In addition to providing suitable council room, rest room and toilets, a suitable place for the fire engine and all needed apparatus, the Lapham property will give the people of this village a public park that will be the admiration of all.

It is believed that this is a proposition that will meet our present needs and one that will provide a suitable site for a community building should Northville citizens decide to erect one during the coming years.

If the proposition to bond for the sum of \$40,000.00 to purchase the Lapham property, carries the bonds voted at the recent special election will not be issued. By this new plan the indebtedness of the village would be increased but \$15,000.00 and the amounts received from the sale of the two pieces of property now owned by the village will be deducted from that amount.



LATEST ORDER ADDS 10,000 DRY SLEUTHS

Both Factions Declare President's Action Illegal

Washington—An executive order authorizing the appointment of state, county or municipal officers as federal prohibition officers, signed by President Coolidge and made public by the treasury department, has the addition of an estimated 10,000 of "dollar a day" men to the federal force.

Washington—The prohibitionists who are in the lead in the fight for the repeal of the 18th amendment are not alone in their opinion that the country will be better governed by a national legislature.

The bill which is operative in suspending the prohibition provisions of the constitution, while others are holding federal jobs, reads as follows:

In order that the prohibition provisions of the constitution may be enforced, any state, county or municipal officer, may be appointed, as a prohibition officer of the treasury department to enforce the provisions of the national prohibition act and acts supplementary thereto in those states, territories, and possessions having a statutory provision against the sale of intoxicating liquors under the national prohibition act.

Prohibition Referendum in N. Y. C. Led by Smith

Gov. Smith in explaining his veto action on the measure said: "The arguments on both sides of the question view the situation through the hazy glasses of prejudice. The bill will settle for the present the attitude of the people of this state on the whole question. If the voice of a people means anything in democracy, it can be ascertained as to my desire."



STATE NEWS IN BRIEF

Port Huron—Charles Mugaero, contractor of Port Huron, has been ordered by the city commission to rebuild half a mile of sewer constructed by him in 1925. Mayor James Dunn charged the sewer joints were improperly laid and are filling with sand.

Big Rapids—Thomas Mitchell, a potato shipper at Stanwood, was arraigned recently in Justice court on a federal complaint that he shipped a carload of poor potatoes to the Detroit market. He pleaded guilty and was assessed \$10. entering fine and costs.

Soon after the Rev. C. R. Vanhatsma had read the service, flames enveloped the Morris barn. The wedding party formed a bucket brigade and succeeded in saving the house.

Houghton—Allan Jones and Frank D. Clark, teller and bookkeeper, respectively, for the First National Bank of Lake Linden, were arrested May 19 on a Federal warrant charging the embezzlement of approximately \$40,000. The complaint was signed by United States Bank Examiner William F. Sheenan. There will be no loss to the bank as it is fully protected by safety funds.

Monroe—The Monroe and Recreation Association of America has arrived here for its 25th anniversary work on the big project to be given here June 3-24, along the banks of Plum creek about 1500 persons from Monroe and county will take part.


