duty, and the punishment of the rum runner and the bootlegger and the unmasking of those who patronize them.

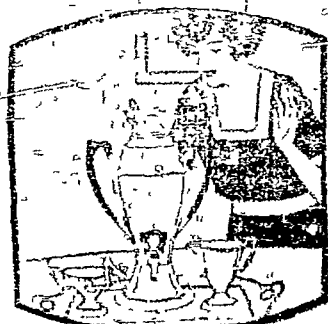

RECORD LINERS—THE BEST RESULT GETTERS

STATE NEWS IN BRIEF

Battle Creek—In a resolution adopted by the Battle Creek Ministerial Association, the board of education has been called upon for the second time to place the Bible in the curriculum of the high school. Members of the board of education recently denied a similar request by the ministers.

East Lansing—A better understanding between the real estate men and the farmers in disposing of farm or improving farm properties was the aim of a two-day conference held at Michigan State College, April 9 and 10 by the Michigan Real Estate Board and the college. Many farmers were present for the meetings.

Grand Rapids—All records of snow fall in Grand Rapids were broken during the past winter, according to William H. Tracy, meteorologist at the Grand Rapids Weather Bureau office. Thus far 88.3 inches of snow has fallen. Previous to this winter, the winter of 1889-1900 held the record with a snow fall of 73.7 inches.

Cadillac—Mrs. Lydia Mansfield was defeated by her husband, Wilbur Mansfield, in the race for constable in Booth Township. B. V. Morgan, manager of Cadillac Ranch, will be the only new member on the Westford County board of supervisors when it next convenes here. He defeated William McNitt Jr. by five votes.

Lansing—Some of the largest oil companies are obtaining leases on Michigan land, according to R. A. Smith, state geologist. The tapping of several oil wells near Saginaw has caused the companies to come into the state to experiment and to make arrangements to get in on the ground floor in case extensive oil fields should be located, he said.

Grand Rapids—Co-operation of the police department, motor clubs and other organizations with the Grand Rapids Safety Council has placed the community in the lead among cities of its size in safety matters, according to W. H. Cameron, Chicago, managing director of the National Safety Council. A meeting was held to address groups of interested safety work.

Ann Arbor—Edward F. Maloney, owner of the Lumber Oil Co., distributor of Lard Oil and other petroleum products, who was arrested on a charge of violating the state lottery law by giving away automobiles each month through drawings of chance by taking slips from boxes of his products, will have an examination April 20 in the court of Justice Edwin D. Malloy.

Benoni—Six hundred Western Michigan students from 29 cities held a two-day convention here April 7-8. The business session was featured by addresses by Paul King, of Detroit, and Arthur Sharp, executive president of Rotary International. Sessions the first day were devoted mostly to social activities, with a grand ball and banquet in the evening.

Ann Arbor—The youth is in revolt against the dissection and stultification of the modern church and is seeking a "living vessel" or religion was the opinion expressed by Rabbi Stephen S. Wise, founder and head of the Free Synagogue, of New York City, in an address on "The Revolt of Youth—Against What?" before an audience of students, faculty members and townspeople.

Lansing—Carl Boehringer and Robert Powers, two former students of Michigan State college, now on a world tour, have reached New York and are waiting for a boat to take them across the Atlantic. According to the boys, their expenses from Lansing to the eastern seaboard totaled \$2,000. They received lifts from motorists. They plan to work their way across the water by making themselves useful on the boat.

Grand Rapids—The centennial celebration of the arrival of Louis' Camp, first white settler here, will be held late in September, the exact date to be determined at a meeting April 21 of Mayor Elvin Swartz's committee which is in charge of the program. The desire of the committee to use school children in the pageantry makes it necessary to hold the celebration after school opens. Charles W. Garfield is chairman of the general committee.

Lansing—Dr. Kenyon L. Butterfield in a recent address from the Michigan State College radio station, urged rural beautification. He advocated landscaping on farms and along highways. Rural schools church buildings and meeting halls should be made attractive, he said. "Rural landscaping has to do with appropriate planting of flowers shrubs and trees, the layout of the farms, the arrangement of the fields and buildings and preservation of trees," he declared.

Owosso—Competition between doctors has disappeared and today physicians are doing their best to avoid taking on additional practice. Dr. J. J. Harland, of Owosso, told the Kiwanis Club here recently. He said the reason was that physicians were dying off twice as fast as they were being graduated and added that the time is coming soon when the only place that a sick person will be able to get proper care will be in a hospital, because physicians will not have time to make calls at the homes.

