MOONS OF JUPITER BEHAVE LIKE OURS... U. of W. Astronomer Makes Interesting Discovery... Mount Hamilton, Calif.—At least three of the moons of Jupiter, like the moon of the earth, rotate once on their axis in the same time that it takes them to make one revolution around their parent planet, declares Dr. Joel Stebbins, professor of astronomy at the University of Wisconsin, now working at the Lick observatory here.

STATE NEWS IN BRIEF

Saginaw—The sixtieth annual session of the Michigan Grand Chapter, Order of the Eastern Star, attracted about 2,000 delegates from all sections of Michigan at its convention held here recently.

Bay City—Creek-Battle Creek's new south side Junior High school is to be built immediately. Construction work having started. The structure is to cost \$588,000, and follow the latest in school architecture.

Grand Rapids—Vic Shipala, 17-year-old Highland's Country Club golfer shot an 83 over the Highlands course, leading the field in a tournament held here. Shipala is a one-armed golfer, with his left arm cut off at the shoulder.

Ironia—Leo Rogers, 36 years old, of Lake Odessa, inmate of the Michigan reformatory, was accidentally electrocuted at the Hartman factory while repairing a bell on an elevator. The inmate placed no criminal negligence, the verdict being accidental death.

Ann Arbor—Queen Marie of Rumania, will visit the University of Michigan in her tour of the United States, according to a telegram received by Dr Clarence C. Little, president of the university, from Dr. J. J. Vala, charge d'affaires of Rumania in Washington.

Saginaw—Fire Chief C. C. C. has requested an appropriation for the purchase of fire fighting equipment to combat fires in the Saginaw oil fields. A recent fire in one of the oil wells led the fire chief to make this request. The blaze was put out before it did much damage, but only after considerable difficulty.

Bay City—The 9-year-old son of Mrs. Stella Gushaw, who lives about one-half mile west of Fisherville, had the first phalanx of his thumb, middle and index fingers on the right hand blown off and suffered an injury to his left eye which may cause him to lose the sight of it, when he exploded a dynamite cap by striking it with a rock.

Ironwood—A committee of seven of the miners who were entombed in Palast mine for five days appeared before a jury today at Ashland, Wis., and swore to a statement that the shaft in their opinion, had been in a hazardous condition. They further asked that they be given compensation to locate the bodies of the victims.

Owosso—The Ann Arbor railroad has let the contract for the construction of a north-south line in the vicinity of Owosso, Mich. The line is to be built by the Toledo & Ashland line, which will cost about \$1,000,000. The new line will have a capacity of 30 cars and will connect all other of the company's lines in the area.

Detroit—Stefan M. Ross, president of the National Ice Cream Manufacturers' association in its recent convention here stated that over 2,000 ice cream companies in the U. S. manufacture 325,000,000 gallons of ice cream every year. Germany, on the other hand, has only 100 ice cream companies in the whole nation and England has a baby association of some 20 members.

Detroit—A victim of auto-suggestion, Mrs. Victoria Jrsyebisk, 30 years old, carried out the prediction of a fortune teller that she would commit suicide. After sending her 6-year-old daughter to the home of a neighbor, she swallowed the contents of a poison bottle in her home. The fortune teller, a woman, was sought at the request of the coroner who expressed the opinion she was morally, if not criminally, responsible for Mrs. Jrsyebisk's death.

Ironia—Jonis County won the second district championship in the Good Citizenship Contest conducted by the American Citizenship Committee in conjunction with the September primary vote. The grand prize of \$1,000 will be divided among the schools of the county which participated. Second place goes to Tuscola County, carrying a prize of \$500, third to Sanilac County, with \$250, and fourth to Huron County, with \$250. Rosecommon County wins \$1,000 as the state champion.

Detroit—Michigan cattle took highest honors at the National Dairy Exposition for the first time since it opened, when Strathglass, Rosamer and Penshurst Jesabell, owned by James E. Davidson, the Bay City ship builder and Republican national committeeman, were named grand champion bull and cow, respectively. In the Yorkshire division in addition to the two grand championships Mr. Davidson won two first places, one second, one fourth, two fifths, two sevenths, one eighth and two tenths.

Ann Arbor—A novel method of helping make both ends meet was discovered here in Washtenaw county in the payment of rat bounties. The township clerk of Freedom required the heads of rats to be brought to him before he signed bounty orders and the clerk of the adjoining township, Lord, made all his customers bring the tails of the rats as evidence of their having caught them. A dissembling resident of Freedom, caught rats, cut them in two and took the heads to the Freedom clerk and the tails to the Lord clerk.

Monroe—Articles of association of the Southworth Memorial hospital have been filed with the county clerk.

