Gas from the Plymouth plant of the Michigan Federated Utilities has been turned on into the cut, the laying of the last main connecting Wayne with the plant having been completed early last week. At the same time the service was made available to Elkhorn, together with many homes located along the right-of-way between the two towns.

The bringing of gas to Wayne marks the completion for work by the Michigan Federated people that started early last spring and which includes the laying of a large supply main from Plymouth and the installing of the city main and house connections here.

GEN. HINES WOULD HAVE 150,000 ARMY**War Expert Says Economy Has Weakened U. S. Strength.**

Washington.—A standing peace-time army of 150,000 men was urged by Maj. Gen. John L. Hines in an address welcoming the new class of army officers to the "war college." General Hines deplored the condition brought about by economy, which has weakened the military strength of the nation. "The effect of this reduction upon the regular army must, temporarily, at least, result in a lowered morale," he said. In discussing the new class, he said: "In most respects, peace organization has been the result of a compromise between military expediency and cost, with cost usually in the last factor." Therefore, before you make recommendations for changes in the peace establishment, I would advise that you consider the limitations imposed by appropriation and be sure that you fully understand the problems involved in the operation of the peace system."

The news that during the Groesbeck administration a budgetary bill had been established without authority which, under the leadership of the governor, had established a military budgetary procedure.



ARMY RELIEF AERIAL EXPOSITION SELFRIEDE FIELD

What promises to be the greatest carnival ever witnessed in Michigan will be staged on Saturday afternoon September 18, at Selfridge Field, Mt. Clemens, Michigan, when the First Pursuit Group will conduct a benefit for the widows and orphans of the army.

Almost 10,000 persons attended the aerial exposition held at Selfridge Field in 1924 and Major T. G. Lapham, the commanding officer of the First Pursuit group, promises that this mark will be bettered this year as many changes at various points have been arranged for this forthcoming exposition.

The First Pursuit Group would like to repeat the aerial exposition to be held in the grand flying field of the Army Air Service. The air must remain as clear as possible, so that each member of the group, and it may well be afforded an opportunity which none have had to date.

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FIFTH RESERVATION UP TO WORLD COURT

**Canadian Delegate Declares
Clause Would Give Amer-
ica Dominance.**

Geneva.—The fifth of the United States' reservations under which America would become a member of the World Court of International Justice unanswered, though whether during the discussions on the statutes or that body who were called to consider the American reservations. The first three reservations were adopted, most of them without much debate.

The second part of the fifth and last reservation which provides that the court shall sit without the consent of the United States, entered into question in which America is interested, created in the minds of several of the delegates the fear that this prerogative might in practice confer on the United States privileges not enjoyed by the members of the council of the League of Nations.

Although a number of speakers gave tentative consideration to a project for inquiring from Washington whether the United States would not be content to have the reservation amended so as to make clear that the American rights of veto would not be unlimited, the conference was unable to reach a decision and discussion was again adjourned.

Strangely enough two long and important speeches were delivered by two representatives of the British Empire, in opposition to each other, over the question of acceptance of the fifth American reservation. They were Sir George Foster of Canada and Sir Cecil Hurst of Great Britain.

Although it was Sir Cecil who first made the suggestion that Washington might accept an amendment to the fifth reservation, which while guaranteeing equal rights with members of the League of Nations before the court, authorizes the League to limit the action of whether warships in a set of the members of the League or a state neutrality could be permitted to enter its waters.

Sir George Foster, however, was not willing to let the right of intervention be used in the reservation.

**STATE NEWS
IN BRIEF**

Bay City—The Saginaw Valley Baptist association will hold its next session at Breckenridge on September 14 and 15, according to announcement received by the pastors of the local Baptist church. The local men will have a prominent part in the program.

Grand Haven—The Nicholson Steamship Co. is establishing an automobile-carrying boat line between Grand Haven and Milwaukee. A. K. Nichols, of Detroit, a representative of the company, was here recently to complete arrangements. It is planned to operate a boat, with a capacity of 100 cars a day, on a round trip to Milwaukee.

Ann Arbor—A new theatre with 1,753 seating capacity and built for motion pictures and vaudeville acts as its attraction will be begun immediately near the University of Michigan campus, according to an announcement from the directors. It is expected that the building will be rooled before winter and completed a few months later.

Grand Rapids—Mrs. Fannie A. Monroe, 76 years old, a great-great-grand daughter of Benjamin Franklin, and the widow of Colonel Alexander Adams Monroe, a Civil War veteran, is dead at the home of a daughter, Mrs. Eva Harris, where she had resided for four years. Mrs. Monroe was a native of New York state, but came to Michigan 45 years ago.

Lansing—George Ladd, State tax commissioner, has issued a statement explaining how the \$17,300,000 tax levy and the \$2.81 per rate fixed by the State Administrative Board would affect the various cities in the state. The rate is 13 cents less than that of last year. The valuation of property in the state was increased approximately \$2,000,000. The \$17,300,000 levy is the same as last year.

Dowagiac—A proposed all phone line has been laid in the small village. It will be made the property of the town, and the telephone or telephone and Grand Rapids telephone companies will take up the line. The telephone chamber of commerce has several steps at the entrance to the building are now being taken to make one of the best golf courses in the state at the Owyhee Inn. Many new trees have been planted along the golf course, and the grounds are to be landscaped.