Muskegon Heights—For the seventh time during his 45-year residence here, Martin Schoenberg has been elected mayor of Muskegon Heights, defeating Mrs. Kaja Lindland.

Detroit—Michigan's gasoline tax of 2 cents a gallon raised \$3,336,078 revenue last year, which was the fourth highest amount accruing to any state, according to figures made public by the United States Bureau of Public Roads.

Detroit—Removing ice and snow from city streets during the winter cost Detroit taxpayers \$125,000, according to a report to the Council by John W. Reid, commissioner of Public Works. The recent heavy snow fall cost the city \$12,000.

Wyandotte—Formal opening of the new Wyandotte Electric Plant of Wyandotte was held Easter Sunday, when more than 2,500 visitors inspected the establishment. The plant has been a partial operation since 1919. During the last three years \$300,000 has been expended in adding to its facilities.

Ypsilanti—Miss Maxine V. Hall, 16, a schoolgirl and Democratic candidate for mayor, was defeated by the recent election by Hugh Van der Walke, Republican incumbent, by a vote of 640 to 418. Miss Hall had conducted an energetic campaign and carried one of the five wards in the city by a slight majority.

Flint—With a prospectus record enrollment of 600 students the Flint Institute of Technology, educational division of the Industrial Mutual Association, commenced the spring term of school Monday evening, April 5, authorities said. Many of the students of the winter course continued their work for the spring session.

Dowagiac—Fred Cross, 28 years old, Michigan's youngest mayor, was defeated for re-election recently by a majority of only six after one of the hottest elections in the history of the city. A. O. Neider, his opponent, running on a platform favoring expansion of the municipal heating plant, polled 577 votes to Cross' 581.

Grand Rapids—Grand Rapids will henceforth not employ any married women as teachers in the public schools, the board of education has decided. At the end of each semester, all women teachers who have married before the expiration of their contract will be placed under suspension until the substitute has been found to satisfy regulations. This does not affect married teachers now employed.

Owosso—Seth H. Pulver, of Owosso, a member of the Republican state central committee, has declined that he is not a candidate for the Republican nomination for governor. He is, however, recently by a Grand Rapids package one of several possibilities for opposing Governor Cramer for re-nomination. Pulver is a candidate for the Republican nomination for state senator in the 14th district, Clinton county district.

Flint—Police are searching for the murderer of Dr. J. H. Smith, 50-year-old Flint physician, who was shot and instantly killed by two shotgun bullets which struck him in the chest and face at close range in the dining room of his home on House at 1735 Elm street. Police on the night of April 10 found Dr. Smith's body on the floor of his home. A shotgun, with the firing pin and trigger, was found on the floor with two empty shells and one full one.

Pontiac—Two Hardy Pontiac youths recently broke the ice literally for the 1926 swimming season when they chopped a hole through the frozen surface of Elizabeth lake and took the first swim. Snow was all day and there was little suggestion the swimmers for the popular summer resort. A number of witnesses were on hand to see that the boys of the pair, that they would be the first to go swimming this year was carried out.

Lansing—The city of Lansing will be enriched about \$85,000 by the terms of the settlement of the George E. Ranney estate, and reduction of fees claimed by the executors, which had promised to be a long fought court duel between the city and two heirs and the administrator. The value of the estate, of \$1,000,000, has increased to \$1,400,000. The reduced fee will be paid by the two heirs. The city is given one-sixth of the value of the property.

Ishteping—Ishteping's "Easter parade" consisted of a procession of residents carrying bottles, jugs and pails. The city's water supply was cut off at noon the day before by a break in the lead water main. The situation was critical for a time when the home of Mrs. Matinee Holmgren on Strawberry street caught fire. The firemen were forced to stand around helplessly and watch the building burn. Two others were damaged and a general conflagration was feared.

Madroo—Agents of the Detroit & Ironston railroad, property of Henry Ford, recently bought 200 acres on and along the right-of-way of the railroad at the southern outskirts of Petersburg. It has been announced through an official source that it is understood the owners received from \$200 to \$500 per acre. Options also have been secured for a half section of land, one and a half miles long and approximately a half mile wide adjacent to the right-of-way. It is stated that railroad shops and facilities will be erected.

