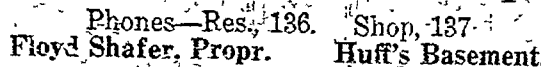

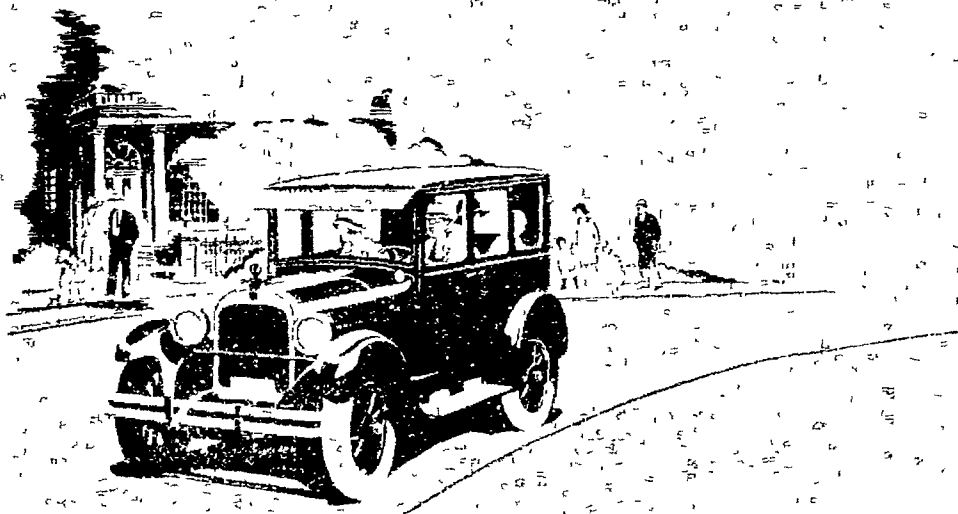

WASHTENAW WILL ASK COUNTY CATTLE QUARANTINE.

Washtenaw county board of supervisors at its next meeting in October will be requested to take immediate steps towards the establishment of a closed quarantine line along the border of Washtenaw county to prevent the importation of all cattle not tested for tuberculosis. Two cattle raisers in the county have drafted resolutions to this effect, and will present them to the board at the first meeting.

This quarantine would require examining of all cattle before being permitted to cross the borders of the county. A modified quarantine has been in effect about the county since January 1 of this year. Under this, steers may be permitted to enter the county providing the breeder charges to have them tested from the past year to the present. A quarantine, however, has been maintained in numerous cases—Charles S. Underhill.

STATE NEWS IN BRIEF

Muskegon—Chief of Police Peter Hansen of Muskegon will head the Michigan Association of Police Chiefs the coming year. He was elected at an election here. He succeeds James P. Cole of Flint.

Detroit—Lieutenant Colonel Pillsbury, district engineer here, has been authorized by the chief of army engineers to issue a permit to Macomb county to dredge a cut for a drain outlet in Lake St. Clair, about one mile west of Port St. Joseph, Mich.

Jackson—Mrs. Warren C. Stoddard, wife of the present sheriff and the first woman to seek the office of sheriff in this county was defeated in the primary election by John Van Horn, former under sheriff, who took the democratic nomination from her.

Bay City—The race between William D. Desha, representative from the Second District of Bay County, and James McKee, a former representative, was so close that a recount is likely to be demanded by McKee. Unofficial returns give Desha a lead of 12 votes.

Owosso—Any settlement of the war debts owed the United States must be based on the principle that the debtor nation must live. James Couzens of Detroit, United States senator, declared in an address before the chamber of commerce and luncheon clubs here recently.

Detroit—Twenty-five men will be added to the federal prohibition patrol of the Canadian border, thus completing the local force that has undergone reorganization at the hands of Colonel J. J. Hannon. Applications for the jobs, which pay \$1,800 a year, are now being received.

Traverse City—Twenty-six new teachers have been added to the faculties of the Michigan State Normal College and affiliated schools which start classifying for the fall term on September 30. Enrollment this year will be larger than ever, it is believed, although no official predictions have been made.

Royal Oak—A proposition to annex three square miles of territory between the Twenty and Twenty-fourth streets, directly north of Royal Oak to the city of Royal Oak, was adopted by the voters of the city and the annexed territory. The proposal lost at the preceding election. Hazel Park voters declared in a proposition to incorporate as a village.

Marshall—Prosecutor Chas. E. Corbitt of Calhoun county, has defeated his opponent, Andrew W. Lockton, for his rival for the Republican nomination for prosecutor. The renewal, Corbitt said, followed a long and arduous campaign. Lockton and Lockton were active in the prosecution of an attempt to assassinate a village.

Detroit—City officials are planning to push the court fight to oust the jitneys from the main streets of the city, following the decisive rejection of the jitney ordinance amendment by the voters. The amendment, which was introduced by the jitney drivers, and which would have given them the legal right to operate their vehicles was defeated by more than a 62 per cent majority.