G. Cook, coroner of Kalamazoo County, said at the inquest into the deaths of Victor Arnold, of Battle Creek, pilot, and William Burnham, and, Claire Blodgett of Climax, passengers, who were killed in a fall here recently.

Lansing—Reduction in telephone rates on certain classes of calls have been announced by the Michigan public utilities commission, the most important change being the advancement of the time of beginning of the evening rate to seven o'clock. It has been effective in the past after 8:30 p.m. The new rates become effective October 1. The order also makes provision for the reversal of charge on station to station calls where the amount of the charge is more than 25 cents.

Ada Arbor—Bank directors are considering changing the student checking account system to a method similar to that of travelers' checks. The change is being agitated by the retail merchants. If this system is adopted, it is explained, students will purchase checks from the banks and will not be able to use the regular checks. The petition says that this method would assure the merchants that money had been deposited for the checks they accepted.



National Education Association Report on Tests.

Washington, D. C.—United States, England, France, New York City, China, London, and Germany.

These are the geographical names most commonly mentioned in the United States, according to tests re-

ported in the year 1925 by the superintendents of National Education Association.

Surveys also have determined which, from the American point of view, are the mountains, lakes, and other geographical features most natural for a school child to know, on the basis of the times he will encounter them in his newspaper and other reading. Surveys by the Washington headquarters of the National Geographic Society.

The Amazon is the longest and largest of rivers, but the Rhine ranks first in geographical interest, according to one rating. And, like the Rhine, come the Nile, Danube, Mississippi, Hudson, Volga, Euphrates, Saar, Jordan, and Thames. The mighty Amazon is fifteenth on this list.

In pursuit of their efforts to teach first the geographical matters of most common knowledge educational organizations took widely popular magazines, newspapers, and books. They found that the ten most popular moun-

tains of the earth, judging from times they were mentioned, are: Alps, Caucasus, Rocky, Urals, Carpathian, Andes, Everest, Appalachians, Himalaya, and Mt. Blanc.

Greenland is the largest island but the Philippines rank first in American

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

HIGH SCHOOL CONFERENCE TO BE HELD THIS YEAR.

A Lansing dispatch says: "A series of eleven high school conferences will be held throughout the state early in the coming school year, under the direction of Prof. J. B. Edmonson of Ang. Arbr. and G. L. George of Lansing, Ass't. State Superintendents of Pub. Institutions. These conferences are to be attended by superintendents or their representatives, representatives of boards of education, and also representatives of North Central Schools in towns of less than 4,000. The object of these conferences will be to discuss practical subjects relative to the public schools, such as the law governing graded districts, standards in repair and upkeep of buildings, improvements of instruction, and deficiencies in schools as revealed by inspecto's reports.

The conferences will be held as follows: Ann Arbor, September 16th; Marshall, September 17th; Lapeer, September 18th; Saginaw, September 22nd; Gaylord, September 23rd; Lansing, September 24th; Dowagiac, September 25th; Rawley City, September 26th; Traverse City, September 29th; Grand Rapids, October 1st; and Ironwood, October 2nd.

STATE POULTRY MEN TO MEET AT M. S. C.

Poultrymen of Michigan will gather at Forestaning the week of September 14th to 18th at the Michigan State College.

A special Hatcherymen's short course and the second annual meeting of the Michigan Improvement Association are both scheduled for this week. Many of the delegates are expected to attend all sessions of the gatherings which are planned to run consecutively.

LONG DISTANCE TELEPHONE SERVICE CHANGES

Effective October 1, 1926

Reductions in Long Distance Rates to Points Outside Michigan

To points outside Michigan that are 150 miles or more distant, Long Distance rates will be reduced substantially; the greater the distance, the greater the reduction. For example, from Detroit to St. Louis, the basic station-to-station rate will be \$2.30 instead of \$3.00; to Denver, \$5.25 instead of \$7.40; to San Francisco, \$9.30 instead of \$13.45; to New York, \$2.40 instead of \$3.15. Reductions in rates from this city will be in like proportions.

Rates for distances between 24 and 110 miles will be adjusted, in many cases, to make the schedule consistent throughout, but in these cases any increase of the basic station-to-station (Anyone) rate will be only five cents.

Reversed Charges on Station-to-Station (Anyone) Calls

Heretofore the reversal of charges has been available only on person-to-person (Particular Person) calls. As a further convenience to the public, this privilege will be extended to station-to-station (Anyone) calls where the rate is 25 cents or more, both to points outside of Michigan and between points within the state.

Longer Reduced Rate Period

Reduced rate hours for station-to-station (Anyone) calls, both to Michigan points and to outside points, will begin at 7:00 p.m. instead of 8:30 p.m. as formerly. Between 7:00 p.m. and 8:30 p.m. the discount will be approximately 25 per cent of the day station-to-station (Anyone) rates; from 8:30 p.m. to 4:30 a.m. the discount will be about 50 per cent of the day rates. These discounts will apply where the day station-to-station (Anyone) rate is 40 cents or more, with a minimum reduced rate of 35 cents. Because of the unsatisfactory service conditions which it brought about, the midnight discount still in effect on calls to points outside Michigan will be discontinued.

The net result of these rate changes will be a saving to the telephone users of the United States of approximately \$3,000,000 a year. The service changes are made in the interests of public convenience, to relieve the burden now imposed by the congestion of business at midnight and to furnish still better long distance service.

Reductions and adjustments in long distance rates between points within the state became effective July 10.