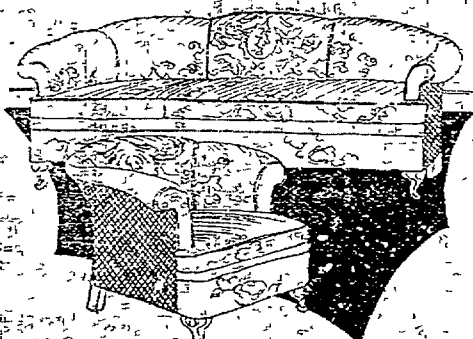

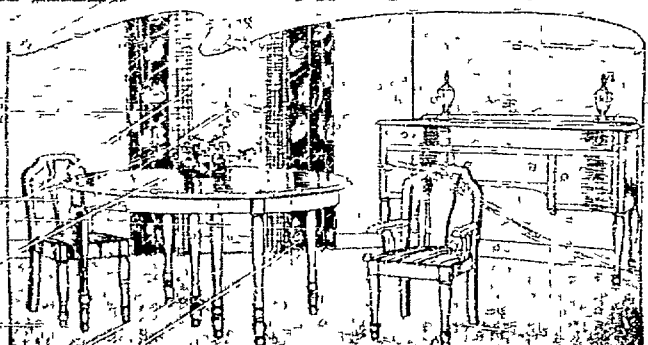

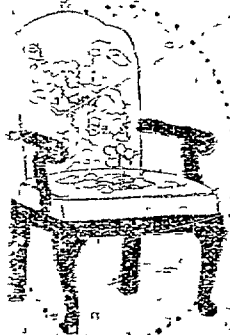

HISTORY OF THE LADIES LIBRARY ASSOCIATION OF NORTHTVILLE, MICHIGAN.

In the year 1909 a few of the progressive citizens of the Village interested themselves in surveying the educational advantages of the community. It was agreed that it possessed a school of exceptional merit, churches with able ministers, and strong congregations, also various other organizations in sufficient numbers to not only amuse and interest the people, but also to make Northville a very desirable place in which to live. Notwithstanding all the advantages there seemed to be no place, nor material available for the general public to read and study or obtain such privileges usually accorded in a public library.

A meeting of several influential citizens was held which resulted in the formation of a permanent organization to be known as the Ladies Library Association of Northville, Michigan. A constitution and by-laws were duly drawn and adopted on the completion of the organization.

Miss Mary E. Lapham was chosen president, she having been the leading advocate of the proposition from its conception.

The membership was constituted by the payment of \$2.00 annually, and entitled members to vote for officers and trustees. The by-laws required that these officers must be women, and that property coming into the hands of the association could not be sold or appropriated for other than library purposes as indicated and expressly stipulated in the charter.

The nucleus of the library was formed by a gift of some 250 books by Miss Lapham, who later, after the association became operative on a sound and growing basis, presented a valuable present property with building centrally located to the association presently stipulating it should be owned and operated as a library.

At this time, April, 1926, it is interesting to look back over the 37 years history of the association, note the various changes made, while the many ups and downs through which it has passed and give credit to the men who have interested themselves in helping to a gratifying service in the up-building of this valuable public educational organization.

The association that counts among its valued members a few who are among the original organizers.

The trustees have kept the library abreast with the times and are constantly adding not only books, but fixtures, furniture, works of art, and have had the good fortune to have received several gifts in money sufficient to enable them to keep their property in splendid physical condition.

The library now contains nearly 1,500 volumes, 1,500 of which are splendid reference books, which are well patronized alike by school children and "grown-ups." The present operation is entirely under the management of 12 trustees who have full charge acting as librarians without pay keeping the library open every Saturday afternoon and evening for the public and performing all their duties incident to the successful operation of the enterprise.

The membership fee has been 50c for the last several years enabling the members to draw a book a week, or 50 a year or less than one cent for books with average cost of over \$2.00 each. The interest to the onlooker, when it is stated that the present secretary was one of the original organizers while the president has been in her present position 14 years, and a member of the trustees 26 years.

The growth of the community as well as the library has necessarily greatly increased the labor and responsibilities of the trustees so that at the recent township meeting they asked under the new law enacted in 1925 for a sufficient appropriation from the township for certain operating expenses and to pay a librarian to be on duty three afternoons and evenings a week. This was granted in a well attended meeting with only two negative votes.

The association has been extremely fortunate in having so many willing workers—always ready to carry on with good counsel and actual work in solving the many vexing problems of the institution, for such it has become to the community.

Mrs. W. G. Lapham's services have been invaluable during nearly the entire life of the association in not only giving money freely herself but in urging others to do so and she has also shown and exercised rare talent in selecting, arranging and overseeing the reference books.

Mrs. Cass R. Benton has also done yeoman service as a trustee and official. There are many others entitled to special mention if space permitted.
