A BELOVED MOTHER CALLED TO HER REWARD.

Many friends in this community were greatly surprised to learn of the death of Mrs. Louisa Lerchen Hills, which occurred at the home of her daughter, Mrs. Lerov Stewart, Monday evening. Funeral services were held at the home of Mrs. Stewart on Thursday afternoon at 2:00 and were conducted by Rev. F. P. Knowles. Interment took place at Rural Hill cemetery.

NEW BIDS RECEIVED FOR WOMAN'S PRISON.

New bids for the construction of a woman's prison at Northville, submitted in accordance with a recent revision of plans for the prison, have been received by the House of Correction Commission. The contract probably will be awarded this week, Edward Denniston, superintendent said. The new bids call for an expenditure which, if finally authorized, will mean a saving of more than \$400,000 in comparison with the cost under the previous plan. Bids were received from the W. E. Wood Co., \$579,750; the Detroit-Walker Co., \$532,582; and the Walbridge-Aldinger Co., \$547,547. The original plan called for the construction of twelve buildings, with 531 cottages with a capacity of 94 inmates each, while the revised plan calls for the construction of six buildings, including only four cottages. The bids were received by Mrs. Henry McCampbell, on behalf of the commission, and the full commission will act on them this week, Superintendent Denniston said.—Detroit News.

GAVE CHILDREN AN' SUMMER CAMP.

Exchange Clubs, throughout the country, are conducting Sunshine Specials by providing entertainment for the children of the cities and towns who are unable to enjoy a summer outing. In Northville there are very few children but situated and the effort of the local club was directed in providing an automobile ride about the country for the children at the summer camp of the Spring Hill Sanatorium. Thursday afternoon was the time selected and the Sunshine Special, composed of several automobiles left the grounds at 3:30 for a tour of the surrounding country. The first stop at the camp will be returned to the city today and another round trip will be made on Friday for a few weeks.

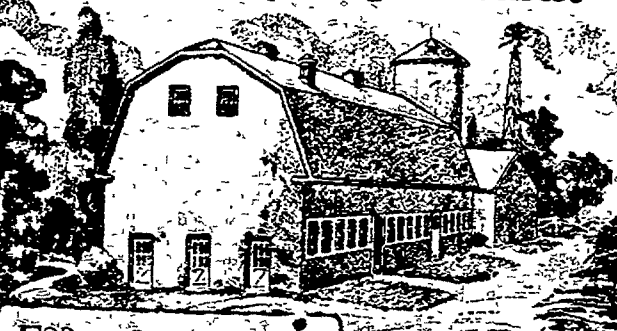
NEW SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS ENGAGED.

SHOULD NORTHVILLE BUY THE FAIR GROUNDS?

The proposition that the village should buy the fair grounds in this village is a subject that has been discussed in fair circles and out for some time, and at a meeting of a group of men just the other day the matter was again talked over. Those who favor the plan argue that if the village owned the property it could be leased for a yearly rental to the fair association sufficient to pay interest on the investment and thus the community would always be assured a public play ground. Even if the fair should cease to exist in future years the property would always be available for the use of the public.

The plan, proposed to acquire the property is for the village to buy the outstanding stock representing 3,000 shares at a par value of \$10.00 each. Some of those who have been in favor of this plan have offered to sell their stock at par, while others feel that the village could well afford to pay at least three for one for the stock. At that figure the property could be acquired for about \$9,000.00.

The stockholders have never received any dividends on their stock and no one expects to because all the profits that have been made have been put into new buildings and improvements and a sum has been placed in an emergency fund in case the association should strike a bad week sometime for its annual fair.

It has been suggested that the money received from the sale of the old village building and from the lot on east Main street be used for this purpose. If that proposition should meet with the approval of the people of the village the funds received would nearly pay for the fair grounds and their present equipment. This is a subject that should be given careful consideration by our citizens. Surely it would be a good investment if the village could acquire the property by purchase.