Detroit—A tentative valuation of \$118,869.747 has been placed on the property owned and used by the Wash-Railroad by the Interstate Commerce Commission.

Detroit—The highest bail ever demanded in Record's Court was fixed by Judge McKay Skillman when he held two negroes in \$1,000,000 each on assault charges. The defendants are alleged to have attacked a 16-year-old white girl.

Manistee—The West Michigan Tourist and Resort Association, which recently held its annual meeting here will sponsor an automobile tour around Lake Michigan next spring, to boost the advantages of Western Michigan as a year-round resort.

Jackson—Thirty-four years a fire man, and the loss of but one eye because of illness is the remarkable record of John E. Brewer, 71 years old, of this city, who January 1, next, will retire from active service on pension. Brewer joined the Jackson department June 1, 1892.

Jackson—A campaign to obtain a favorable vote at the November election on a proposed bond issue for a new court house in Jackson and to secure general support of an effort to change a new Michigan Central depot erected has been launched by the Jackson Chamber of Commerce.

Lansing—Automobile license tax revenues were \$1,716,654 in the three month period ending Sept. 30, according to a report compiled by Charles J. DeLand, secretary of state. This brings the total collection from the license tax this year to \$15,411,717, the bulk of which was received in the first few months when the license plate rush was in full swing.

Holt—A 14 pound great northern pike on a 12 pound test line isn't always crowded with success. Still this feat was performed by a fisherman while fishing in Crochet Lake near Holly in Oakland County. The pike was fished to the kill by the use of a live minnow and a casting rod. This fish sets the season's record for large pike from Crochet Lake.

Chick—A wildcat is reported within 50 miles of Detroit. It lives in an 100-acre stand of virgin timber fronting Fish Lake, near Clyde, according to a caretaker at the Y. M. C. A. camp near the lake and a farmer who lives nearby. Adjacent to the timber is a tamarack swamp containing a large supply of cotton tail rabbits, upon which they hold the wildcat's principal source of food.

Ann Arbor—Regent D. L. Hubbard of the University of Michigan has given 650 volumes of "Gulliver's Travels" to the Federal library under the name of Hubbard. Recently the Public Library volume of "Gulliver's Travels" with a copy of these 1,200 volumes of "Gulliver's Travels" original copies of the first five editions of "Gulliver's Travels" dating from 1726 are on display at the library.

Lansing—Collection of fees and taxes by the secretary of state's office during the first nine months of this year amounted to \$30,818,450. This total does not include the general property tax or any of the fees and taxes collected by a score of other state agencies. The receipts for nine months of motor vehicle taxes, including the gasoline tax, have been \$24,152,448. The estimate for 1926 had been placed at \$24,000,000.

Ypsilanti—One of Ypsilanti's white blackbirds is dead, the victim of a marauding cat which had already a record of the destruction of a score of song birds and at least one full-grown pet rabbit. Two white blackbirds, said by ornithologists to be one of the rarest of Nature's freaks, were hatched in a brood of four young birds here early in the summer. The young birds were true albinos, having pink eyes and absolutely white plumage.

Royal Oak—Leonard Swain, 26-year-old radio installer of Royal Oak, received an electrical charge of 45,000 volts through his body and lives to tell about it, although his hands were badly burned. Swain was stringing an aerial when the wire fell across a Detroit Edison power line. The shock hurled him from the limb of a tree into a nearby crotch from which he was rescued by police. His narrow escape from death is unique physicians say.

East Lansing—Already having set a new record for production, the 1,000 prize hens in the fourth annual international egg laying contest at Michigan State college, are still "going strong." The production at last records was 183,662, or an average of about 382 eggs per hen. The prize birds, finished with 176 average last year, and 163 the year before. Last year's champion was one "Sussie," a White Leghorn, with 305 eggs to her credit.





### 18,000-MILE FLIGHT FOR ARMY PLANES

War Department Plans for Rep-off-December 15

Washington.—The War department has mapped out a course of 18,000 miles which five planes will cover in a flight around South America, beginning about December 15.

The trip will take the aviators to the capitals and practically all of the ports in Latin America. Stops of considerable length will be made in each place to give the people an opportunity to inspect the planes.

Starting from San Antonio, Texas, the planes will follow the east coast of Mexico to Puerto Mexico, across the Isthmus of Panama and thence to the army air station at Coto, Canal Zone.

From Coto the route follows the west coast to Valdivia, Chile. Here the flyers will turn due east and cross the continent to La Plata, Blanca on the Atlantic coast of Argentina. From Buenos Aires a 70-mile flight will be made up the Parana river to Asuncion, capital of Paraguay.