East Tawas—The National Gypsum Co. of Buffalo has purchased about 4,000 acres of land, just south of Emery Junction, in this county, and will start at once the opening of quarries and the construction of a plant for the manufacture of wall-board, plaster and other gypsum products. The plant which it is said will be the second largest of its kind in the country, will involve an investment of over half a million dollars.

Lansing—Fred W. Green, reed furniture manufacturer, mayor of Ionia for 13 consecutive years, is the Republican party's choice for Governor of Michigan. A landslide of votes out in the state, coupled with a neck-and-neck race in Wayne county, enabled him to win over Gov. Alex J. Groesbeck. Lauren D. Dickinson, of Charlotte, former lieutenant-governor, defeated Lieut. Gov. George W. Welsh of Grand Rapids, for the Republican nomination for that office.

Detroit—The story of ambition that overcame prudence was revealed when a special board of inquiry at the United States Immigration department heard the statement of Yngve Simmons, 29 years old, arrested by federal immigration inspectors at the Packard Aviation field shortly after he had landed in the alleged aliens. Simmons' arrest, according to immigration authorities, has resulted in the breaking up of an alien smuggling ring that has been under surveillance for several months.

Pontiac—School district No. 9, fractional, of Oakland county, has begun proceedings in circuit court here against the O. P. Schuch company and Frank Rogers, of the state highway department, requesting an injunction to prevent excavation of privately owned property for the widening of the Dixie highway, in Waterford township. A temporary order was issued by Judge F. L. Covert. The district claims that no agreement has been reached, but despite this fact, the contractor has already excavated the road.

Sault Ste. Marie—The leg of William Shields, 60 years old, member of the crew of the tug Weston, was severed when a line became fouled, snapped against a post and caught him just below the knee. Because of his age, the injury is considered critical.

Algonac—The passenger steamer Harmonic of the Northern Navigation company stranded just north of Grand Point dock near here recently. The vessel stranded when her wheel chains parted. After four hours the boat was released by the tug Louisiana of the Great Lakes Towing company.

Lansing—The list of law students who were successful in passing the bar examination held September 6 to 8, has been given out here. The 212 candidates who passed included Ned H. Smith, Michigan university's first blind student to graduate from the law college. He was graduated in June.

Bay City—The number of criminal cases to be disposed of at the October term of the local United States district court has been mounting rapidly of late, until at the present time there are 108 cases pending. Involved in these 108 cases are 141 defendants, the greatest part of whom are charged with violation of the prohibition law.

Jackson—An \$800,000 bond issue to build a new county court house will be proposed to the voters of Jackson County in November. The board of supervisors decided before deciding to submit the proposal to the voters, the supervisors rescinded a previous resolution providing for a seven-year sinking fund, which was to have been used for the same purpose.

Adrian—Adrian city commission has accepted the resignation of Claude L. McGuffie, commissioner of public improvements, and appointed William F. Bowen to fill the unexpired term. McGuffie will go to Highland Park, where he will enter contracting work. Bowen served one year as street commissioner under the administration of Mayor W. O. Hunt.

Ann Arbor—University of Michigan's Greenland expedition, under the direction of Professor William Hobbs of the geology department, has left Holstenborg, on the schooner "Morrissey" and is due to arrive here about October 10. A letter received by university officials says: "According to the letter, the party expects to reach Svalbard about October 11, from whom they continue by rail."

ML. Clemens—Lieutenant H. G. Elmer of Sault Ste. Marie, won the John L. Mitchell (top) race Sept. 16, at the national air races at Philadelphia, defeating his brother, Lloyd. The first pursuit group in a fan race, the Mitchell cup, can be contested for only by men of this group. Captain F. H. Pritchard finished the race a few hundredths of a mile behind Elmer in average time. And Lieutenant J. J. Williams finished third.

Lansing—Wayne county's industrial property, bears nearly half the state's 1926 tax levy of \$17,668,000. It was learned from figures made public by Harold B. Fuller, secretary of the state board of equalization. Four counties of the state carry the tax burden by paying \$11,513,802 or approximately 22 per cent of the general property tax of the state. These counties are Wayne, 47 per cent, and Oakland, Kent and Genesee counties.

Lansing—Twenty-five thousand cars and trucks were transported by the state ferries across the Straits of Mackinac during the month of August, the monthly financial statement shows. The trucks totaled less than 200. Three teams with wagons also were transported. The ferry transported 18,000 cars for the same period a year ago. Foot passengers remained about at a standstill, 3,710 being transported this year and 3,724 in August a year ago.

Pontiac—Oakland county road commission has authorized bids for the construction of the new viaduct at Rochester, on what is known as the Rochester hill, a famous grade of this part of the state. The viaduct is designed to eliminate the grade that has been the bane of motorists for years. It will be one of the largest bridges in Oakland county and will have a length of 810 feet, passing over the Grand Trunk air line tracks, the Clinton river and South and Mill streets of the village.

St. Clair—Mr. and Mrs. J. Robins, Courtwright, Ont., had a narrow escape from drowning when the automobile in which they were about to ferry across the St. Clair river plunged from the dock into the deep water. Robins was sitting in the car from the dock to the small raft ferry. It is said he did not wait until dockhands had securely fastened the ferry to the dock before he attempted to drive his car upon it. Robins and his wife escaped drowning when they jumped free as the car plunged into the water.