U. S. IS IGNORED ON WORLD COURT DEAL

14 of 22 Countries Fail to Make Any Reply.

Washington, July 29.—Cuba, Greece and Liberia have accepted the resolutions laid down by the senate to United States adherence to the World Court protocol.

This became known when a tabulation of interchanges initiated by the State department last February with notifications to 22 governments that the United States is prepared to adhere to the court, with reservations, and asking the acceptance of those reservations, showed that, where acknowledgments had been received from 12 countries, 6 others explained that they would reserve their decision until after the League conference, and no response whatever had been received from the other 14 nations.

Those reserving their decision pending the League conference are Austria, Norway, Albania, Finland, Rumania, and the Kingdom of Serbia. Croats and Slovenes, while no acknowledgment has been received from Great Britain, Japan, Belgium, Italy, Spain, the Netherlands, Sweden, Bulgaria, Czechoslovakia, Estonia, Hungary, Brazil, Chile and Luxembourg.

Since the League of Nations called the Geneva September conference of signatory powers after the State department's applications were dispatched, and it is regarded as certain that these 12 governments will attend that meeting, State department officials interpret the position they occupy as "perfectly normal." They believe that the American position of the League Division to the influence of the League of Nations is a matter of course and that the League of Nations will serve to expedite action and that after the meeting of the League of Nations the League of Nations will speedily make known their position to American authorities.

The governments which sent back acknowledgments of the receipt of the notification include France, Bolivia, China, Columbia, Denmark, Haiti, Latvia, Lithuania, Panama, Paraguay, Persia, Poland, the Dominican Republic, Portugal, Salvador, Spain, Switzerland, Uruguay and Venezuela.

WASHINGTON BRIEFS

Lack of street and number addresses on letters has become such a drag on the postal service that Assistant Postmaster General Bartlett has begun a general campaign to educate the business public in the necessity of giving complete addresses on all letters.

Army air officers are investigating the recent crash of Major Spatz from Washington to Kelly field, Texas, to ascertain whether he established a new time record for the route followed.

A 2-cent envelope, with the red stamp bearing a picture of the Liberty bell, will be issued by the Post-office department to commemorate the sesquicentennial anniversary of American independence.

The rise of radio has resulted in the swamping of the United States patent office under the greatest deluge of applications in history.

Takes Brazil Out of League
Rio de Janeiro.—President Bernardes has signed the decree which definitely terminates Brazil's connection with the League of Nations by dissolving the country's permanent delegation to the league.

Storm Kills 100 Serbians
Vienna.—One hundred persons are reported to have been killed at Rugovo, Serbia, when a hurricane, accompanied by a cloudburst, struck the town.

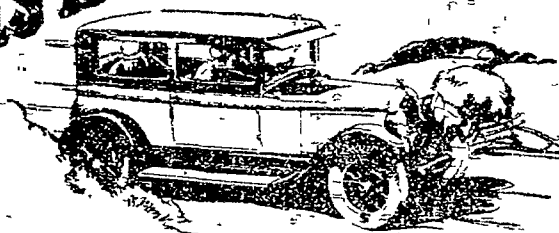

U. S. EXPENSES ARE 55 MILLION HIGHER

Aggregate Liabilities of Government Departments Are Ten Million Less.

Washington.—Although expenditures chargeable against ordinary receipts at the close of the fiscal year, June 30, were \$35,000,000 greater than for the year ending June 30, 1925, the aggregate expense of government departments was about \$10,000,000 less. This is revealed by figures just made public by the treasury.

Legislative and executive branches of the government, the State, Treasury, Post-Office, Commerce, Department of Veterans' Affairs and the District of Columbia required however outlays. Additional expense in this regard was, however, offset by large cuts in the budgets of the departments of War and Navy, Interior, Agriculture and Labor.