The planes will double back over the same route to the east and west in turn Brazil, the Guianas and Venezuela. At Trinidad the route leaves the mainland of South America and calls for a series of inter-island hops through the Lesser Antilles, Porto Rico, the Dominica, Republic, Haiti and Cuba.

From Havana they will fly to Miami from there to Jacksonville, Savannah, Wilmington, Landley field, and then to Washington, where the flight ends.

No attempt will be made to lower records and the flyers have orders to use the greatest care. They will fly only during fair weather and when conditions are good.

Detroit, Mich.—The executive committee of the International Union of Labor and Industrial Workers of the World, re-elected Green as president and ten other executives.



**GOATS CLIMB TREES IN HUNT FOR FOOD**  
**Scarcity of Edible Material Causes Strange Antics.**

San Diego, Calif.—Out in the Pacific on a heavily barren island, goats are learning to climb trees and swim in the ocean for food. Necessity is the teacher of this population of Guadalupe island, a volcanic bit of dry land sticking up out of the sea 210 miles southwest of San Diego. For the goats are now eating themselves out of house and home, according to Laurence M. Huey, curator of birds and mammals in the natural history museum here. The goats, which overrun the island, are now being sent to tree climbing and ocean swimming for their existence.

Guadalupe island which is located 210 miles southwest of San Diego is the only island in the Pacific where the only inhabitants are a herd of goats. The goats are now eating themselves out of house and home, according to Laurence M. Huey, curator of birds and mammals in the natural history museum here. The goats, which overrun the island, are now being sent to tree climbing and ocean swimming for their existence.

These goats climb to the highest pine and cypress trees and descend the steep slopes of the island, carrying away the bark of the trees and the leaves of the cypress trees. The goats are now eating themselves out of house and home, according to Laurence M. Huey, curator of birds and mammals in the natural history museum here. The goats, which overrun the island, are now being sent to tree climbing and ocean swimming for their existence.

**PRECIOUS VOLUMES FOUND IN LIBRARY**  
**Oldest Was Written in Reign of Henry V.**

Winnipeg, Man.—Precious volumes several hundred years old have been unearthed in a niche of St. John's college library, by an ardent book lover. One of the ancient books is 500 years old; several are more than 400 years of age. Written before the days of printing, they were penned in a fine hand and are now in a fine state of preservation.

The oldest and most interesting of the volumes is "Nicolaus Decretum Libri V," a book handwritten on parchment—1,200 pages—which would make many present-day sign writers creep with envy. It was written in 1417 during the reign of Henry V of England and although it is 500 years old, its pages are none the worse for wear.

Another specimen of early typography is "Biblia Sacra Latina"—the Holy Bible in Latin—printed during the reign of Edward IV. In 1478, just exactly two years after William Caxton introduced printing into England, the first order of merit comes "Cicero's Epistolarum Familiarium," the letters of Cicero, printed 407 years ago, in 1579, four years after Wolsey was made lord chancellor.

Desiderius Erasmus, the famous Dutch scholar of the reign of Henry VIII, is represented by several volumes which were printed during his lifetime; the majority of them are around 1535. "The Holy Bible," translated by Thomas Matthew in 1537, is another old-timer which has successfully withstood the ravages of time. Archbishop Cranmer, who was burned at the stake in Mary's reign, was a religious reformer, and had the Bible translated into English. Henry VIII ordered a copy to be placed in all churches and one of these copies now reposes in St. John's college library here.

Another famous work of the same period was John Marbecke, who published his concordance in 1530. This is the first published concordance to the English Bible and was dedicated to Edward VI, in whose reign it was printed. According to Foxe, the author was burned for making his concordance.

GRISWOLD STREET TO BE IMPROVED.

A New Cement Bridge will be Constructed Over the Pere Marquette Tracks—Northville Must Bear Portion of the Expense.

For a number of years past an effort has been made to secure the erection of a suitable bridge over the Pere Marquette railway right of way on Griswold road.

The new bridge over the Pere Marquette tracks will cost upwards of \$30,000 and the highway will cost, exclusive of the bridge, \$35,000.

The following letter will explain the matter and indicate the action taken by the County Road Commission.

Detroit, Mich., October 12, 1926.

Dear Sir: Recalling the meeting of a few weeks ago at which the grade separation and paving of Griswold road was discussed between yourselves and the Board of Road Commissioners.

Since that time we have taken the matter up with the Pere Marquette Railway Company and have been authorized by them to prepare preliminary sketches for the reconstruction of the grade separation.

As I indicated in the heading of this road and the reconstruction of the grade separation was changed upon Northville street or Northville township at both paving the road towards the project.

It is necessary that the money be available and deposited with the county treasurer not later than May 1st, 1927, or the construction work is to be completed during the building season of 1927.