Grayling—Northeastern Michigan has paid a sacredly eloquent tribute to that departed race, the brawny lumberjacks of the Jack pine country. The reverence for those picturesque despoilers of the Au Sable sand plains, those hardy invaders of Michigan's vast forest wilderness, arose from the hearts of 100 earnest friends of reforestation today as they dedicated the Thompson trail—the old tote-roads of the lumberjacks. The dedication exercises were a part of the first annual forest excursion of northeastern Michigan.

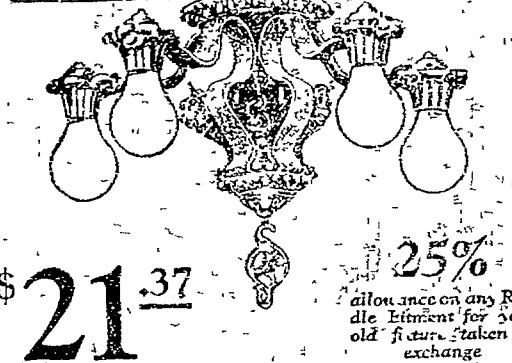
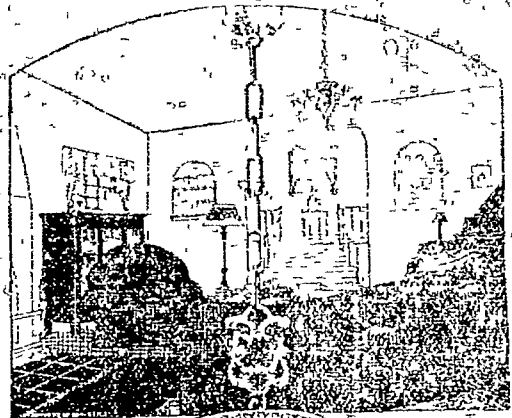

POWER BOATS DUE TO RULE MISSOURI

New Type of Navigation Replaces Steamboat.

Kansas City, Mo.—When the little blue-winged teal first took the water on the Missouri river ages ago, it began navigation history on the "Big Muddy" that soon is to see another step in its evolution.

The Indian with his canoe, the half-breasted voyager with his pirogue, the fur trader with his keel boat and the "hopper" on little steamboat with a single boiler and engine successively took up and down the treacherous river, each marking a step forward in a new type of navigation.

Steamboat Once "King" of the river, that great floating palace that marked the heyday of steamboating on the Missouri, held sway for a decade of years and with its passing was replaced by the modern means of river commerce. The modern means of river commerce, the motor launch, is now the "king" of the river.

The first attempt to navigate the Missouri by steam was made in 1818. It was a hazardous undertaking. Besides the danger of the river, which needed the most skilled navigation because of snags, sandbars and shifting channels, there was the danger of the river itself, which was a great danger to the small boats.

The first steamboat to ascend the river was the "Enterprise", a small steamboat that was built in 1818. It was built by James W. Wadsworth, a man who was a pioneer in the use of steam on the river.

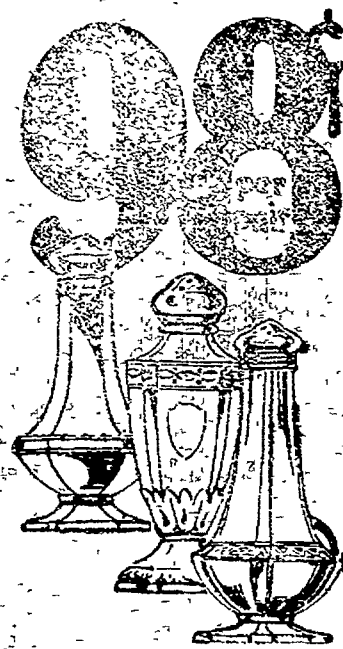

United States Gem Mines

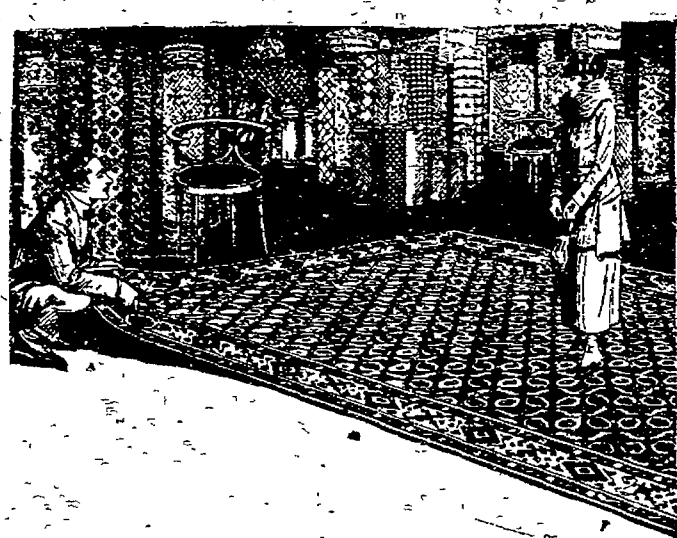