For the fiscal year just closed the ordinary expenditures amounted to \$35,495,573 compared with \$35,293,446, according to the statistics. From this total is subtracted appropriations for the retirement of public debts, the expenditures from various miscellaneous funds, refunds of internal revenue taxes and customs duties, payments under the "soldiers' bonus" act and railroad items, alien property, the shipping board, and the Panama canal. This leaves the aggregate for governmental departments at \$18,266,630 for 1926, compared with \$18,366,735 for the fiscal year of 1925.

Expenditures of the executive department of the government rose from \$41,898 to \$43,876 and the legislative branch expended \$13,776,250, compared with \$13,855,664 in the previous year.

The Navy department heads the list of federal branches showing decreases, its requirements being \$312,733,400 compared with \$346,142,001 in the previous year. The War Department's expense account also shows a substantial shrinkage from \$361,537,588 to \$355,072,225. Other departments showing a decline in expense were: The Interior department from \$302,444,634 to \$301,779,049; the Department of Agriculture from \$194,444,253 to \$175,350,424 and the Department of Labor from \$167,784,111 to \$144,890,000.

On the debit side, tax refunds showed a considerable increase, amounting to \$10,222,063 compared with \$1,177,777,989 in the fiscal year of 1925.

The Treasury department during 1926 paid to square the deficit in postal receipts the sum of \$29,500,409 compared to \$24,107,843 in the previous year.

Soldiers' bonuses for the year just closed required \$1,011,742,239 compared with \$90,158,754.

Under the new retirement of public debts program to \$157,111,111, the total of \$107,091,776 through that date shows a decrease of \$165,240,000 required under debt settlements with foreign countries. \$1,837,541 in purchases of government bonds from foreign countries; \$507,000 from federal reserve and intermediate credit bank franchise taxes and \$62,000 in forfeitures, gifts and miscellaneous. All this is added to the surplus of about \$29,000,000 which automatically went to card debt settlement.

Amounts paid in interest on the public debt increased from \$81,500,022 a year ago to \$83,770,000 for the fiscal year just closed.

Grand Jury Gives Up

on Aimee McPherson Case

Los Angeles, Calif.—The puzzling case of Rev. Aimee McPherson, who disappeared after leaving a green bathing suit at Ocean Beach, Calif. last May 15, and reappeared in a gray bathing dress walking over the Sonora desert at Agua Prieta on June 23, has become a matter for the individual opinion of the public of Los Angeles.

The Los Angeles grand jury, meeting for its fourth successive session of inquiry into the case, voted against returning indictments for want of evidence against persons who Mrs. McPherson, in her appearance before the grand jury, alleged kidnapped her from the bathing beach and held her captive for \$500,000.

Rumor 50,000 Aliens

Are to Be Deported

Chicago.—Washington reports that new plans are afoot to deport 50,000 aliens who have no right to remain in this country led to the announcement that there are 3,851 aliens in institutions in the Chicago district. Of these it is estimated that 1,253 are deportable.

The reason for the keen desire to have this exposition in our state is that we believe the show performs a function in the educational field which is not to be obtained in any other way.

Breeders and dairymen will have an opportunity this fall to see the best individual animals of the five leading dairy herds. This show is commonly called the "Court of Last Resort" because it is the one show at which the prize winners of the state fairs and sectional shows, all over the country and Canada are brought together to battle for the prize of prize.

Those who attend the exposition and make a thorough study of the exhibits will come away with a greater vision of their industry and will be able to realize the greatness of their work. There will be some high class shows that will hold interest for everyone connected with the industry.

The Health Food Show showing the place and importance of the products of the dairy cow in relation to human food in the national diet will make a long and more appreciative impression upon those who attend. The food shows also showing the possibilities of the home grown nation and their capacity to improve them, the farm will give a lesson that few have ever had.

This is a great national exposition, at an enormous expense to the industry, and offers an opportunity for Michigan dairymen to get an advertisement about their greatest industry. Time, a little expense, and a receptive attitude are all that will be required on the part of the individual dairyman to get a new idea in show and story of his own business that will go a long way toward helping him work out his own day problems.
